I realize that you have subjected yourself and your staff to a great deal of controversy and criticism over this initiative, but I believe, as you do, that the lives and freedom of the hostages that came home were worth that risk.

It pains me deeply that Terry still remains a hostage, and I have been unable to visit the nearby graves of my family out of my own sense of guilt that I have failed to do what they asked of me; "Bring Terry home". However, I no longer feel that I am alone in trying to fulfill the last requests of my father and brother. I sense from you the same determination to do whatever is necessary to gain Terry's freedom and the freedom of the other hostages. For that I extend to you my deepest gratitude and greatest respect.

There was a time that I didn't believe it would be so, but I know now that someday soon, Terry and I will stand together on the White House lawn and express the same kind of support and admiration that David Jacobsen expressed for your efforts on his behalf. I will also hold in my heart and in my prayers the belief that very soon, you and I will both be able to lay this great burden down.


