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

Mrs. Thatcher has asked to meet with the President at Camp David and it is our

understanding that he has agreed. The meeting would be a key element of our consultation sessions with Allies this fall. Discussions would likely focus on US-Soviet relations; South Africa and the Middle East would also be high on the agenda. The United Kingdom is the current EC President (the Presidency rotates every six months) thus a meeting with Mrs. Thatcher also offers a useful vehicle for reaching a wider

number of Allies.

President

As you know, Mrs. Thatcher has asked to meet with the President in mid-November. Her original request was made in anticipation of a Gorbachev Summit in late November, i.e., before we announced the Reykjavik meeting.

Nonetheless, she clearly continues to want to come in mid-November -- hopefully to Camp David on Saturday, November 15. The British Embassy confirmed this in a meeting with me today. Price has also sent a message and called the President. Your note on the President's readout of Price's call indicated that the President and Don Regan have agreed in principle to the meeting (Tab II).

State supports the meeting, particularly since it is not coming out of their normal monthly quota. For my part, I question whether we should push for a session at Camp David on Saturday, November 15. I had hoped that we could arrange a meeting on Friday, November 14 and avoid disrupting the President's weekend; but, I understand from Rod McDaniel that a definite decision has been made to meet at Camp David.

As an aside, I wish to note that should we invite Allied leaders to Washington for a consultation meeting -- assuming a Washington Summit later this year -- we may have to adjust the invitation to Mrs. Thatcher.

Dear Mr. President,

In extending this brief note of appreciation for your fine presentation to the Nation last night on your negotiating sessions with Mr. Gorbachev may I also make a suggestion respecting the public perception of SDI.

It has not yet been made clear to the public that SDI would afford protection from ballistic attack by <u>any</u> hostile nation or group, not just the Soviet Union.

Since the United States has engaged in hostilities with many nations in the past it is likely that our country will face potential hostilities in the future from sources and powers that cannot presently be foreseen.

For this reason, your position that SDI should not become a bargaining chip in current US-Russian negotiations is eminently sound and deserves our full support. To foreclose today our implementation of SDI would be to render the United States vulnerable to ballistic attack by any other future adversary.

Dear Larry:

It was good to get your letter and your confirmation regarding SDI. I wasn't aware that Sam Donaldson had said what he did about McFarlane, and I question whether Bud said such a thing. Certainly he knew better.

Yes, I've quoted from your books on a number of occasions and will continue to do so because they make such good sense. When I finally decided to move on what has become SDI, I called a meeting of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. I said that, until nuclear weapons, there had never been an offensive weapon that hadn't inspired a defense -- all the way back to the spear and the shield. Then I asked them if in their thinking it was possible to devise a weapon that could destroy missiles as they came out of their silos. They were unanimous in their belief that such a defensive system could be developed. I gave the go-ahead that very day. The scientists working on this have achieved several breakthroughs and are quite optimistic, although they say we have several years to go. I have never entertained a thought that SDI could be a bargaining chip. I did tell Gorbachev that if and when we had such a system they would join us in eliminating nuclear missiles; we'd share such a defense with them. I don't think he believes me.

Well, it was good to hear from you and thank you for the confirmation. Nancy sends her love.

TEXT OF THE ADDRESS BY THE PRESIDENT AT THE UNITED STATES MILITARY ACADEMY WEST POINT, NEW YORK

Wednesday, May 27, 1981

The argument, if there is any, will be over which weapons and not whether we should forsake weaponry for treaties and agreements. My good friend Laurence Beilenson authored a book a few years ago entitled, The Treaty Trap. It was the result of years of research and it made plain that no nation that placed its faith in parchment or paper and gave up its protective hardware ever lasted long enough to write many pages in history. This is not to say we shouldn't seek treaties and understandings and even mutual reduction of strategic weapons. The search for peace must go on but we have a better chance of finding it if we maintain our strength while we're searching. Mr. Beilenson has recently authored a new thought-provoking book, Survival and Peace in the Nuclear Age.
