As you requested, I declined for Ambassador Kirkpatrick, Bud McFarlane, the US Ambassador to Israel (if he is here on 3/25), Donald Rumsfeld, and Elliott Abrams.

I told you Rabbi Stern was not interested in Richard Perle so I told him that even though I was aware he wanted a speaker on the Middle East Policy, I had asked other people from the White House to see if we might be helpful with a speaker but not on the issue/policy he requested. I told him Mr. Horowitz and you were most interested in speaking --- and he said no.

He asked that I send to the appropriate office to request a Senator/Congressman and I have done so.

Since your office had originally contacted Horowitz to speak, I would appreciate it if you would tell him that the Council has decided to go elsewhere for a speaker (or whatever you want to so that you are "off the hook").

The <u>National Council of Young Israel</u> is the largest modern American Orthodox synagogal movement in the <u>United States</u>, reaching from coast to coast, from as far south as Florida to as far north as Maine, composed of members with a loyalty to the heritage of their faith and to the United States.

Though the major thrust of our organization is the bridging of the gap between the generations through the establishment of youth clubs, boy scout troops, and college campus activities, we have expanded our program in the past fifty years to fulfill the needs of people of all faiths and creeds. I guess when it rains, it pours. Sometimes we don't hear from each other for months on end, and then suddenly we write as if the post office will lower its rate.



In the midst of a Presidential campaign already supercharged with religious and ethnic confrontation and provocation, an attempt is being made to appropriate a. major Jewish religious symbol on the Democratic side of the highly partisan nuclear freeze issue. A liberal group of Reform, Conservative and Orthodox Jewish religious leaders is sponsoring the erection of a special Sukkah in Washington D.C. designed to dramatize the threat of

nuclear war to annihilate all of mankind.,

The obvious aim of the project is to promote public, and specifically Jewish support for the verifiable nuclear freeze, an issue high on the agenda of the Mondale presidential campaign. Coming from a camp which has objected loudly to President Reagan's support from fundamentalist Christian groups, and the outspoken position of Catholic bishops on the abortion issue, such a blatant attempt to appropriate a major symbol of Jewish religious observance for partisan gain seems most inconsistent, and, for the Jewish community, ill-advised, If G-d does not necessarily insist on returning prayer to the public schools, or the passage of an anti-abortion amendment to the constitution, then he is not necessarily a proponent of the nuclear freeze, either.

The true significance of Sukkos and the Sukkah is that Jews and Judaism admit their responsibilities to all mankind, of all nationalities and political persuasions equally. It reminds us of the vulnerability inherent in life, and our common need to seek and follow in the ways

Dear Friend:

I am voting for Walter F. Mondale and Geraldine Ferraro, and urge you to do the same.

My reasons are simple. Walter F. Mondale is a disciple of Hubert Humphrey and shares the same principles. His approach to issues of education and social justice for the poor, the aged and the sick are akin to mine. Geraldine Ferraro represents a neighboring Congressional district in Queens. I have had the opportunity to observe her at close range. Her qualifications are superb and her credentials impeccable.

There are, of course, specific concerns. Walter Mondale has been a very staunch supporter of Israel and the Soviet Jewry movement. He has been an outspoken foe of anti-Semitism and bigotry. Linking him to Jesse Jackson and Jackson's bigoted supporters is most unfair and uncharacteristic of Jews who demonstrate hakarat hatov (expressions of gratitude) to friends of long standing. Mondale has said he would rather lose with the Jewish community than win with the help of bigots. Everything he has done in his life confirms this.

If I had to single out the one predominant issue in determining my choice for the Presidency, it would be church-state and its obverse, religious liberty. Decades of teaching American Jewish history reinforce my conviction that this is a major factor in the security of the American Jew. It is not only the President's position on prayer, but also his power to appoint Supreme Court justices that can calibrate the delicate relationship for future centuries that concerns me. The Pawtucket creche decision, reversing almost three centuries of judicial tradition, demonstrates clearly that trend which worries me so much and must be reversed before the damage becomes significant.


