Dear Mr. President,

I have since changed jobs. I am back to work for the same local utility company that I worked for twenty-two years ago. I am buying my own house, and have two cars, one for me and one for the teenagers that are still at home.

I don't have a PHD. Having my children didn't mean having to quit school and never going back. I don't live in poverty with little emotional support.

The father of these boys of mine has an hereditary blood condition that has been in his family for three generations. I did't need an abortion because there was a good chance that one or all my children would inherit it. Our middle son has inherited this condition, and still I would never consider an abortion if I had known beforehand that this would occur.

Of these five sons, the oldest graduated from high school as, a National Merit finalist. He is now married to a beautiful young lady and they have a lovable blue-eyed son of their own. He is also a city policeman, and plans to continue with college this year.

My second son is PFC in the Marine Corps, stationed in Okinawa. He loves the Corps and graduating from boot camp with a meritorious promotion was a real thrill for him and us, his family.

My third son is an Eagle Scout, and even with his blood problem, he is planning to serve as a missionary for our Church.

My fourth son is almost an Eagle Scout, and also wants to join the Marine Corps after he finishes high school.

Did I choose between having a child and having a beautiful life. NO. I have a beautiful life, and these five children are the main cause of the joy life is for me.



SUBJECT: U.S. International Trade Commission Determination

Regarding Certain Flexible Drill Shafts

By August 18, you must decide what action, if any, you will take regarding the U.S. International Trade Commission's determination in its investigation, under section 337 of the Tariff Act of 1930, regarding certain flexible drill shafts for installing electrical lines. The Commission determined that there was a violation of section 337 in the importation into, and sale in, the United States of the flexible drill shafts that infringe the claims of two U.S. patents, threatening to destroy or cause substantial injury to an efficient and economically operated domestic industry. The Commission ordered infringing drill shafts excluded from entry into the United States and ordered the respondents to cease and desist actions that contributed to the infringement of the process patent. I recommend that you take no action regarding the Commission's determination.

Under subsection 337(g)(2), you may disapprove the Commission's determination for policy reasons, leaving the determination, and any order issued under its authority, without force or effect. You also may approve a determination, making it final immediately. The determination and associated order become final automatically after the sixty day review period if you take no action.

The member agencies of the Trade Policy Committee (the Departments of Agriculture, Commerce, Justice, Labor, State, and Treasury, the Council of Economic Advisers, and the Office of Management and Budget) have approved unanimously the recommendation that you take no action in this case.

The product involved in this case is a flexible drill shaft with a coupler that is used to install electrical lines in otherwise inaccessible places. The product is used by electricians to install electric cable both in new construction and in existing structures. Other means of installing electric lines are available at reasonable prices. Installation of electrical cable using the flexible drill has not been shown in the Commission record to be safer or less costly than installation using other

methods. No evidence was presented to the Commission indicathat the U.S. producer could not supply the expected demand the product.

The determination and orders also are not inconsistent with international obligations. No foreign government has make representations to the U.S. government regarding this carries is no policy issue present, therefore, that would just disapproval of the determination in this case.

Status

February's Supreme Court decision, with its sudden imposition of the Fair Labor Standards Act on state and local governments, has become a principal concern of the nation's local officials.

The issue is presently before the Domestic Policy Council. Senate hearings will be held September 10th on legislation to exempt state and local governments from the FLSA, and the Administration must decide how to testify. A DPC meeting to make a final recommendation is tentatively scheduled for August 28th.

Discussion

The Supreme Court decision held that the Tenth Amendment will no longer impede Congress from imposing mandates on state and local government under the Commerce Clause power. The immediate impact was to revive FLSA amendments passed in 1974, when organized labor's Congressional power was near its peak, extending federal overtime and minimum wage requirements over the state and local sector. Direct annual costs stemming from the ruling are very conservatively estimated at \$3 billion.

The DPC has discussed the matter twice. There was no apparent disagreement that the correct policy is to support remedial legislation. On the other hand, misgivings were expressed about Administration action in the absence of an active state/local consensus. The Attorney General asked me to try to effect agreement among the state/local officials on a single best approach, and to measure the extent of the effort the mayors and other officials were prepared to make to win in Congress.

At the second DPC meeting, I was able to report the following progress:

* Concurrence by all the major organizations on a specific bill. Key provisions are a complete exemption of state/local governments from the FLSA overtime provisions, and an exemption from the minimum wage requirements for volunteer services.

- * Introduction of the above bill in the Senate by Senator Nickles, who chairs the appropriate subcommittee, along with 25 other Senators. Similar House bills have been introduced.
- * Extensive grassroots and publicity activity by state/local officials on behalf of the bill, including testimony at Senator Nickles' first hearing, mailings, and news conferences around the country.

The DPC expressed encouragement at these developments, but at the urging of its staff postponed final action while awaiting still more activity by the mayors and other officials. Such activity has accelerated since that meeting, with plans for aggressive lobbying of Congressmen by local officials during the August recess.

Although the tactic of forcing the state/local officials to act first has some merit, I hope that their response will ultimately be deemed adequate and that the Administration will support the Nickles bill. We have before us a clear challenge to federalism, and a rare opportunity to work hand-in-hand with the states and cities on a matter of both principle and major fiscal significance.

Dear Mr. President:

We are writing to seek your support for legislation to mitigate the impact of the Supreme Court's February 19, 1985 decision in Garcia v. San Antonio Metropolitan Transit Authority on state and local government. In that decision, the Supreme Court overruled its 1976 National League of Cities v. Usery decision that the Tenth Amendment was a bar to application of the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) to state and local employees engaged in traditional governmental functions, effectively extending the wage and hours provisions of the FLSA to states and localities.

We believe that, in at least three areas, amendments to the FLSA are necessary to accommodate the unique problems of state and local government.

First, individuals who provide service to state and local government on a volunteer basis should not be subject to the wage and hours provisions of the FLSA. Of particular concern to states and localities are the provisions of the Department of Labor's (DOL) regulations which establish the presumption that volunteer firefighters are employees whenever they receive more than \$2.50 per call as reimbursement for incidental expenses. As a result of this regulation, many of the estimated one million volunteer firefighters in the nation will be entitled to receive the minimum wage and overtime compensation for volunteer activities. This regulation will have a devastating impact on the many state and local jurisdictions which rely on volunteer firefighters.

Second, the overtime provisions of the FLSA should not apply to state and local employees. Under Section 7 of the FLSA, regular employees are entitled to compensation on a time and a half basis for hours worked in a week in excess of 40. Similarly, overtime pay must be paid to firefighters for hours worked in excess of 212 in a 28 day period and to police officers for hours worked in

excess of 171 in a 28 day period. These provisions mean that numerous employment practices of state and local government, many of which have been incorporated into collective bargaining agreements at the request of employees and are long-standing practices, must be ended.

For example, duty cycles for firefighters of 24 hours on duty and 48 off duty, the most common duty cycle in the nation, can no longer be utilized unless the governing body is willing to pay overtime compensation. Similarly, the practice of using compensatory time off in lieu of overtime compensation is generally not permissible under the overtime provisions of the FLSA. Under the "comp." time concept, both public safety and regular employees are allowed to accumulate compensatory time for later use as time off. This practice is advantageous to both the governmental entity, which is provided with scheduling flexibility, and the employee, who is able to take longer vacations.

Third, a prospective effective date for the application of the FLSA to states and localities should be established. On June 14, DOL announced plans to begin enforcement actions against states and localities and to impose liability on states and localities retroactive to April 15. This retroactive enforcement policy will compound the problems caused by application of the FLSA to states and localities. The FLSA regulations establish countless new regulatory requirements for states and localities, many of which are being imposed in the middle of budget cycles and collective bargaining agreements. In our view, it is essential that Congress establish a moratorium on the application of the FLSA to states and localities that will ensure an orderly and harmonious transition period.

The proposed changes in the FLSA, which are necessary to prevent undue federal interference with the operation of state and local government, must be approved by Congress as soon as possible, preferably before DOL enforcement activities begin on October 15. Furthermore, because expedited congressional action is essential, we urge your support for narrowly crafted legislation which includes only provisions relating to the application of the FLSA to states and localities.



D. called me from Vienna. Some gut instinct tells me it might be better to speak to you about it rather than write. If you can, please call I need your advice. 1- I see from the enclosed Ryan letter that you won't be making the Cleveland dedication. Very disappointing. It would have been an opportunity to say some important things. Also, Nancy. If there is any possibility that you might be able to change your mind, I hope you will. In addition: 2- I received a thick stack of briefing material from Jim Beggs and then, as he suggested, talked to him. wants me to absorb this mass of material and then got to Johnson Space Center for the last stage of the October 1st flight preparation. Then to the Cape for the pre-launch and launch procedure. And then immediately back to Johnson to monitor the mission. He feels this will give me a good background for my flight. So, I am now (like back at College) cramming like crazy! And training. I'm hopeful that, by the time all this is accomplished, Beggs may have a date for my flight. 3- As you know, Verne Orr is retiring as Air Force Secretary November 1st. Jim Hill called to say that Weinberger is apparently leaning toward Russ Rourke (spelling?), Assistant Secretary of Defense for Legislative Affairs for the job. Another candidate is Pete Aldridge (spelling?), Air Force Under-Secretary. Hill says that he, other high-level Air Force officers and the Air Force Association, for reasons I won't burden you with now, would like to see Rourke and Aldridge stay where they are and someone new brought in as Secretary. He, and they, favor Bill Hybl as a candidate and he sent me Hybl's resume. You may remember him. Hybl's the fellow who hosted the dinner you and I attended in Colorado Springs. I spent some time with him on my recent visit. He is bright, personable and, obviously, an able guy. But, of course, I am not qualified to judge his suitability as Air Force Secretary. Hill, who is high on him, wondered whether it would be possible for Don Regan to interview him. And, if he impressed Regan, to pass him on for an interview with Cap. Hybl and Weinberger have only met ceremonially.

You managed to get Mary Sue Hill into orbit before me. She went bananas on receiving your letter. I told her and Jim that I had nothing to do with it. That it was your unsolicited idea. When I sent Mary Sue's letter to you Margot said, "You know Ronnie, he'll write to her and send her up to Cloud Nine". Now, Mary Sue and Jim know what Margot and I have known for a long time. You are a sensitive, caring man. (Sweet, I'm not so sure about.)

Finally, - you refer to my "yen for an out-of-this-world buggy ride". But such a yen is not what motivates me.

I have had a marvelous life. The opportunities to do so many different things. Five years at the Metropolitan Opera. Three degrees, - Political Science, Bachelor of Laws, Master of Laws. The opportunity to say some constructive and hopeful things through motion pictures. The Academy and other awards. The oil business. Etc. Knowing you. A rare one-of-a-kind wife. And, along the way, without really trying, make a few million dollars. Where else but in this country could you start in the depths of a Depression and wind up being so blessed?

During the course of my meeting with Beggs, he said that if this thing works out as we hope, - making a guinea pig out of an old goat, - it would be a great contribution to the Program and to the country.
