January 28, 1987, Mr. Carlucci's Office

Background: On January 2, 1987, Frank Carlucci began his duties as the National Security Advisor to the President. He was nominated to this position with strong support from a broad cross section of Washington's defense and foreign policy community, including Secretaries Weinberger and Shultz and CIA Director Casey. (Mr. Carlucci's bio is attached.)

The purpose of the meeting is to introduce yourself and OPL's defense/foreign policy team to Mr. Carlucci, inform him of our past cooperation with NSC, and express our hope for a close working relationship in the future. Max Green and Rudy Beserra will also attend the meeting.

### Topics for Discussion:

- 1. //Discussion of OPL role and responsibilities.//
- 2. On defense/foreign policy issues, in 1987 we plan to focus on Contra aid, SDI and the defense budget.
- 3. We were very pleased to work with your staff on last Friday's Central America briefing. Despite the snow, our invited guests were excited to hear you speak personally on this issue. Press coverage was also very good.
- 4. Other issues on which we have worked closely with NSC are U.S./Soviet relations (especially human rights) and the Middle East.
- 5. Linas Kojelis heads our defense/foreign policy division, and he will introduce our staff.

#### FRANK C. CARLUCCI

Frank C. Carlucci was sworn in as Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs on January 2, 1987.

Mr. Carlucci had been Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of Sears World Trade, Inc., since October 1984, after serving as President and Chief Operating Officer since January 1983.

A retired Career Minister in the U.S. Foreign Service, Mr. Carlucci was born in Scranton, Pennsylvania, on October 18, 1930. He graduated from Princeton University in 1952. He served for two years as a Lieutenant (junior grade) in the Navy aboard the USS ROMBACH (DE-364). Thereafter, he attended the Harvard Graduate School of Business Administration and joined the Jantzen Company in Portland, Oregon, in 1955.

In 1956, Mr. Carlucci joined the Department of State as a Foreign Service Officer and was assigned, from 1957 to 1959, as Vice Consul and Economic Officer in Johannesburg, South Africa. He was subsequently assigned as Secretary and Political Officer in Kinshasa, Congo, for two years.

From 1962 to 1964, he was Officer-in-Charge of Congolese Political Affairs in Washington and from 1964 to 1965 was the Consul General in Zanzibar. From 1965 to 1969, he was Counselor for Political Affairs in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.

Mr. Carlucci was appointed Director of the Office of Economic Opportunity in December 1970, after having served as Assistant Director of OEO from June 1969. He was then appointed Associate Director of the Office of Management and Budget and was later appointed Deputy Director. For the next two years, until 1974, Mr. Carlucci served as Under Secretary of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, followed by appointment as Ambassador to Portugal. He returned to the United States in February 1978 and served as Deputy Director of Central Intelligence until January 1981. From February 1981 until January 1983, Mr. Carlucci served as Deputy Secretary of Defense.

His awards and honors include: Presidential Citizens Award, 1983; Distinguished Intelligence Medal, 1981; National Intelligence Distinguished Service Medal, 1981; Defense Department Distinguished Civilian Service Award, 1977; Department of Health, Education and Welfare Distinguished Civilian Service Award, 1975; State Department Superior Service Award, 1972; and State Department Superior Honor Award, 1969.

Mr. Carlucci is married to Marcia McMillan Myers of Madison, Wisconsin, and has three children: Karen, Frank and Kristin.
