Thomas Jefferson once observed that he had not noticed men's honesty increasing with their riches, and these days, there is striking evidence that charity is not necessarily a virtue of the rich.

The wealthy got a big tax break five years ago, when the top rates were cut from 70 to 50%. What happened?

The wealthiest taxpayers promptly cut their charitable contributions by a third.

Tax reform will lower the rates again, which means another big drop in the amount of money going to non-profit institutions. We're not talking here about church suppers. The new tax bill means a shortfall of maybe \$13 billion dollars a year in private contributions to things like neighborhood health clinics, research institutes, day care centers, colleges, old folks homes, and drug rehabilitation programs.

The money dries up because new tax bill makes private donations more difficult to give and less attractive to taxpayers.

Will the rich take up the slack? No. Nor will our less-than-generous corporations; corporate gifts amount to only 5% of all charitable giving. Whatever extra money there is will come from Americans of modest incomes. About half of all contributions come from families that make less than \$30,000 a year.

The Reagan administration loves to talk about getting the government off our backs. Non-profit institutions do just that. But then the government produces a new tax code that steals even more money from the non-profit institutions.

With all the cheering for tax "reform", you can hardly hear the cries of those who are being hurt.

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Schools Without Drugs and Other Realistic Hopes by Dr. John A. Howard\*

The September 14 national broadcast from the White House may turn out to have been the great divide between the have-some-if-you-like Age of Aquarius and a new era of intelligent restraint. Influential leaders willing to condemn and contain any activity sanitized by the label of victimless crime have been exceedingly scarce. The civil liberties purists and their unzippered allies among psychologists and other callings have protected free-wheeling behavior, adoitly brandishing scorn, and scare tactics to drive away all critics.

Come now the Reagans with the courage, candor, and conviction to intervene convincingly in the matter of mind-altering drugs. In this effort, they have a remarkable partner in William Bennett. Dr. Bennett, the U.S. Secretary of Education, is an improbable mix--one part impressive scholar, broadly versed in human history, human grandeur, and human folly, and one part down-to-earth problem-solver who can recognize and expose nonsense when he sees it, no matter how deeply entrenched or elegantly packaged it may be. Concurrent with the Reagans' call to action. Dr. Bennett and the Department of Education released a 78-page booklet, Schools Without Drugs.

Browsing through the pages, one is struck by the avoidance of the term "drug abuse." In these days of tolerance for sloppy language, many people have not noticed that the popular code phrase "drug abuse" implies the endorsement of some use of mindaltering drugs, even if they are illegal. The thrust of this book, as the title indicates, is to eliminate drug use, a much

wiser and more promising course than a policy aimed at eliminating the supply, which, it is now clear, cannot accomplish the task.

Secretary Bennett's introductory statement establishes the forthright, no-nonsense character of the text. "Drug use impairs memory, altertness, and achievement. Drugs erode the capacity of students to perform in school, to think, and act responsibly. Research tells us that students who use marijuana regularly are twice as likely as their classmates to average D's and F's, and we know that dropouts are twice as likely to be drug users as graduates."

There are descriptions of diverse types of anti-drug programs which have proven effective at schools in six cities.

Two pages explain what the law permits schools to do with regard to "Search and Seizure" and "Suspension and Expulsion."

Additional sections of the pamphlet suggest in sequence what parents, schools, students, and communities can do to diminsh drug use. There are also brief descriptions of specific drugs, what they look like, what they are called, how they are used, and the effects they have on the users. Finally, there is a listing of publications, video tapes, information on legal issues, toll-free assistance, and a description of representative rehabilitation agencies, all judged sound by the Department of Education.

The booklet has been mailed to the nation's 16,000 school superintendents. It is available free of charge to anyone calling 1-800-624-0100.

The usual people are sending out alarm signals about the Reagan/Bennett proposals, charging that the nation is moving into

a politically motivated hysteria over the drug situation and in danger of overreacting in ways that will jeopardize and compromise cherished civil liberties. But these nay-sayers may not prevail in the face of the massive popular sentiment in behalf of strong anti-drug actions, which recent polls have revealed.

The central paradox of liberty is the inherent and never wholly reconcilable conflict between private judgment, which makes freedom a blessed estate, and the individual's responsibility to the community, which makes freedom a prickly burden. For several decades, what the individual felt like doing has increasingly prevailed over his responsibilities to the group. The damage which drug use now imposes on America's schooling is but one illustration of how the common well-being is compromised by an insistence upon individual rights, and a disregard for individual obligations.

The citizenry now understands the common good requires that the era of relatively unrestricted drug use be brought to an end. Secretary Bennett has provided a tool which seems to be well designed to accomplish that goal for the nation's schools, and for the nation's youth. If progress can be made on this front, it will facilitate improvements in other arenas where irresponsible individual behavior is imposing an intolerable level of damage on other aspects of the society.
