SPONSORED BY THE MINISTRY OF CULTURE OF THE SOVIET UNION

The first Exhibition of Boehm true porcelain art from the United States, entitled "The American Boehm Porcelain Collection Sponsored by the Ministry of Culture of the Soviet Union," will be shown in Moscow, U.S.S.R., beginning May 17 by the Boehm Porcelain Studio of Trenton, New Jersey. The exhibition includes a life-size American Bald Eagle (33-1/4"H x 30"W x 22"D). Arrangements between the Boehm Studio and the Ministry of Culture were made by Dr. Armand Hammer, Chairman of Occidental Petroleum.

The duration of the exhibition is six weeks (May 17 to June 27) in the Exhibition Pavilion for Nature Conservation. This is a first for Western porcelain art, thus a high honor for the Boehm artists.

The exhibition will feature 47 major sculptures of the Boehm Masterpiece Collection spanning the 37 years since the studio's founding. Another focal point will be the life-size "Mute Swans, Birds of Peace," on loan from the White House with the consent of President Ronald Reagan. An illustrated catalog of the exhibition is being published in Russian and in English.

One hundred seventy-five American Boehm collectors will accompany Mrs. Boehm to the Soviet Union for 11 days of activities. Joining them at the preview of the exhibition will be 150 Soviet art patrons and diplomatic guests. Special guests invited are: General Secretary Mikhail Gorbachev and Mrs. Gorbachev, Soviet Foreign Minister Edward Shevardnadze and Mrs. Shevardnadze, Soviet Ambassador Yuri Dubinin and Mrs. Dubinin and U.S. Ambassador to the U.S.S.R. Jack F. Matlock, Jr. and Mrs. Matlock. That evening Mrs. Boehm will present to the Minister of Culture as a gift to the Soviet people the American Eagle, the official symbol of the United States, for a museum in Moscow.

Mrs. Boehm has long been associated with programs involving the world of children, and firmly believes that an appreciation of art in children is one of the keys to international peace. She has, therefore, chosen as a gift to the children of the Soviet Union a 25" tall porcelain sculpture of an Eurasian Bear (the Great Brown Bear) from the children of the Sacred Heart School, an inner-city school in Trenton, New Jersey.

"Just Say No" Club Member's Handbook

As you requested, I have reviewed the "Just Say No" Club Member's Handbook.

I think this piece, written for kids is easily understandable and presents the right message. I am suggesting some changes that provide greater clarity, completeness, and correctness -- but they do not detract from my opinion that this is a very fine effort.

1. Drug Abuse: Questions and Answers

- o What are drugs?  
I would change the word "smoke" on the last line of the answer to "sell". In some municipalities, it's against the law for kids to smoke or drink, but in most communities the legal restriction is against sale.
- o What does it mean to be "high" on a drug?  
I would suggest one addition and one change. The addition: "Sometimes it may feel pleasurable, but that only lasts a short time" -- before the sentence beginning on line 3. The change: in the last line, change "a drug" to "some drugs" and "it" to "them".
- o What does it mean to be addicted to a drug?  
Change the next to last sentence to read, "Marijuana also is a drug you can get addicted to."
- o What is "drug abuse"?  
Delete the last three words and add, "illegally or to excess or to get high".

## PRESIDENTIAL STATEMENT

### Opening of START AND D & S NEGOTIATING GROUPS - NST

Tomorrow marks the opening in Geneva of the eighth round in our negotiations with the Soviet Union on strategic arms reductions and strategic defense issues. With the negotiations on intermediate-range nuclear forces having resumed on April 23, all three negotiating groups of the Nuclear and Space Talks will now be underway.

The United States remains fully committed to achieving deep, equitable, verifiable and stabilizing reductions in the U.S. and Soviet nuclear arsenals. During his meetings in Moscow last month, Secretary Shultz made progress that moved us closer to such reductions. We are determined to build on this progress.

Since the early days of my Administration, our number one arms control objective has been the achievement of significant and verifiable reductions of offensive nuclear forces -- particularly the most destabilizing weapons, fast-flying ballistic missiles.

I have directed our U.S. START Negotiator to intensify efforts to reach agreement on reducing strategic offensive nuclear arms by fifty percent. Toward that end, the United States intends to table shortly a draft START treaty text. This text will reflect the basic agreements on strategic arms reductions reached by General Secretary Gorbachev and myself in our meeting at Reykjavik last October. It will be responsive as well to Soviet concerns expressed subsequent to Reykjavik, and will provide ample basis for the creation of a fair and durable START agreement.

We have made great progress in START. I am firmly convinced that a START Agreement is within our grasp, even this year, if the Soviets are prepared to resolve the remaining outstanding issues. And most important among these issues is the need, for the purpose of ensuring strategic stability, to place sublimits on ballistic missile warheads.

We will likewise be making a new move in the Defense and Space area. Our negotiators return to Geneva ready to place on the negotiating table the new U.S. proposal which Secretary Shultz discussed during his Moscow meetings. This new proposal incorporates the following elements:

- Both the U.S. and the Soviet Union would commit through 1994 not to withdraw from the Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty.

- This commitment would be contingent on implementation of agreed START reductions, i.e., fifty percent cuts to equal levels of 1600 strategic nuclear delivery vehicles and 6000 warheads, with appropriate sublimits, over seven years from entry into force of a START agreement.

-- The agreement would not alter the sovereign rights of the parties under customary international law to withdraw in the event of material breach of the agreement or jeopardy to their supreme interests.

-- After 1994, either side could deploy defensive systems of its choosing, unless mutually agreed otherwise.

To build mutual confidence by further enhancing predictability in the area of strategic defense, and in response to stated Soviet concerns, we are also proposing that the U.S. and the Soviet Union annually exchange data on their planned strategic defense activities. We also seek to have the US and USSR carry out reciprocal briefings on their respective strategic defense efforts and visits to associated research facilities, as we have proposed in our Open Laboratories Initiative. In addition, we have proposed establishing mutually agreed procedures for reciprocal observation of strategic defense testing.

Since the April 23 opening of the INF negotiations in Geneva, there have been some new developments in these talks. Last week, the Soviet Union presented a detailed draft INF treaty text which now joins our own draft text on the negotiating table. We are studying carefully the Soviet proposal and requesting the Soviets to clarify some important points in their text.

The Soviet proposal appears to reflect the agreements General Secretary Gorbachev and I made at Reykjavik on longer-range INF missile limits and to accept the principle of global equality between our two countries in regard to shorter-range INF missile systems (SRINF).

Nevertheless, important issues remain to be resolved before an INF agreement can be concluded, including verification and shorter-range INF missiles. Verification is a particularly crucial issue. While the Soviet draft indicates that they will seek agreement in some basic areas which we require for effective verification, they have yet to provide the all-important details which are essential to working out an effective verification regime. In addition, they have not met our requirements for inspection of sites suspected of violations of an INF agreement.

Another major issue is that of shorter-range INF missile systems. We and our Allies continue to insist that an agreement on these systems must be bilateral in nature, global in scope, concurrent with an initial INF treaty and effectively verifiable. In addition, Soviet efforts to include the missiles of any country other than the US and USSR are patently unacceptable. We are continuing our close consultations with our allies in Europe and Asia on SRINF and other INF issues.

Our negotiators in Geneva -- led by Ambassadors Max Kampelman, Mike Glitman and Ron Lehman -- have done an excellent job and they continue to have very full agendas. We are well prepared for hard bargaining, and we are resolved to do our part to bring about -- for the first time in history -- actual reductions in nuclear weapons. It is up to the Soviets now to demonstrate similar determination to move ahead on these important issues.

There is one final point which I want to emphasize. Despite all the progress that has been made in Geneva, there are events occurring right here at home which could destroy the groundwork which we have laid so carefully in bringing the Soviets back to the negotiating table and getting them to negotiate seriously for the first time on deep reductions in our respective nuclear arsenals. An effort has been made by some Members of the House of Representatives to attach to the Defense Authorization Bill amendments on arms control which would pull the rug out from under our negotiators and undermine our most vital defense programs -- such as our Strategic Defense Initiative. And now it seems that some Senators want to move in the same direction.

Therefore, let there be no mistake about it: I will veto any bill which cuts back our ability to defend ourselves and leaves the Soviet Union free to continue its military buildup.

Verification is a particularly crucial issue. While the Soviet draft indicates that they will seek agreement in some basic areas which we require for effective verification, they have yet to provide the all-important details which are essential to working out an effective verification regime. In addition, they have not met our requirements for inspection of sites suspected of violations of an INF agreement.

Another major issue is that of shorter-range INF missile systems. We and our Allies continue to insist that an agreement on these systems must be bilateral in nature, global in scope, concurrent with an initial INF treaty and effectively verifiable. In addition, Soviet efforts to include the missiles of any country other than the US and USSR are patently unacceptable. It is up to the Soviets now to demonstrate similar determination to move ahead on these important issues.

There is one final point which I want to emphasize. Despite all the progress that has been made in Geneva, there are events occurring right here at home which could destroy the groundwork which we have laid so carefully in bringing the Soviets back to the negotiating table and getting them to negotiate seriously for the first time on deep reductions in our respective nuclear arsenals. An effort has been made by some Members of the House of Representatives to attach to the Defense Authorization Bill amendments on arms control which would pull the rug out from under our negotiators and undermine our most vital defense programs -- such as our Strategic Defense Initiative. 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



As requested, this office has reviewed the proposed Presidential statement to be issued in connection with tomorrow's opening in Geneva of the eighth round of START and strategic defense talks with the Soviet Union.

The description of the draft statement of the proposal to be placed on the table tomorrow in the Defense and Space area may be flawed. It implies that, under the proposal, deployment of SDI at any time prior to 1994 would be prohibited. In fact, the proposal, as described in the first "bullet" at the bottom of page 1, would merely commit the United States not to withdraw from the ABM Treaty until 1994. Since under the so-called "broad" interpretation of the ABM Treaty, early deployment of SDI is not prohibited even at this time, we should create no implication that deployment might be delayed under the proposal unless that is the intent.

For this reason, the last "bullet," which appears at the top of page 2, should be rewritten as follows:

-- After 1994, either side could deploy defensive systems theretofore prohibited by the Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty, unless mutually agreed otherwise.

Thank you for bringing this matter to our attention.

PRESIDENTIAL STATEMENT

Opening of START AND D & S NEGOTIATING GROUPS - NST

Tomorrow marks the opening in Geneva of the eighth round in our negotiations with the Soviet Union on strategic arms reductions and strategic defense issues. With the negotiations on intermediate-range nuclear forces having resumed on April 23, all three negotiating groups of the Nuclear and Space Talks will now be underway.

TO

The United States remains fully committed to achieving deep, equitable, verifiable and stabilizing reductions in the U.S. and Soviet nuclear arsenals. During his meetings in Moscow last month, Secretary Shultz made progress that moved us closer to such reductions. We are determined to build on this progress.

Since the early days of my Administration, our number one arms control objective has been the achievement of significant and verifiable reductions of offensive nuclear forces -- particularly the most destabilizing weapons, fast-flying ballistic missiles.

I have directed our U.S. START Negotiator to intensify efforts to reach agreement on reducing strategic offensive nuclear arms by fifty percent. Toward that end, the United States ~~intends to~~ *will* table shortly a draft START treaty text. This text will reflect the basic agreements on strategic arms reductions reached by General Secretary Gorbachev and myself in our meeting at Reykjavik last October. It will be responsive as well to Soviet concerns expressed subsequent to Reykjavik, and will provide ample basis for the creation of a fair and durable START agreement.

We have made great progress in START. I am firmly convinced that a START Agreement is within our grasp, even this year, if the Soviets are prepared to resolve the remaining outstanding issues. And most important among these issues is the need, for the purpose of ensuring strategic stability, to place sublimits on ballistic missile warheads.

We will likewise be making a new move in the Defense and Space area. Our negotiators return to Geneva ready to place on the negotiating table the new U.S. proposal which Secretary Shultz discussed during his Moscow meetings. This new proposal incorporates the following elements:

-- Both the U.S. and the Soviet Union would commit through 1994 not to withdraw from the Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty.
