Your speech last night was excellent and very well timed to fit your international timetable. I was interested in your reference to Eisenhower's similar program of "People to People" because I had something to do with it. It was about the time the "Voice of America" idea was developed. 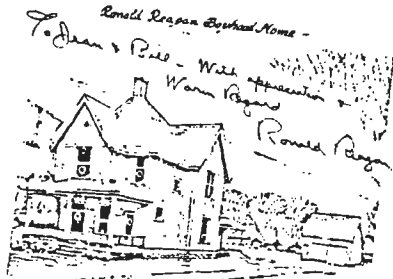
