As you will recall, on July 30, 1986, you addressed the leaders of 14 national service and fraternal organizations to urge them to get involved in your drug initiative. Kiwanis International has responded to your challenge by providing resources in a multi-faceted public awareness campaign. This group has consistently been supportive of the First Lady's efforts as well.

One portion of the Kiwanis' communications strategy would include a Presidential article in their magazine (circulation 281,000).

Attached for your approval is our suggested language for such an article.

Drug abuse has been a heartfelt concern of Nancy's and mine and had been long before we came to the White House. Our concern was not always shared widely, however, particularly during the late 1960's and into the last decade, when a flippant and irresponsible attitude toward drug use permeated much of society. The so-called recreational use of illegal drugs was seen by some as a matter of civil liberty and personal right, and they chose to ignore the ultimate cost of their drug use. The heartaches which so often followed were felt not by the drug abuser alone, but by family and community as well.

Traditional American values have regained high visibility in recent years--values that attach high import to the health, the security, and the economic vitality of our Nation, and, most importantly, to the dreams and hopes our young people have for the future of this Nation. But the debilitating effects of illegal drug use stand directly in the path of these important values. The time has come to reject the attitudes and behaviors that condone illegal drug use. Not only in America, but throughout the world, decent and sensible people are joining in active opposition to illegal drug trafficking and drug use.

Those who smuggle and sell drugs are as dangerous to national security as is any terrorist. We are working to diminish the flow of drugs into our country. But we recognize that law enforcement is only one element in an overall solution. To rely totally on government to protect us and our children is to fall prey to an illusion.

The real answer is the active opposition of every citizen to the permissive attitudes and behaviors surrounding illegal drugs and their use. We can see the obvious successes of many initiatives undertaken in the private sector and by community-based organizations. These accomplishments reflect the commitment of individual men, women, and children in business and in labor, in schools and in public service, to get tough and to get involved. Individual responsibility is a prerequisite for success in beating the drug problem.

I am particularly proud of the role Nancy has played in urging the American people to make the fight against drug abuse a national crusade. A few years ago, when she was asked by a young person what to do when offered drugs, Nancy's immediate answer was, "Just say No." Today, in thousands of "Just Say No" clubs which are found from coast to coast, young Americans have joined together to say "No" to drugs. When we visited Hawaii on our way to the Tokyo Summit, we were greeted by hundreds of young people wearing "Just Say No" t-shirts. That was a welcome we will always remember.

While "Just Say No" is a message that our children can understand, it is also a straightforward statement of resolve for our Nation in its entirety.

Nancy expressed the need clearly when she said, "We must create an atmosphere of intolerance for drug use." We must give notice that individual drug use is threatening the health and safety of all our citizens. Each of us must make it clear that we are no longer willing to condone illegal drugs, or the sellers, or the users.

Our intolerance will not be expressed adequately or appropriately if we rely exclusively on drug law enforcement. Our object is not to punish users but to help them. We want to free them from chemical dependency and from the cruel grasp of the drug traffickers.

In a free society, we are each accountable for our actions. We must be sure that drug users understand this fundamental principle. If the illegal use of drugs is to eliminated, drug users can no longer excuse themselves by blaming society, nor can the rest of us accept their excuses and shrug our shoulders.

John Locke, whose ideas greatly affected those who laid the philosophical foundations of American freedom, wrote, "A sound mind in a sound body is a short but full description of a happy state in this world." Our goal is to make certain that illegal drugs do not deprive anyone of a happy state of sound mind and body.

We have a long way to go. But there is ample room for optimism. Overall, the use of illegal drugs in our country continues to decline. And international cooperation in combatting drug abuse continues to increase. Other nations are beginning to recognize the destructive effects of illegal drugs upon their own societies and to realize that we must fight this enemy together.

Each of us must ask, as millions already have, "What can I do to stop the use of illegal drugs?" The simple answer is to get involved in the fight.

Look for ways to express your personal and moral commitment to oppose the use of illegal drugs in all forms and in all places.

- o Being involved at all levels of community activity is one way to encourage community leaders to work against drug abuse. Kiwanis clubs and other local organizations can help achieve drug-free schools. Our children deserve no less.
- Local television and radio stations regularly air public service announcements. A thoughtful letter about drug-abuse problems might lead them to speak out against the dangers to human health that drug abuse poses.
- enforced. Community leaders can remind local and district

 prosecutors of the importance of prosecuting those who have been charged with selling drugs to children.
- o Business and labor leaders in your community have a vital role to play in fighting drug abuse. Learn what they may be doing already to get drugs out of the workplace, and ask how you can help.
- o Your religious leaders can also be encouraged to voice their opposition to the illegal use of drugs and support the position that illegal drugs are a moral as well as a health and safety issue.

o And when you have made contact with all of these individuals and institutions, work to bring them together in a partnership that is capable of launching a community-wide offensive against drugs.

Stopping illegal drug use is essential to the vitality and future of our Nation. Nancy and I count on your continued community involvement and leadership in combatting illegal drug use. God bless you, and thanks for all you're doing.




