

REAGAN JOINS JFK LIBRARY BENEFIT

By DEBURAH ORIN WASHINGTON — President Reagan joined the Kennedy clan last night for a special fundraiser for the John F. Kennedy Library.

The guest list for the bash at Sen. Ted Kennedy's McLean, Va., house featured Jacques line Kennedy Onsesis, her children Caroline and John Jr., a host of other Kennedys, top Democrats, movie men and other high-powered folks, who raised \$2 mil-

They heard the President praise JFK as an "unforgettable" leader who knew that America's enemies "weren't about to be put off by soft reasoning and good intentions."

Standing nearby was freed TWA hostage Ar-thur Targentaids of Brockton Main. — a re-

minder that Reagan himself was undergoing a test of leadership.

Everyone listened in solemn silence as the President, accompanied by Nancy, said JFK lived his life with joy.

There were plenty of knowing chuckles when he recalled that Kennedy "could cuss a blue streak — but then he had been a sailor."

The bash was billed as nonpolitical, but among the guests who pledged a minimum of \$25,000 apiece were many who had contributed to Ken-

nedy campaigns from John to Bobby to Ted. In return, they got a copy of a letter JFK had written as a boy to his father, Joseph P. Kennedy. asking for a 40-cent raise in his allowance.



In reference to your request that we think of ways to keep the President's tax plan "alive" media-wise while he is at the ranch for the 4th of July, I suggest that we do a number of local radio interviews with proven "friends" on Saturday, July 29 immediately following the radio address via telephone-- embargoed until Monday, July 1.

The President would still be in a "working" frame of mind-- less likely to be too casual and caught off-guard-- and we would get mileage from the interviews well into the week while nothing else is going on.

A similar plan was considered last summer, and the interviews were cancelled at the last minute because Mr. Deaver feared that the President, who at that point had been at the ranch for almost a week, was too relaxed. There were five very disppointed radio reporters that day-- each promised an interview at a later date, which has never happened.

The reporters I have in mind for this would agree to any ground rules we establish. One of those I have in mind is part of the Washington Broadcast News organization— with satellite transmission to hundreds of stations. Another feeds to every Hispanic station in the nation, and he would be focusing on family issues. What I am trying to say is that the potential is great, and the whole thing would take less than one hour of the President's time.

The networks would quote from the interviews, as they do from the Saturday radio speeches. By imposing a July I embargo, we wouldn't take any thunder away from the Saturday radio address.

Elizabeth and I are ready to go to work on this immediately.

On another matter, I wish to call your attention once again, to our proposal for a town meeting in Northeastern Massachusetts. Attached please find a copy of the detailed memo I submitted on May 31. I trust you can bring this up during the scheduling meeting.

By way of introduction, I am a cousin of Jim and Charlotte Ramage, who, of course, are your kinsmen from Atlanta and I also work for Congressman Bill Nichols of Alabama whose wife, Carolyn, you know.

I wanted to tell you how very much I enjoyed the NBC program which featured you last week. After having returned from a trip to both East and West Germany, and a dialogue with officials in both countries, I thought your remarks were extremely perceptive that the President and Secretary Gorbachev get together and talk and exchange ideas without necessarily having a specified agenda. I went with a group of Capitol Hill people and we had discussions with some members of the East German Central Committee both formally and informally. I thought this was a very beneficial way to try and understand each other inspite of the fact that we have substantial differences of political philosophy. I returned home convinced that if more Members of Congress and the President get to know leaders inside the Soviet Union, then over the long haul, tensions could be reduced between the East and the West.

I believe your remarks correctly perceive this same concept, recognizing that it is imperative that the United States and the Soviet Union avoid a nuclear holocaust.

Charlotte and Jim stayed at my house here in Washington on several occasions when they visited you and the President, and have greatly appreciated the hospitality which you have extended to them.



1) It is a good idea to get more mileage out of the radio address by airing it on television. One obstacle is funding. David Caldwell told me on the phone that he is uncertain whether or not USA Network or WTBS would pay for production and satellite costs. Caldwell asked about White House funding for the project, but I do not think that is appropriate.

However, once the address is open to cameras, the television networks may want to pool it, as they now do the radio address. I think they would be interested in coverage since the address often makes the evening news and they now have no pictures to go with it. If the networks pooled it, that would take care of the production costs but not the satellite time. My hope would be that cable network(s) would satellite it so that the address could be seen in its entirety in at least cable homes.

I should also point out that the President is usually dressed informally for the radio address - a work shirt at the ranch and riding clothes at Camp David. I feel that he does not need a suit to look presidential, and it would be a lot to ask him to dress up every Saturday for a five minute address. We would also have to do a little work on the conference room at Camp David to make it better for cameras.

If you think it is appropriate at this time, I will call the network bureau chiefs to inquire if they would be interested in videotaping the radio address.

Caldwell is right about teleconferencing and we need to do more of it. There are several types of teleconferencing we should be doing. Participate with taped or live messages in teleconferences held between organizations and their members. Use a teleconference-type hook up so that local TV anchors in five to seven different markets can interview the President in one session (as done in 1984 with the Local Program Network). Reach local legislators, "town meetings", etc. on legislation important to the President.

Ideas like this have to be part of the long range planning process. (FYI - The Television Office has never been consulted by the WH Office for Communications Planning.)

3) The suggestion of cablecast reports reminds me of what George Merliss wants to do. (More on that in my Merliss update.) It is a good idea, except the part about "the White House using today's technology to present its perspective on events." As I have told you, I do not think it would be successful for the White House to present its perspective, but if someone else would satellite speeches, briefings, etc. in their entirety our work would be done without the taint of our close involvement.

Dear Mr. Buchanan:

Thanks for your April 10 response to my previous letter, regarding teleconferencing, etc.

In looking at the proposals we sent last year, they were designed primarily around re-election objectives. In a second term, we would suggest the following applications:

- 1) A weekly cablecast of the Saturday radio broadcast, via The USA Network or WTBS, Atlanta. Since the cable networks are not (yet) under the same Sec. 315 constraints as broadcasters, it offers an opportunity for the President to report weekly to cable subscribers (now over 50% of Americans) without network editing or comment, and probably without the obligatory equal time reply. Perhaps more importantly, TV stations could be encouraged to use the pieces for weekend news, as they all have downlinks by now.
- 2) Teleconferencing has a number of applications. It is relativly inexpensive to extend Presidential (and other Administration)
 appearances to just about anywhere in the world, from the
 White House, the ranch, or anywhere else. One-on-one meetings,
 (secure if desired) with two-way sound and picture, are also
 cost effective, and just about as good as face-to-face.
- 3) Cablecast reports on special events, such as the upcoming European trip, would seem to be a particularly innovative means of balancing the networks' coverage. We see no reason why the White House shouldn't use today's technology to present its perspective on such events. By using the "long form," the President's views would be set in context, thus balancing, to some extent, the networks' tendency to abbreviate and over-simplify.

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



Q Treasury Secretary James Baker is in our Washington studio this morning with NBC News Economic Correspondent, Irving R. Levine, and good morning.

Mr. Secretary, as a former White House Chief of Staff, you're, of course, very close to the President. I will assume, that like the Vice President, you have not seen the President personally since his diagnosis of cancer, have you?

SECRETARY BAKER: That's correct.

Q

Q Have you had any -- any kind of connection at all, telephone or note?

SECRETARY BAKER: Well, I've communicated with the First Lady, and I've spent a fair amount of time yesterday with the Vice President, with the President's Chief of Staff.

Q And what word are you getting? The same that we're getting publicly?

SECRETARY BAKER: Yes. The President's doing very, very well. In fact, he's chomping at the bit to get back to work.

Q When you need to see the President, who do you see instead?

SECRETARY BAKER: Well, if I needed to see the President, I would pick up the phone and call the White House and make arrangements to see the President. But, you know, I'm reminded, Jane, of the similar circumstances in 1981, and I think the best thing those of us in the Cabinet can do who don't have a pressing need to see the President is give him time to recover and recouperate and get back on the job.

Q Secretary Baker, the President's illness comes at a time when the budget deficit reduction effort is at a deadlock. Is the President's absence from the scene likely to retard any chance of a compromise?

SECRETARY BAKER: Well, I hope not, Irving. But, obviously, it's not helpful to have the President, to some degree, out of action, although he's able to communicate by telephone, and his messages can be passed through, as they were, indeed, yesterday. Don Regan met yesterday morning with the budget negotiators for a period of time, with direct instructions from the President.

Q Well, is sympathy in the Congress for the President likely to help move things along? Is that a factor?

SECRETARY BAKER: I think it might be a factor.

Q Now, yesterday, the Democrats came up with a \$273 billion deficit-reducing package which is less than the \$295 billion which the Senate Republicans passed. Is this acceptable to the administration?

SECRETARY BAKER: Well, it would be far better if we'd get the full close to \$300 billion that we're seeking over three years so we can get that deficit down to under two percent of gross national product in 1988. But, obviously, is it acceptable? Is it acceptable as against what? As against getting something less or getting nothing? Clearly, then it would be acceptable. But I think it's important that we get every bit as much deficit reduction as we

can.

Q So you're saying that if that's all the Democrats will give, that's what you'll take.

SECRETARY BAKER: No, I'm not saying that, because that's a decision for the President to make. What I'm really saying is we want as much as we can get.

Q Now, again, the President's illness, is the tax reform package passage dependent in a crucial way on the President being able in the fall to undertake the campaign around the country on behalf of that program --

SECRETARY BAKER: Yes.

Q -- that has been planned?

SECRETARY BAKER: It's very important that the President be able to campaign vigorously for tax reform, as he was able to do at the time we launched it and for two or three weeks thereafter.

Q Can you rule out that at some point the administration will have to accept a tax increase in order to get the deficit down to some kind of a significant level?

SECRETARY BAKER: I can rule out any interest or inclination whatsoever on the part of the administration to accept a tax increase. We've just had a national referendum with respect to a tax increase. The American people spoke loudly and clearly. The President won 49 states, as a consequence. And I want to tell you, he is absolutely firm against any suggestion of a tax increase.

Q Is there any real prospect of reaching a budget compromise before the Congress goes off on vacation in August?

SECRETARY BAKER: I would hope so, and I certainly believe there is, yes. I know they're continuing to work vigorously toward that.

Q Now, as you know, there's a move in Congress to impose a 25 percent surcharge on imports, principally from countries like Japan, which discriminate against our exports. What's the administration view on that?

SECRETARY BAKER: We would not favor that. That's protectionism in its -- I suppose -- suppose it's rankest form, and -- We've been through this before, back in the 1930's and we suffered for it, and the entire world suffered for it, as a matter of fact. And we've got to find a way to resist protectionism. But, at the same time, we've got to be strong and firm in requiring trading partners, like Japan, to give us the same access to their markets that they have to ours. It's got to be a two-way street.

Q Well, let's see whether that two-way street develops. And thank you very much, Secretary Baker --

Randall Robinson, a Harvard-trained lawyer, is the Director of Trans-Africa, a U.S. organization which lobbies its prescription of U.S. foreign policy regarding Africa. He is the brother of Max Robinson, the ABC television commentator. Trans-Africa's prescription is often radical and even racial in tone, and sometimes deliberately misleading.

The "facts" he cites on page 11 are grossly inaccurate (for instance, U.S. private investment is less than \$3 billion, not the \$15 billion he cites -- we have also maintained a military arms embargo toward South Africa since 1963, pre-dating the UN-mandated sanctions by 14 years). The problem is that Robinson knows better, but frequent attempts by various U.S. officials to correct the record or to encourage Robinson to be more moderate have been unsuccessful. Unfortunately, he probably would capitalize on any White House response as a pretext for further publicity and accusations. For these reasons, the NSC does not believe a White House response would be useful or productive. We are, however, sending Robinson's remarks to the State Department and suggesting that they respond directly to Robinson to correct the record, one more time.



LARRY: There is a dynamic new leader on the American scene.

He is Randall Robinson, Executive Director of Trans Africa and he's my guest tonight on Larry King Let's Talk straight ahead right here on Channel 7.

LARRY: Our special guest tonight on Larry King Let's Talk is Randall Robinson, Executive Director of Trans Africa. Was Harvard law school, as you guys read it, all it's cracked up to be? Is it equal to its image?

RANDALL: Yeah, I think in many ways yes and some ways no.

RANDALL: Oh I didn't expect Harvard to look like it looked. It's not all that terribly attractive. It's sort of crowded into the center of Cambridge and that was a little shocking. Uhhh you'd heard so much about it all your life, but academically, it was as invigorating as I expected it to be.

LARRY KING INTERVIEW WITH RANDALL ROBINSON

RANDALL: Well, to tell you the truth Larry, I majored in sociology. As many people who majored in sociology do, you go to law school because you haven't quite figured out what you want to do and I think after the first year in law school, I knew that I didn't want to practice law.

LARRY:

You knew that.

RANDALL: Yes, but law school, I think, prepares you to do a lot of things and I've never been sorry that I went although I knew very shortly that I would never practice law.

LARRY: Then why'd you stay?

RANDALL: (pause) Well, I think it prepares you to understand how the country works, how the systems work. It prepares you... law school helps you to learn how to think sequentially uhhh with efficiency ummm and that sort of thing, so you finish what you start.

LARRY:

No regrets.

RANDALL:

No.

LARRY:

You never took a bar exam.

RANDALL: Yes, I'm a member of the Massachusetts bar.

LARRY: Is that required, by the way, at Harvard? Do you

have to take it?

RANDALL: No, no, no, no.

LARRY: You worked also later on for Congressman Diggs, did

you not?

RANDALL: Yes, I came to Washington, oh now, about nine years ago, worked first for Congressman Bill Gray - no, Bill Clay - then worked for the Lawyers Committee uhhh on civil rights and the law and then went to Charles Diggs as his administrative assistant and got involved in foreign affairs there.

LARRY: How do you view what happened to Congressman Diggs in your own personal career scheme of things?

RANDALL: Oh I think it was terribly unfortunate, a regretable thing in many ways. Uhhh Charles Diggs is a fine man and a real road paver for the black community and foreign affairs. There's no one involved in matters uhhh like I'm involved in who at one time or another didn't have some contact with Charles Diggs.

LARRY:

Were you surprised at what happened?

RANDALL:

Of course I was surprised.

LARRY:

How's he doing now?

RANDALL: He's doing fine, he's doing fine. He ummm he supports this effort. He's made a remarkable recovery. He's got a lot of starch in him and a lot of courage.

LARRY: What got Randall Robinson interested in things out of the United States? Most black leaders, I guess, maybe we tend to tin-type this who come along, we imagine as involved in things domestic.

RANDALL: It's really hard to explain its genesis. Uhhh when I was a child, I was interested in Africa. I was always interested in politics and some of the things I remember following. I remember following the Suez crisis and I was only 12 or 13 years old at the time and uhhh, so it gives you a sense of how far back your interest goes in foreign affairs, but always in Africa - how we came to these shores, ummm, Africa's difficulty under colonialism, it's emergence from that, our national relationship to it.

LARRY: And that was of more interest to you than say Selma, Alabama?

RANDALL: No, well of course, I'm from Richmond, Virginia and I had a good deal of interest in hurdles we had to negotiate in the South. Those were very difficult and painful battles to fight then. But at the same time, I always understood that uhhh our problem as black people was not a problem confined to the shores and that to the extent we saw ourselves as part of a larger hole, part of a global African community and understanding what foes we faced and the relationship between the foes we'd be stronger for it.

LARRY: Do you ever feel that feeling of that you were brought here against your will? I mean is that ever a conscious feeling, that my people came to this country against our will?

RANDALL: Oh of course.

LARRY: It lives and breathes with you even three generations.

RANDALL: Of course. I recently, oh about five years ago, went to (unclear place) with my children and we were on the Isle of Goray and I took the children there and on the Isle of Goray, you have a slave house where people like Phyllis Wheatley were

held and then there's a door that leads to the ocean where slaves boarded the ships and I told my children that's how we got to the United States. But one can't stand in a place like that without being very moved by it. We lost perhaps 50 million people on route to the United States. So many of us suffered and died and we suffered under the most terrible discrimination and experience here so that my travel and my experience and my reading makes me appreciate how important it is to collapse the centuries and understand how you belong to it all.

LARRY: When did you, this South African thing, begin to center Trans Africa's center on it?

RANDALL: Well, we spent a good deal of time on this issue for a long time. Trans Africa's eight years old...

LARRY: Because a major news issue, it's always been there, but why the last year?

RANDALL: That's more a question for news people to answer than us. It's not as if we haven't been trying. I think uhhh what made the difference was the arrest at the South African Embassy on November 21, but we've been making efforts for years to focus American attention on this issue, the extent of which people in South Africa have to live under these conditions of hopeless,

rightless, landless and have this kind of system under pinned by own public and private sectors. Uhhh, this is the kind of thing we have worked on for many many years and only with the avenue of arrest as a last, almost desperate effort to have the country look at it. People are suffering so.

LARRY: Is the truth of the matter then that one must do an overt act based on this media to gain attention - get arrested, protest, march does something.

RANDALL: Well, let's say that seems to be the case in this case. I think that overall, if you do a colonist analysis, comparative analysis, that African issues in general have been inadequately covered by print and electronic media and I think the real consequence of that can be seen in our foreign policy - that Americans know very very little about the third world, about anything west of Los Angeles and east of Washington, D.C., not much about Canada, less about Mexico because media don't cover these issues as they should and then crises pop up around the world and the American people are not prepared to understand them.

LARRY: I thought we were doing another geography.

RANDALL: Precisely.

LARRY: Ummm, how did you get the idea to march within 500 feet of an embassy?

Well, I ummm had a discussion with my board chairman, RANDALL: Richard Hatcher, about a week before we went to the embassy. We were real concerned, angered, about the South African arrests of the entire labor leadership, that they were being held under Section 29 of the Internal Security Act means that you cannot seek council, you're uncharged, nobody knows whether you're alive or dead and the Reagan administration in the wake of these arrests and the wake of killing some 200 men, women and children - in the wake of all of this, the Reagan administration refused to support resolution of moderate condemnation in the U.N. Security Council and I talked to Dick Hatcher and we decided that we had to do something, we had to exhaust every measure to have the nation look at this awful injustice, this awful unfairness, and I asked FAUNT MEN and Marion Barry to go to the embassy with me and we made certain demands to the Ambassador and simply told him we wouldn't leave.

LARRY: You met with Ambassador Fourie?

RANDALL: We met with the Ambassador and told him that prisoners of the long-term and short-term political prisoners in South Africa had to be freed and those people comprising the respected black leadership in that country had to be assembled in the constitutional

convention to negotiate a constitution that would at long last give blacks the right to vote in a free and Democratic society. He said which we told him to convey that to his president and we wouldn't leave the embassy until we got the right answers. He left the room and came back a half hour later and said that which we would be ordered to leave or we'd be arrested, and we were, and since then, some 25 hundred Americans have been arrested in 23 cities.

LARRY: So the happening occurred out of that meeting.

RANDALL: The happening occured out of that meeting.

LARRY: Ambassador Fourie, on this program, said that he's always open to have you come to the door and come in and talk to him about issues. That this parading in front is timed each day to certain times that television cameras arive, the arrests are profunctory and released, etc., that it's a charade and he's willing to meet with any of the protestors at any time, that's what he said.

RANDALL: Well, you see the point is not a meeting with the Ambassador, that's not the ummm an end to be achieved. The end to be achieved is a just society in South Africa - unless that government sits down and negotiates in good faith with leaders

of the black majority towards the one person, one vote democratic state. Uhhh, scuttles apartheid.

LARRY: What do the arrests accomplish?

RANDALL: The arrests accomplish public attention...

LARRY: That wanes, right? It wasn't on the news today.

RANDALL: It wasn't on the news today, but so many things are. Couples in South Africa and Newsweek gives it front page coverage. The Congress introduces bills. We're now at long last getting the kind of public understanding and analysis that this issue so richly deserves. It's in our national interest to do this because what's going to happen if we don't? South Africa is a powder keg and sooner or later, it's going to blow up. We don't want to find ourselves on the wrong side of that issue. What's going to happen is this: unless we get whites to come to the table, sit down and negotiate in good faith, we're going to have a blood bath and that's going to destroy everything.

LARRY: We will have a blood bath.

RANDALL: We will have a blood bath.

LARRY: We'll be right back with Randall Robinson, Executive Director of Trans Africa here on Larry King Let's Talk after this.

LARRY: With Randall Robinson, Executive Director of Trans

Africa. Why hasn't the government formally charged all these

people breaking the law as you admit you're doing by stepping within

500 feet of the embassy?

Well, the Justice Department, the State Department, RANDALL: the White House, the South African government simply don't want trials. They don't want this issue opened up, they don't want public debate. It's because our national policy of support for South Africa and very concrete and very quantifiable ways is simply indefensible. Ummm, the Reagan administration doesn't want a lot of public discussion about the 25 hundred shock batons they allowed to be exported to the South African military and police for control of the black majority. They don't want Americans to know that we have exported to South Africa over the last four years a hundred million dollars in military use items, or that we yield to that nation in hard currency if half billion dollars a year in revenues from the sale of krugerans in this country. Or that we share intelligence data with South African intelligence agencies on other African countries. They don't want it revealed that we've got a 15 billion dollar private sector stake there.

LARRY: Would you stop all dealings with any stock companies from dealing with them at all?

RANDALL: The companies need to pack up and get out as quickly as possible.

LARRY: But don't those companies pay blacks salaries?

The point is you talk about 70 thousand blacks who RANDALL: have jobs in the American corporate work place in South Africa. That comprises less than one percent of the South African job force. Seen in that way, it's negligible, particularly when one sees it against what these corporations provide for the government. For instance, the South African government could not meet a payroll. It would grind to a halt without large frame computers. Seventy percent of their computers are provided by American firms. have no capacity to make computers. They're entirely dependent upon the U.S. and Great Britain for those computers. Thirty percent of the automotive market, 40 percent of their oil in so many ways importantly strategic. They are dependent upon the United States. Corporations are not there to help the blacks. It's an indictable offense to urge divestment in South Africa, were it a good thing it wouldn't be necessary to make it an indictable offense.

LARRY: Randall, after the killing of the blacks, were you encouraged by the strong language of George Schultz? That seemed to be the strongest language to come out of this administration.



RANDALL: Not unless, not unless George Schultz is prepared to impose the kinds of pressures that are necessary. The point is that the South Africans have understood since 1948 the theatre of American opposition to apartheid. It is wholly rhetorical. They have also understood that we have never been prepared to impose the kinds of sanctions that they respect. They are very much afraid of diversement. They are capital dependent on us and need certain things - markets, trade, loans, investments - to the extent, we as a country are willing to say to them unless you move towards the democratic state, we are going to pull out, we are going to support the anti-apartheid act of 1985, we're going to ban the sale of krugerans in the United States, we're going to ban loans to your country, we're going to pull the investments out, then you will see the South African whites come to the table, sit down and negotiate. They're not going to do it unless we do that. Nobody negotiates unless they feel that they have to.

LARRY: True. Uhhh, do you think the President is insensitive, bigoted, or just wrong?

RANDALL: Well I said recently ummm, and I said this with great sadness and I said it against the history of never making ad hominem attacks, uhhh a history of not making such charges in any case, that [I believe President Reagan, on the basis of his statement at his recent press conference and previous behavior, to

be at base, a racist and I ummm with all sincerity believe that. Uhhh 19 people in a funeral procession, unarmed people, men, women and children, mowed down. The first person hit, a kid on a bicycle at the head of the procession shot in the head, dead, the first of 19 to die and when this question is raised to the President of the United States at a press conference, he not only does not condemn the shootings, the massacre, but he blames the victims for their own slaughter. This from the President of the United States I think it sullies — the very ideals on which this nation is rested, it sends a signal to the South African government that makes more likely future massacres of this kind because they feel that they can do it with impunity if they've got someone in the White House here who takes that kind of position on it.

LARRY: Ambassador Fourie says the long range, it's going to happen. Uhhh, the old colonialist thinking is gone, the time may turn slowly for you, but the goal will happen, and he hopes it happens without blood shed. Is your response that it's not fast enough?

RANDALL: I don't believe he believes that. I don't think he is committed to that. Let's say what I think he is committed to.

One should not confuse petty apartheid with grand apartheid.

Petty apartheid is the business of discrimination within the white area, sort of public accommodations discrimination. The real

central issue here concerns two things: grand apartheid. The whites have divided the land into two pieces. They have taken for four and a half million whites 87 percent of the land, relegating 22 million blacks, 70 percent of the population to 13 percent of the land, saying to blacks and the 13 percent is absolutely worthless. No rain fall to speak of, no minerals, no raw materials, that sort of thing. Saying to the blacks who work in the white area, to fuel the white economy grist for industry and that sort of thing, that you must be absolutely rightless and landless. What blacks are saying is that they want a one person, one vote democratic state, unitary state, because all of the land belongs to all of them. On that issue, the white government has not budged since 1948...

LARRY: And you don't believe Mr. Fourie when he says that, that's the goal.

RANDALL: Not one bit.

LARRY: By the way, why can't you go within 500 feet of an embassy?

RANDALL: That law was put in place to protect the Nazi Germany embassy in the late '30s.

LARRY: Oh before World War II.

RANDALL: Before World War II, and now it protects the South

African embassy.

LARRY: That was the reason for it.

RANDALL: That was the reason for it.

LARRY: You mean people then were Nazi and had marched the

Nazis had marched into Poland and the like were protesting.

RANDALL:

Precisely.

LARRY:

We had to do something to protect the front of the

building.

RANDALL:

Precisely. I'm sure history will view this in the

LARRY: With Randall Robinson. We just have a couple of moments. Short range: optimistic or pessimistic?

RANDALL: Well I'm optimistic. I think we're going to pass this legislation. I think we're going to put this country on the right side and I think when that happens, we'll see movement in South Africa. I hope - the great risk is that is won't come in time - I think there will be blood shed in South Africa and I'm pessimistic about that, but we can limit the scope of that if we get on the right side of the issue and make sure the South African government understands where we stand.

LARRY: You don't want entertainers or sports figures to go there, right?

RANDALL: No.

LARRY: Because that's (unclear word) support?

RANDALL: Just that it legitimizes the regime and that's why they're paying such princely sums to get them to come.

LARRY: Even though the crowds are integrated, right?

RANDALL: Oh the crowds aren't integrated in the city. The point is you got a 40 thousand seat stadium charging 50 dollars a head, only a handful of blacks seen in those crowds to simply decorate the place. But that's not the point. The point is that they want big name American entertainers to come so that they can publicize that around the world to demonstrate that they're accepted in the world family.
