Defense Dept. Readies Asat Weapon For Third Test Firing in Space

Washington—Defense Dept. is preparing for the third live firing of an experimental antisatellite weapon (Asat) following its notification to Congress last month of its plans for the test. The Asat will be fired at a nonfunctioning satellite in space.

A total of two test firings of the Asat system, consisting of a Boeing short-range attack missile (SRAM) first stage, an LTV Altair second stage and an LTV-developed miniature homing vehicle warhead, is planned for Fiscal 1985. Both tests will be conducted by the Air Force using a McDonnell Douglas F-15 fighter as the launch vehicle.

Funding Prohibited

Congress last year prohibited obligating or expending Fiscal 1985 funds for testing Asat systems until certification had been received from President Reagan that the tests were crucial for U. S. national security and that the U. S. is endeavoring to negotiate with the Soviet Union a mutual and verifiable arms control agreement with strict limitations on Asat weapons.

Such a certification was submitted to Congress in mid-August. A 15-day delay in the resumption of tests following submission of the certification was also mandated in the congressional language concerning the Asat, and that 15-day delay ends Sept. 3.

Congress limited the number of Asat tests to no more than three in Fiscal 1985, but the Air Force has indicated it plans to conduct only two firings this fiscal year. The first of these was planned for mid-summer but has been delayed by technical difficulties with both the miniature homing vehicle used in the Asat system and the target vehicle against which the weapon was to have been fired.

The first flight test of the Asat system in January, 1984, involved firing the weapon at a point in space. That test was considered successful.

Second test of the system in November, 1984, involved an infrared probe used with the weapon. The test was considered only a partial success because cryogenic lines used to cool the probe prior to launch failed to retract properly from the miniature homing vehicle, impairing the proper functioning of the vehicle after launch.

Air Force officials said enough data were obtained, especially on miniature homing vehicle sensor performance, to proceed to the first intercept test against an actual target in space.

The Air Force also said the cause of the cryogenic lines' failure to retract has been determined, and modifications are being made to the test missiles.

The third Asat test was originally

scheduled to involve a balloon-like instrumented target vehicle to be launched into space prior to the Asat firing. Technical difficulties with the instrumented target vehicle, however, have caused additional delays in the third test, and the decision was finally made to use an older, no longer functional satellite already in orbit as the target for the Asat. The satellite is nonclassified, but Defense Dept. officials are reluctant to identify it before the next test because of concerns that its identification would allow the Soviets to monitor the test more closely.

Nearly 40 captive-carry flight tests of the Asat on the F-15 have been accomplished, according to Air Force officials, and these have verified that the F-15 can operate safely with the Asat missile in a variety of operational conditions. The tests also have confirmed that the surveillance system, command and control and weapon systems operate together properly, and that the live-fire test missiles are ready for flight.

Qualification Program

Ground qualification testing of Asat has continued independently of the flight test program. Six parts of an eight-part qualification test program have been completed so far, Air Force officials said.

One of the solid propellant motors used in the maneuvering propulsion assembly of the Asat miniature homing vehicle exploded during the seventh stage of testing, according to program officials. The contractors, the program office and an independent team of specialists are investigating the cause of this failure and will recommend changes.

Program officials said the fundamental design of the Asat missile has not changed, but they stressed that the program is still in the development and test phase and modifications to the basic design are anticipated.

The Air Force Rocket Propulsion Laboratory, in the meantime, issued a request for proposals earlier this year for improved solid propellant rocket motors that might be used in the miniature homing vehicle's maneuver propulsion assembly. Officials said this was not related to the explosion experienced during the seventh stage of testing but was part of an effort within the Rocket Propulsion Laboratory to improve existing or developing systems.

The laboratory is attempting to develop motors that would reduce exhaust products that could contaminate the miniature vehicle, weigh less and have greater efficiency. Such motors would be a hedge against additional maneuvering capability

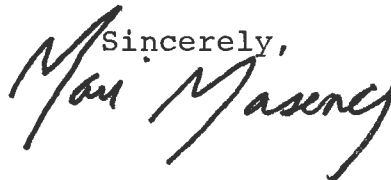

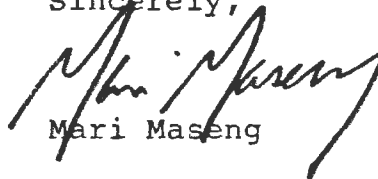
