SUBJECT:

Energy Security Study and Recommendations

You have indicated that you are inclined to select Option 1 -the revenue neutral package that would not reopen basic issues
already considered in tax reform -- but that instead of
supporting private financing of a Strategic Petroleum Reserve
(SPR) fill rate of 100,000 barrels per day, you would prefer
Federal financing of that fill rate.

As amended, Option 1 would:

Supplement current Administration proposals* with the following:

- -- opening up the Arctic National Wildlife Reserve;
- -- reducing the minimum bid requirement on Federal
 leases;
- -- increasing the net income limitation on the percentage depletion allowance from 50 percent to 100 percent;
- repealing the transfer rule to permit use of percentage depletion for proven properties that have changed ownership;
- -- increasing the SPR fill rate from the 35,000 barrels per day included in the FY 1988 budget proposal to 100,000 barrels per day.

The cost of increasing the SPR fill rate to 100,000 barrels per day is \$482 million in FY 1988. The Department of Energy can offset \$360 million of that cost through the sale of the Great Plains Synfuel Plant. Option 1, as amended, would increase the Federal deficit in FY 1988 by roughly \$185 million and would require directing OMB to find offsets if the Congress adopted this fill rate and the technical tax changes.

CURRENT ADMINISTRATION PROPOSALS

Initiatives that you have proposed, but which have not yet been adopted:

- o Seeking comprehensive natural gas decontrol, including wellhead price decontrol, and repeal of the Fuel Use Act.
- o Repealing the Windfall Profit Tax.
- o Continuing to improve access to OCS and Federal lands.
- o Seeking nuclear licensing reform, reauthorization of the Price Anderson Act, and developing a nuclear waste repository.
- o Continuing to push hard for higher levels of oil stockpiles among our allies, particularly at the ministerial meeting of the International Energy Agency in May and the Venice Summit.

If all these proposals that are currently on the table were enacted, they could yield additional domestic production of 375,000 barrels per day of oil equivalent by the early 1990s.

DECISION

Option 1: Supplement current Administration proposals with a revenue neutral program and only technical tax changes. Elements included in this option are:

- opening up ANWR
- reducing the minimum bid requirement
- increasing the net income limitation
- repealing the transfer rule
- studying the possibility of private financing for a SPR fill rate of up to 100,000 barrels per day.

(The savings estimates for private SPR financing range from zero to \$250 million per year. OMB has concerns about the budget integrity of such a proposal.)

- Supplement current Administration Option 2: proposals with additional proposals that may not be revenue neutral but which will lead to substantially more new domestic oil production than option 1. This option includes the elements of option 1 with the following additional possibilities:
 - A. Providing for faster tax write-off of G&G expenses. (See page 5 for additional estimated production and revenue loss.)
 - with \$21 \$25 per barrel i. phase-out
 - ii. with three year sunset
 - B. Providing a non-refundable tax credit for oil exploration and development. (See page 5 for additional estimated production and revenue loss.)
 - i. with \$25 per barrel sunset
 - ii. with three year sunset
 - C. Increasing the SPR fill rate to 75,000 barrels per day if the private SPR financing is not feasible.

Option 2, sub-options A, Options 1 and 2 are mutually exclusive. Bake III B, and C are not mutually exclusive.

Dear Mr. President:

Once again, I am sharing your problems vicariously, and hoping that a happy resolution will come about. The Madrid ABC correspondent, José Maria Carrascal (you will recall him, I'm sure), says that you have had an amazing physical and political recovery lately, despite all the efforts of our enemies, and that you are not on the defensive, but can attack and withdraw as necessary. Like many other foreigners, he is at a loss to understand why American political opponents on the Left do not care what damage they do to the United States so long as they can injure you. Neither do I.

The cowardly retreat of the Senate on the public works bill is incredible, and only proves to what depths Senators and Congressmen can sink. Yet the various Republican fund-raising committees keep telling me and others that we must support these guys so that they can carry on your program! As I have indicated before, both houses of Congress, the media and the State Department, all rate equal with me -- zero. All three are arrogant, self-centered organizations, whose programs and views are so one-sided and so basically anti-U.S. that I do not understand how they can continue. I know they have the approval of our foreign enemies, of course.

I have seen so many articles like those that I am enclosing that I thought it would be a good idea to send them along to you, as I am confident that neither the Mossad nor the ADL are furnishing you with a broad view of the Isracli-U.S. Jews situation. My personal view is that this comportment on the part of both U.S. and Isracli Jews is doing great harm to them, and will only confirm the hard opinions of their enemies. Since someone may hold back these enclosures or the letter itself, I may send copies via an indirect source. Israel would not exist if it were not for the U.S., and while I do not suggest that they copy our methods of dealing with them in their conduct toward us, I think they should "shape up or ship out" -- and soon.

My best and warmest wishes for your welfare and for that of our beloved country go with this letter, and my respects, as always.
