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

Dear Jim:

Thank you so much for your thoughtful letter and keeping me up to date on New Zealand. I was even more surprised than you at the calling of an early election and the results. Needless to say, I was pleased that you personally were reelected and able to maintain a strong voice in the Parliament.

Your report of the strong anti-American sentiment, as well as the recent actions by the new government, are distressing. We have long maintained excellent relations with both New Zealand and Australia and we are anxious to do everything we can to keep that alliance strong.

The public opinion polls here in the United States are most encouraging for a strong renewed mandate for the President. Of great interest to many of us here in Washington is how the congressional elections for both the House and the Senate will turn out. Many Americans adopt the practice of ticket splitting, voting for a presidential candidate from one party and a senator or congressman from the other party. This is in the great American tradition of not allowing concentrations of power, but it creates great difficulties in developing workable majorities to govern effectively.

As always, it was great to hear from you and I wish you the best during the coming months. Please let me know if you have any plans to visit the United States. I hope there is an opportunity for me to travel to New Zealand in the not-too-distant future.

Dear Mr Shultz,

I enclose a Brochure outlining the salient points of a Scheme which from February 1, 1985 will be available to service Foreign Business and Academic Tour Groups visiting New Zealand to investigate its Economy, Business Activity and domestic patterns and structures.

The New Zealand Government is aware of it and supports its method and purpose.

Its availability is being made known to U.S. Chambers of Commerce, other Trade and Industry Associations, Professional Bodies and the Academic Community particularly in the Western and North-Eastern States where trade links with New Zealand are strongest.

It also presents the U.S. Government with a low-key means of maintaining and enhancing friendly relations with New Zealand, despite the foreign policy differences which currently exist between the two countries at Government level. It will give access to well-informed private Commentators on current New Zealand policies in trade and other areas.

Along with many other New Zealanders, I believe that the mutual interests of both Countries would not be well served if the U.S. Government were to react antagonistically to the present activities of the New Zealand anti-nuclear lobby. Some elements in that lobby seek to provoke that kind of reaction so that the historical relationship between the two Countries will be destroyed. Instead the U.S. Government should seek to reinforce the relationship in friendly unobtrusive ways.

In this regard the Scheme's availability is very timely. If you see it so then may I unashamedly suggest that you use the influence of your position to encourage U.S. Groups and indeed U.S. Government agencies to take advantage of it.

In the present context my self-interest in the Scheme is not the dominant consideration. My main concern is to see the Scheme sufficiently used in the National interest of our two Countries, to reinforce their association with each other.

I intend to soon establish like Schemes in Sydney and Melbourne and will let your Department know when they too are in place. They will operate co-ordinately with the New Zealand Scheme so that U.S. Groups (and others) can obtain in the one visit an overall appreciation of Australasian policies and attitudes as well as those in the separate Countries of the region.

Please let me know if you want any more information about the Scheme.

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

Dear Senator Cohen:

I am responding to your letter of January 31, addressed to President Reagan, in which you recommend that the United States take strong action in response to New Zealand's decision to deny access to a U.S. naval vessel.

Just for the record, I would like to review a little of the background that has led up to this issue and then describe some of the actions we have already taken.

New Zealand's membership in ANZUS has been the cornerstone of its foreign and defense policies for 34 years. Along with Australia, it has been the only US alliance partner to have fought with US forces in all four major conflicts in this century.

However, the Labour government's decision to ban visits to New Zealand by all nuclear powered and nuclear armed ships effectively denies access to all US Navy vessels because of the US policy neither to confirm nor deny (NCND) the presence of nuclear arms on any ship. Moreover, some 40% of US Navy combatant vessels are nuclear powered.

Our dialogue with the GNZ since last July has been aimed at gaining acceptance of our NCND policy and restoring full access to New Zealand ports. That effort has failed. Prime Minister Lange announced on February 4, just after your letter was written, that New Zealand would not accept a visit by USS Buchanan, a conventionally powered destroyer which we had proposed for a March visit in conjunction with the ANZUS exercise "Sea Eagle".

We have made very clear to the New Zealand Government, and stated publicly on several occasions, that the United States considers this decision a matter of grave concern which affects the core of our mutual obligations as allies. While we have great affection for the people of New Zealand, a breakdown of alliance systems through the failure of partners to share burdens and risks increases the potential for regional and global conflict. The Secretary emphasized during the visit to Washington of Australian Prime Minister Hawke that "... those who value freedom have to be willing and prepared to defend it."

While making clear to the GNZ that its decision not only undermines the effectiveness of ANZUS, we have also warned that it has broader implications as well. Our allies have expressed concern about the New Zealand position and have been generally supportive of our efforts to restore full port access in New Zealand. Prime Minister Hawke particularly, in a letter to Prime Minister Lange, emphasized that alliances do not permit different obligations for different members.

We have already taken specific action, also since your letter was written, to demonstrate the depth of our concern. We have announced our decision not to participate in "Sea Eagle", which Australia has since cancelled, and have cancelled or restructured several other military exercises and exchanges. We have announced also that we are examining the implications of the New Zealand decision for our overall cooperation with New Zealand under ANZUS. Finally, we have stated our willingness to develop further our cooperation with Australia under ANZUS.

The full effect of our response will be evident as our review proceeds, but I think you will agree that we are already giving clear indications of our concern. We hope, however, to retain at least the framework of ANZUS in the event that New Zealand comes to understand the desirability of reviewing its position and resuming its proper role as a full partner in ANZUS.

While we are prepared to take all necessary action to readjust our relationship with New Zealand in recognition of the new reality that its actions have imposed upon us, at the same time we will continue to describe New Zealand as a friend. We have, for example, made clear that it is not our intention to "punish" New Zealand for its decision or to impose trade sanctions on it. Our response is directed primarily at the defense/security area.

As the President stated on February 7: "It's our deepest hope that New Zealand will restore the traditional cooperation that has existed between our two countries. Allies must work together as partners to meet their shared responsibilities." In that spirit, we will work with New Zealand toward a review of its position and full resumption of its participation in ANZUS.

Dear Mr. President:

It is my understanding that New Zealand Prime Minister David Lange announced today and will formally notify the United States tomorrow that his government will deny a request for a port call by a U.S. naval vessel unless the U.S. states that the ship is not carrying nuclear weapons. As you are aware, the U.S., for vital security reasons, maintains a policy of neither confirming nor denying the presence or absence of nuclear weapons on board Navy ships.

No nation has a moral corner or monopoly on the fear of nuclear war. But to be aware and fearful of nuclear war is not enough. Nor is it sufficient to adopt policies that serve notice of one's fear if those policies do not reduce but, rather, increase the chance of nuclear war. This is precisely the course New Zealand appears to be following.

If New Zealand is unwilling to bear the burdens of defending freedom, it should not enjoy the benefits of our effort and that of Australia to defend it for them. If it chooses to take unilateral action to demonstrate its opposition to the existence of nuclear weapons, then it raises the question of whether it is prepared to defend itself unilaterally -- not only its national security but its national economy as well.

I would prefer to be more delicate and diplomatic in approaching the national and moral sensibilities of an allied nation. Barring a change in the stated policy of the New Zealand Government, however, I am compelled to recommend that we explore the following actions:

- 1. Form a bilateral security treaty with the Government of Australia;
- 2. Preclude New Zealand from participating in military and related activities with the United States;
- 3. Exercise our right to withdraw from New Zealand the benefit of an injury test extended to it under the GATT Subsidies

Code, effective April 1, 1985, when New Zealand will no longer be in compliance with its obligations under the Code.

Having discussed it with colleagues, I know that this matter is of bipartisan concern within the Congress and will be receiving increasing attention. I believe the recommendations outlined above to be reasonable and urge your prompt consideration.

Dear Mr. Moorhead:

I am responding to your note of February 20, addressed to the White House, concerning a letter from your constituent Mr. Paul Taylor, who expressed disappointment that the New Zealand government has banned visits by US ships that are capable of carrying nuclear arms. Mr. Taylor recommended that the US embargo all New Zealand exports to the US.

By way of background on this issue, New Zealand has been a member of the ANZUS alliance since 1951. It is the only US alliance partner besides Australia to have fought with US forces in all four major conflicts in this century.

However, the Labour government's decision to ban visits to New Zealand by all nuclear-powered and nuclear-armed ships effectively denies access to all US Navy vessels. This is because the US can neither confirm nor deny (NCND) the presence of nuclear arms on any ship. Moreover, some 40% of US Navy combatant vessels are nuclear powered.

Our dialogue with the GNZ since last July has been aimed at gaining acceptance of our NCND policy and restoring full access to New Zealand ports. At the same time, we made every effort to avoid any semblance of pressure on the New Zealand government or threat of trade or economic sanctions.

These discussions, however, failed to produce a mutually acceptable resolution of the port access issue. On February 4, Prime Minister Lange announced that New Zealand would not approve a visit by the <u>USS Buchanan</u>, a conventionally-powered destroyer which we had proposed in conjunction with the <u>ANZUS</u> exercise "Sea Eagle" scheduled for March.

This decision goes to the core of our mutual obligations as allies. Our ability to exercise with New Zealand forces depends in large part on port access. Refueling and replenishment, as well as shore leave, are critical factors on long voyages. In crisis situations, the US may be unable to fulfill ANZUS treaty obligations in this maritime region without port access. Of broader concern, such a breakdown of alliance systems through the failure of partners to share burdens and risks reduces the effectiveness of ANZUS and increases the potential for regional and global conflict.

We share the New Zealanders' concern about the threat of nuclear war and have emphasized our deep desire to reduce and eventually eliminate nuclear weapons. In recognition of their concern, we sent a special envoy to New Zealand to brief Prime Minister Lange after our January talks with the Soviets in Geneva. However, the New Zealand decision harms, rather than helps, our efforts to achieve these critical arms control objectives in negotiations with the Soviets.

In response to New Zealand's decision, the US has withdrawn from "Sea Eagle," which Australia since cancelled, and has cancelled or restructured a number of other military exercises and exchanges. The US and Australia have also agreed that, since New Zealand is unwilling to meet its responsibilities to its alliance partners on this issue, the ANZUS Council meeting planned for this summer should be postponed. Instead, we have announced that Secretary Shultz will hold separate talks with Australia. We believe these measures demonstrate clearly that the US does expect its allies to share in the risks and burdens of the alliance.

The US has taken these measures with deep regret in an effort to adjust our relationship to the operational changes in the alliance imposed by the New Zealand Government. However, we still regard New Zealand as a friend. It is not our intention to "punish" New Zealand for its decision or to impose trade sanctions on it. We hope to retain the framework of ANZUS in the event that New Zealand decides to review its position and to resume its role as a full partner in the alliance.

The President said February 7 that, "It's our deepest hope that New Zealand will restore the traditional cooperation that has existed between our two countries. Allies must work together as partners to meet their shared responsibilities." Our meeting with Prime Minister Lange in Los Angeles on February 26 reflected our intention to work with the New Zealand Government to that end.

This letter will serve to voice our disappointment on the action the New Zealand Government has taken about our naval vessels equipped with atomic weaponry stopping at their ports. We well remember how anxious New Zealand was to join up in the South Pacific Treaty with countries like Australia. The United States has given them our assurance that we would defend them in the event of any military operation against them.

In view of New Zealand's poor judgment and short-sightedness we heartily recommend that you take a position to place an embargo on all New Zealand products now being sold in the United States. All our farmers have keen competition and could certainly do without the competition from New Zealand in dairy and meat products.
