- To establish the Africa Famine, Recovery and Development Fund for the relief, recovery, and long-term development of sub-Saharan Africa, and for other purposes.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
 - 3 SHORT TITLE
 - 4 Section 1. This Act may be cited as the "Africa
 - 5 Famine, Recovery and Development Fund Act of 1986".

1	AFRICA FAMINE, RECOVERY, AND DEVELOPMENT
2	INITIATIVE
3	SEC. 2. Part I of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961
4	is amended by adding after chapter 6 the following new
5	chapter:
6	"CHAPTER 7—AFRICA FAMINE, RECOVERY AND
7	DEVELOPMENT INITIATIVE
8	"Sec. 471. Statement of Policy.—(a) The Congress
9	finds that—
10	"(1) the human tragedy and suffering existing in
11	Africa requires a global initiative which must be under-
12	taken in the context of a long-term commitment to ad-
13	dressing Africa's fundamental development problems;
14	"(2) there is, for the first time in the history of
15	independent Africa, a consensus on the problems and
16	probable solutions to Africa's basic development needs
17	which is shared by the independent nations of Africa
18	and the industrialized countries alike;
19	"(3) these problems include—
20	"(A) the need to develop more appropriate
21	economic policies which foster growth, restore
22	balance in the roles of the public and private sec-
23	tors, and establish a favorable environment for in-
24 .	dividual enterprise and self-sustaining develop-
25	ment;

1	"(B) the need to expand agricultural produc
2	tion through, among other things, agricultura
3	structural reforms in such areas as pricing policy
4	and privatization of parastatals, the expansion o
5	agricultural research and the development of more
6	effective extension services so that the benefits o
7	research are disseminated as widely as possible
8	the growth (on a country or regional level) of an
9	indigenous capability to develop and make avail
10	able technology appropriate to the many culture
11	that comprise sub-Saharan Africa, and to develop
12	and improve needed production related infrastruc
13	ture;
14	"(C) the need to reverse the gradual degra
15	dation of the land on which the livelihood of mos
16	Africans depends and to address the pressure
17	that a rapidly expanding population places on th
18	land and the resource base of African countries
19	"(D) the need to introduce and expand self
20	sustaining health programs to improve the quality
21	of life of the people and increase their ability t
22	contribute to economic growth;
23	"(E) the need to find employment in both th
24	rural and urban sectors for the ever-increasing

numbers of working-age Africans; and

1	"(F) the need to improve the productive	ca-
2	pability of the people through improved and e	ex-

4	"(4) the world community has contributed sign	ifi-

4	other education and training to enable Africans to
5	better handle the challenges of development.
6	"(b) It is the purpose of this chapter to establish the
7	statutory framework and to authorize the appropriations nec-
8	essary to carry out the policy described in this section and to
9	assist African countries to address the problems and achieve
10	the objectives contained in this section.
11	"Sec. 472. Relief, Rehabilitation and Recov-
12	ERY.—(a) The Congress recognizes that the people of sub-
13	Saharan Africa have been repeatedly threatened and affected
14	by disasters. Droughts, flood, and famine have caused count-
15	less deaths and untold suffering, as well as severely affecting
16	long-term development as resources are devoted to meeting
17	immediate survival needs at the expense of investment for
18	the future. The Congress also recognizes that the effects of
19	disasters can be magnified by, or may be the result of, poli-
20	cies and practices which degrade the land and foster environ-
21	mentally unacceptable land use patterns. In recognition of
22	the humanitarian concern and tradition of the people of the
23	United States for the victims of disasters, as well as the rela-
24	tionship between such disasters and the inability of countries
95	with limited resources to meet both immediate survival needs

- 1 and long-term growth requirements, the President is author-
- 2 ized, in addition to amounts otherwise available for such pur-
- 3 poses, to provide assistance, on such terms and conditions as
- 4 he may determine, for relief, rehabilitation, and recovery ac-
- 5 tivities in Africa. Such assistance for relief, rehabilitation,
- 6 and recovery activities for the victims of disasters may in-
- 7 clude the furnishing of seeds for planting, fertilizer, pesti-
- 8 cides, farm implements, farm animals and vaccine and veteri-
- 9 nary services for livestock, blankets, clothing, and shelter,
- 10 disease prevention and health care activities, water and
- 11 small-scale agricultural projects and food protection and stor-
- 12 age activities. Where appropriate, recovery activities should
- 13 serve as the foundation for long-term development activities
- 14 undertaken pursuant to the authority contained in section
- 15 473 of this chapter.
- 16 "(b) Private and voluntary organizations are encouraged
- 17 to continue their significant role in providing assistance for
- 18 relief, rehabilitation, and recovery activities.
- 19 "(c) Amounts allocated to carry out the provisions of
- 20 this section may be used for operating expenses of the
- 21 Agency for International Development for management sup-
- 22 port activities associated with the planning, monitoring and
- 23 supervision of assistance provided under this section.

1 "(d) Assistance under this section shall be furnished in 2 accordance with the policies of this section and the general

3 authorities contained in section 491 of this Act.

4 "Sec. 473. Long-Term Development.—(a) The

5 President is authorized to provide assistance, on such terms

6 and conditions as he may determine, for long-term develop-

7 ment in Africa. The objectives of such assistance include the

"(1) Increasing agricultural production, especially of food, in significant measure through agricultural policy changes at the macro-economic and sector levels. Furthermore, efforts to increase production should include agricultural research and extension, development and promotion of agriculture marketing activities and production packages, and the construction and improvement of needed production related infrastructure. Significant increases with equity should be sought in rural income, with exphasis placed on the small producer, the majority of whom are women, and the farm family. In view of the central role of women in African food systems, gender roles need to be analyzed and taken into account in order to ensure the integration of women into development activities.

"(2) Africa's natural resource base should be maintained and restored in order to increase and sus-

- tain agricultural productivity. Where appropriate, efforts should promote small-scale, affordable, resource-conserving projects, using appropriate technologies and methods suited to the local environment and featuring close consultation with and involvement of local people during the design and implementation of projects.
- "(3) Improvement of the quality of life of mothers and children should be sought primarily through the establishment of self-sustaining primary health care systems which are capable of providing adequate health, family planning and nutrition services. Funds made available under the Child Survival Fund described in section 104(c) should be used to the maximum extent practicable in furnishing assistance under this paragraph.
- "(4) Improvement in the relevance and productivity of educational institutions should be made a high priority, with substantial attention given to improving primary education. Emphasis should also be placed on expanding the numbers of qualified middle and senior level professionals, managers and technicians.
- "(5) Attention should be directed toward the development and generation of income generating opportunities in urban and rural areas. Off-farm employment by means of small-scale enterprises, especially such en-

- 18 from assistance furnished under this chapter as effectively
- 19 and expeditiously as possible and to avoid overburdening the
- 20 capability of African governments to effect such procure-
- 21 ments. It is further the sense of the Congress that, for pur-
- 22 poses of this Act, special circumstances exist which are criti-
- 23 cal to the achievement of the objectives of this chapter and if
- 24 not addressed, would seriously impede attainment of those
- 25 objectives. Therefore, the Agency for International Develop-

- 1 ment is authorized, in light of those circumstances, to take
- 2 whatever administrative steps it deems appropriate to pro-
- 3 vide such goods and services (either directly or procured by

- 7 "Sec. 476. International Organizations.—(a)
- 8 The Congress finds that international organizations, because
- 9 of their broad political acceptability and their Africa-wide
- 10 network of offices, have provided significant and critical sup-
- 11 port for development and humanitarian efforts in Africa.
- 12 These efforts have complemented those undertaken by the
- 13 United States to achieve the objectives described in this
- 14 chapter, especially in support of macro-economic policy
- 15 change. Of particular importance have been programs to
- 16 assist Africans in their recovery from the effects of the recent
- 17 drought, including assistance for the rehabilitation of agricul-
- 18 ture, the provision of health care and nutrition services, and
- 19 the coordination of emergency relief and recovery activities.
- 20 The Congress further finds that international organizations
- 21 must continue to play a significant role in addressing issues of
- 22 critical importance to the development of Africa: agricultural
- 23 production and research, maternal and child health care,
- 24 family planning, primary and technical education, and the
- 25 maintenance of Africa's natural resource base.

1 "(b) In recognition of the significance of international organizations in the long-term development of Africa, including the Special Program for Drought Rehabilitation in Sub-Saharan Africa of the International Fund for Agricultural Development, the President may make available from such amounts under section 474 as he deems appropriate for activities for such organizations, undertaken in coordination with the Agency for International Development, consistent with the purposes of this chapter. Such amounts shall be in addition to amounts authorized to be made available to such 10 11 organizations pursuant to this or any other Act. "SEC. 477. MULTILATERAL DEVELOPMENT INSTITU-12 TIONS.—(a) The Congress finds that the African Develop-13 ment Bank and the African Development Fund, as the region's own most prominent development institutions, have a 15 unique role as molders of African opinion on economic issues 16 and as sources of training for the continent's future develop-17 ment leaders. These institutions have become important 19 sources, as well, of needed development financing for African 20 countries unable to borrow on private capital markets. The Congress further finds that the sectoral priorities of these in-21 stitutions, which include lending for activities to help African 22countries meet their basic food requirements, to develop their 23human resource potential through education and health programs, and to construct basic infrastructure, are consistent

- 1 with the objectives of this chapter. The Congress recognizes
- 2 that the Special Facility for Africa of the International De-
- 3 velopment Association has the potential for further increasing
- 4 the amount and effectiveness of development resources avail-
- 5 able to Africa.
- 6 "(b) In recognition of the importance of these multilater-
- 7 al institutions in the development process in Africa, the
- 8 Agency for International Development and these institutions
- 9 are encouraged to cooperate, wherever practicable, on activi-
- 10 ties in support of the objectives of this chapter. Any amounts
- 11 that are made available under section 474 may be used in
- 12 conjunction with resources provided by the multilateral insti-
- 13 tutions to finance development activities consistent with such
- 14 objectives. Whenever possible, activities financed under the
- 15 preceding sentence should be coupled with efforts to effect
- 16 significant policy reforms on the part of aid-recipient
- 17 countries.
- 18 "Sec. 478. Definitions.—For purposes of this chap-
- 19 ter the terms 'Africa' and 'sub-Saharan Africa' shall not be
- 20 construed to include North Africa.".
