STATE OF THE UNION OUTLINES "FREEDOM'S NEXT STEP"

- o The State of the Union is good and getting better. As President Reagan said, "America is back."
- o In fact, it's back a lot sooner and a lot better than almost any thought possible not long ago. Examples:
 - -- inflation's down -- from 2 years in double-digits to 2 years under 4 percent.
 - -- unemployment's down 2.5 points in a year. Four million Americans found jobs in 1983.
 - -- GNP's growing -- a healthy 6 percent last year, after virtually no growth since 1979.
 - -- defenses strengthened, deterrent more credible.
 - -- U.S. leadership in the world respected again.
- Economic recovery and restoration of the world's respect for America didn't happen automatically. It might not have happened at all -- much less in just 3 years -- without President Reagan's leadership for change.
- o The President credited bipartisan cooperation with stopping the country's decline. He asked Congress to keep on -- in the same spirit -- to maintain progress.
- O He listed as freedom's next step <u>four goals</u> for keeping America "free, secure and at peace in the eighties":
 - ensuring steady economic growth;
 - developing the next frontier -- space;
 - strengthening traditional values;
 - building a meaningful peace.

Steady economic growth

- o <u>Common sense budgeting</u> requires that government <u>limit</u> spending; not raise taxes and unfairly increase the financial burdens already facing families.
- o The \$300 billion in budget savings through 1986 already achieved is a start, but it's only slightly more than half what the President asked.
- o <u>Two new tools</u> -- the "line-item veto" and the "balanced budget amendment" to the Constitution -- would put new discipline in the budget process.

- o Tax simplification -- to make the system fairer for all is the logical next step. The first step was getting tax rates down and then holding them down through indexing. Now it's time to move ahead to make the system simpler, fairer -- not back to higher taxes.
- o By December of 1984, the Secretary of the Treasury will have specific recommendations to broaden the tax base and collect revenues from the underground economy so that personal tax rates can come down, not go up.

Space -- the next frontier

- o The President proposed initiatives to develop U.S. potential in space through:
 - -- construction of a permanent manned space station to be operational in the early 1990s;
 - -- promotion of private sector investment in space;
- o In 25 years, America's space program has extended man's knowledge of the universe. It also yielded -- as a technological by-product -- many items that made life on earth easier, more enjoyable, more productive.
- o The program made possible products from teflon and video-games, to better pace-makers and communications.
- These initiatives would create incentives for purposeful product development in space. Purer metals and life-saving medicines, for example, can be manufactured there that can't be made at all, or as well, on earth.
- o President Reagan proposes a consistent space policy for the next decade and beyond. This will give investors the confidence needed to create new space-based industries -- so vital to economic growth with more jobs in the years ahead.

Strengthen traditional values

o In his Address, the President repeated his emphasis on strengthening America's traditional values of "faith, family, work, neighborhood, freedom and peace."

- o The family is concerned less with how much government spends on education than how much students learn.
- o The President seeks to meet this concern by:
 - -- implementation of the National <u>Commission on Excellence</u> in Education's recommendations (back to basics, merit pay, longer school day, year, etc.);

-- renewed efforts to pass <u>tuition tax credits</u>; -- leadership to help discipline;

-- passage of a Constitutional Amendment to authorize voluntary school prayer.

- o The President called for Americans to come together to find positive solutions to the "tragedy of abortion."
- o <u>Crime</u> threatens too many American families and undermines the sense of neighborliness so basic to America's history and traditions. The President underscored his commitment to basic <u>criminal law reforms</u> to help determine and to an intensified <u>crackdown on crimes against</u> children such as child pornography and abduction.
- o President Reagan also committed to help ensure women's rights in the home and on the job. Equitable pension benefits and IRAs, improved provision of child care and enforcement of child support payments by delinquent parents are part of that commitment.
- o To help restore neighborhoods with high unemployment, he renewed his call for Enterprise Zones legislation.

Building a meaningful peace

- o President Reagan's leadership has won <u>bipartisan</u> support for a stronger defense posture which has made the U.S. deterrent more credible -- and, because of that, made the <u>world</u> a safer place.
- o The President thinks continued bipartisan support can build on that foundation and help to achieve:
 - -- a more stable basis for <u>peaceful relations with</u> the Soviet Union;
 - -- strengthened alliances;
 - -- strategic arms reductions;
 - -- success for peacemaking efforts in Central America, the Mid-East, Southern Africa;

-- support for developing countries;

-- encouragement and assistance in development of democratic institutions around the world.

PRESIDENTIAL ADDRESS: STATE OF THE UNION WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 25, 1984

Mr. Speaker, Mr. President, distinguished Members of the Congress, honored guests, fellow citizens. Once again, in keeping with time-honored tradition, I have come to report to you on the state of the Union. I am pleased to report that America is much improved, and there is good reason to believe that improvement will continue through the days to come.

You and I have had some honest and open differences in the year past. But they didn't keep us from joining hands in bipartisan cooperation to stop a long decline that had drained this Nation's spirit and eroded its wealth. There is renewed energy and optimism throughout the land. America is back -- standing tall, looking to

the eighties with courage, confidence, and hope.

The problems we are overcoming are not the heritage of one person, party, or even one generation. It is the tendency of Government to grow, for practices and programs to become the nearest thing to eternal life we'll see on this Earth. There is always that well-intentioned chorus of voices saying, "with a little more power and money, we could do so much for the people." For a time we forgot the American dream isn't one of making Government bigger; it's keeping faith with the mighty spirit of free people under God.

As we came to the decade of the eighties, we faced the worst crisis in our post-war history. The seventies were years of rising problems and falling confidence. There was a feeling Government had grown beyond the consent of the governed. Families felt helpless in the face of mounting inflation and the indignity of taxes that

Page 2 reduced reward for hard work, thrift, and risk-taking. All this was overlaid by an ever-growing web of rules and regulations.

On the international scene, we had an uncomfortable feeling that we had lost the respect of friend and foe. Some questioned whether we had the will to defend peace and freedom.

But America is too great for small dreams. There was a hunger in the land for a spiritual revival; if you will, a crusade for renewal. The American people said: Let us look to the future with

confidence, both at home and abroad. Let us give freedom a chance.

Americans were ready to make a new beginning and together we have done it. We are confronting our problems one by one. Hope is alive tonight for millions of young families and senior citizens set free from unfair tax increases and crushing inflation. Inflation has been beaten down from 12.4 to 3.2 percent, and that is a great victory for ___ the people. The prime rate has been cut almost in half, and we must work together to bring it down even more.

Together, we passed the first across-the-board tax reduction for everyone since the Kennedy tax cuts. Next year, tax rates will be indexed so inflation can't push people into higher brackets when they get cost-of-living raises. Government must never again use inflation to profit at the people's expense.

Today, a working family earning \$25,000, has \$1,100 more in purchasing power than if tax and inflation rates were still at 1980 levels. Real after-tax income increased 5 percent last year. And economic deregulation of key industries like transportation has offered more choices to consumers and new chances for entrepreneurs, while holding down costs and protecting safety. Tonight, we can report and be proud of one of the best recoveries in decades. Send away the handwringers and doubting Thomases. Hope is reborn for

Page 3 couples dreaming of owning homes and for risktakers with vision to

create tomorrow's opportunities.

The spirit of enterprise is sparked by the sunrise industries of high-tech, and by small business people with big ideas -- people like Barbara Proctor, who rose from a ghetto shack to build a multimillion dollar advertising agency in Chicago; and Carlos Perez, a Cuban refugee, who turned \$27 and a dream into a successful importing business in Coral Gables, Florida.

People like these are heroes for the eighties. They helped 4 million Americans find jobs in 1983. More people are drawing paychecks tonight than ever before. And progress helps everyone. In 1983, women filled 73 percent of all new jobs in managerial, professional, and technical fields.

But we know many of our fellow countrymen are still out of work, wondering what will come of their hopes and dreams. Can we love America and not reach out to tell them: You are not forgotten; we will not rest until each of you can reach

as high as your God-given talents will take you.

The heart of America is strong, good, and true. The cynics were wrong -- America never was a sick society. We're seeing rededication to bedrock values of faith, family, work, neighborhood, peace, and freedom -- values that help bring us together as one people, from the youngest child to the most senior citizen.

The Congress deserves America's thanks for helping us restore

pride and credibility to our military. I hope you are as proud as I am of the young men and women in uniform who have volunteered to man the ramparts in defense of freedom and whose dedication, valor, and skill increases so much our chance of living in a world at peace.

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People everywhere hunger for peace and a better life. The tide of the future is a freedom tide, and our struggle for democracy cannot and will not be denied. This Nation champions peace that enshrines liberty, democratic rights, and dignity for every individual. America's new strength, confidence, and purpose are carrying hope and opportunity far from our shores. A world economic recovery is underway. It began here.

We have journeyed far. But we have much farther to go. Franklin Roosevelt told us 50 years ago this month: "Civilization can not go back; civilization must not stand still. We have undertaken new methods. It is our task to perfect, to improve, to alter when necessary, but in all

cases to go forward."

It is time to move forward again, time for America to take freedom's next step. Let us unite tonight behind four great goals to keep America free, secure, and at peace in the eighties. Together:

We can ensure steady economic growth.
 We can develop America's next frontier.
 We can strengthen our traditional values.

-- And we can build a meaningful peace -- to protect our loved ones and this shining star of faith that has guided millions from tyranny to the safe harbor of freedom, progress, and hope.

Doing these things will open wider the gates of opportunity and provide greater security for all, with no barriers of bigotry or discrimination. The key to a dynamic decade is vigorous economic growth, our first great goal. We might well begin with common sense in Federal budgeting: Government spending no more than Government takes in.

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We must bring Federal deficits down, but how we do that makes all the difference. We can begin by limiting the size and scope of Government. Under the leadership of Vice President Bush, we have reduced the growth of Federal regulations by nearly 30 percent, and cut well over 300 million hours of Government-required paperwork each year. This will save the public more than \$150 billion over the next 10 years.

The Grace Commission has given us some 2,500 recommendations for reducing wasteful spending, and they are being examined throughout the Administration. Federal spending growth has been cut from 17.4 percent in 1980 to less than half that today. We have already achieved \$288 billion in budget savings for the period 1982-86. But that is only half what we sought. Government is still spending too large a percentage of the total economy.

Some insist any further budget savings must be obtained by reducing the portion spent on defense. Well, this ignores the fact that national defense is solely the responsibility of the Federal Government. It is its prime responsibility; yet defense spending is less than a third of the total budget. During the years of President Kennedy and before, defense was almost half the total budget. Then came several years in which our military capability was allowed to deteriorate to a very dangerous degree. We are just now restoring that capability to a level commensurate with our security needs. We dare not shirk our responsibility to keep America free, secure, and at peace.

The last decade saw domestic spending surge literally out of control. But the basis for such spending had been laid in previous years. A pattern of overspending has been

in place for half a

Page 6 century. As the national debt grew, we were told not to worry, we owed it to ourselves.

Now we know deficits are a cause for worry. But there is a difference of opinion as to whether taxes should be increased, spending cut, or some of both. Fear is expressed that Government borrowing to fund the deficit could inhibit

the economic recovery by

taking capital needed for business and industrial expansion. I think that debate is missing the point. Whether Government borrows or increases taxes, it will be taking the same amount of money from the private sector, and, either way, it's _____. Simple fairness dictates Government must not raise taxes on families struggling to pay their bills. The root of the problem is that Government's share is more than we can afford if we are to have a sound economy.

We must bring down the deficits to ensure continued economic growth. In the budget I will submit on February 1, I will recommend measures that will reduce the deficit over the next 5 years. Many of these will be unfinished business from last year's budget. [___: Short insert may go here.] But to break out of the pattern, I propose that we begin exploring how together we can make structural reforms to curb the built-in growth of spending.

We also need improvements in the budgeting process. Some 43 of our 50 States grant their Governors the right to veto individual items in appropriation bills without having to veto the entire bill. California is one of those 43 States. As Governor, I found this "line-item veto" was a powerful tool against wasteful or extravagant spending. It works in 43 States -- let's put it to work in Washington, D.C. for all the people.

It would be most effective if done by constitutional amendment. The majority of Americans approve of such an amendment, just as they

Page 7 and I approve of an amendment mandating a balanced Federal budget. Many States also have this protection in their constitutions.

To talk of meeting the present situation by increasing taxes is a Band-Aid solution which does nothing to cure an illness that has been coming on for half a century — to say nothing of the fact that it poses a real threat to economic recovery. Let's remember that an amount of income tax presently owed and not paid would, if we could collect it, cut the present deficit nearly in half. I'm not talking about legitimate tax shelters or deductions. I'm talking about downright cheating by some of our fellow citizens. It would be immoral to make those who are paying taxes pay more to compensate for those who aren't paying their share.

There is a better way: Let us go forward with an historic reform for fairness, simplicity, and incentives for growth. I am asking Secretary Don Regan for a plan for action to simplify the entire tax code, so all taxpayers, big and small, are treated more fairly. I believe such a plan could result in that "underground economy" being brought into the sunlight of honest tax compliance; and it could make the tax base broader so personal tax rates could come down, not go up. I have asked that specific recommendations, consistent with these objectives, be presented to me by December 1984.

Our second great goal is to build on America's pioneer spirit and develop our next frontier. A sparkling economy spurs initiative and ingenuity to create sunrise industries and make older ones more competitive.

Nowhere is this more true than our next frontier: space. Nowhere do we so effectively demonstrate our technological leadership and ability to make life better on Earth. The Space Age is barely a

Page 8 quarter of a century old, but already we've pushed civilization forward with our advances in science and technology. Opportunities and jobs will multiply as we cross new thresholds of knowledge and reach deeper into the unknown.

Our progress in space -- taking giant steps for all mankind -- is a tribute to American teamwork and excellence. Our finest minds in Government, industry, and academia have all pulled together, and we can be proud to say: We are first, we are the best, and we are so because we are free.

America has always been greatest when we dared to be great. We can reach for greatness again. We can follow our dreams to distant stars, living and working in space for peaceful, economic, and scientific gain. Tonight, I am directing NASA to develop a permanent, manned space station, and to do it within a decade.

A space station will permit quantum leaps in our research in

science, communications, and in metals and life-saving medicines which can be manufactured only in space. We want our friends to help us meet these challenges and share in the benefits. NASA will invite other countries to participate so we can strengthen peace, build prosperity, and expand freedom for all who share our goals.

Just as the oceans opened up a new world for Clipper ships and Yankee Traders, space holds enornmous potential for commerce today. The market for space transportation could surpass our capacity to develop it. Companies interested in putting payloads into space must have ready access to private sector launch services. We will soon implement a number of executive initiatives and develop proposals to ease regulatory constraints and promote private sector investment in space.

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And as we develop the frontier of space, let us remember our responsibility to preserve our older resources here on Earth. Preservation of our environment is not a liberal or conservative challenge, it's common sense.

Though this is a time of budget restraints, I have requested for EPA the largest percentage budget increase of any agency. We will begin the long, necessary effort to clean up a productive, recreational area and a special national resource -- the Chesapeake Bay.

To reduce the threat posed by abandoned hazardous waste dumps, EPA will spend \$410 million this year and I will request a supplemental increase of \$50 million. I have asked Bill Ruckelshaus to work with the Congress on a new reauthorization of the Superfund law, so we have time to complete this important task.

On the question of acid rain, which concerns people in many areas of the U.S. and Canada, I am proposing a research program that doubles our current funding. And we will take additional action to restore our lakes and develop new technology to reduce pollution that causes acid rain.

We have greatly improved the conditions of our national parks. Beginning in 1985, we'll ask the Congress for \$157

million to acquire new parklands.

But our most precious resources, our greatest hope for the future, are the minds and hearts of our people, especially our children. We can help them build tomorrow by strengthening our community of shared values. This must be our third great goal. For us, faith, family, work, neighborhood, freedom and peace are not just words. They are expressions of what America means, definitions of what makes us good and loving people.

Families stand at the center of our society. And every family has a personal stake in promoting excellence in education.

Excellence does not begin in Washington. A 600-percent increase in Federal spending on education between 1960 and 1980 was accompanied by a steady decline in SAT scores. Excellence must begin in our homes and neighborhood schools, where it's the responsibility of every parent and teacher

and the right of every child.

Our children come first. That's why I established a bipartisan National Commission on Excellence in Education, to help us chart a common sense course for better education. Already, communities are implementing the Commission's recommendations. Schools are reporting progress in math and reading skills. But we must do more to restore to schools; and we must encourage the teaching of new basics, reward teachers of merit, enforce tougher standards, and put our parents back in charge.

I will continue to press for tuition tax credits to expand opportunities for families, and to soften the double payment for those paying public school taxes and private school tuition. Our proposal would target assistance to low- and middle-income families. Just as more incentives are needed within our schools, greater competition is needed among our schools. Without standards and competition there can be no champions, no records broken, no excellence -- in education or any other walk of life.

America was founded by people who believed that God was their rock of safety. He is ours. I recognize we must be cautious in

claiming that God is on ___ side. But I think it's alright to keep asking if we are on side.

During our first 3 years, we have joined bipartisan efforts to restore protection of the law to unborn children. I know this issue

is very controversial. But unless and until it can be
proven that an unborn child is ___ a living human being, can
we justify assuming without proof that it isn't? No one has
yet offered such proof. Indeed, all the evidence is to the
contrary. We should rise above bitterness and reproach.
And if Americans could come together in a spirit of
understanding and helping, then we ___ find positive
solutions to the tragedy of abortion.

Economic recovery, better education, rededication to values all show the spirit of renewal gaining the upper hand. And all will improve family life in the eighties. But families need more. They need assurance that they and their loved ones can walk the streets of America without being afraid. Parents need to know their children will not be victims of child pornography and abduction, and this year we will intensify our drive against those horrible crimes. Already, our efforts to crack down on career criminals, organized crime, drug pushers, and to enforce tougher sentences and paroles are having effect. In 1982, crime dropped by 4.1 percent, the first such decline since 1977.

Opportunities for all Americans will increase if we move forward to ensure women's rights, provide for equitable treatment in pension benefits and Individual Retirement Accounts, facilitate child care, and enforce delinquent

parent support payments.

It is not just the home but the workplace and community that sustain our values and shape our future. So I ask your help in assisting more communities to break the bondage of dependency. Help us to free enterprise by permitting debate and voting "yes" on our proposal for enterprise zones in America. This has been before you for 2 years. Its passage can help high-unemployment areas by creating jobs and restoring neighborhoods.

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A society bursting with opportunities, reaching for its future with confidence, sustained by faith, fair play, and a conviction that good and courageous people will flourish when they are free -- these are the secrets of a strong and prosperous America, at peace with itself and the world.

A lasting and meaningful peace is our fourth great goal. It is our highest aspiration. And our record is clear: Americans resort to force only when we must. We have never been aggressors. We have always struggled to defend freedom and democracy.

We have no territorial ambitions. We occupy no countries. We build no walls to lock people in. Americans build the future. And

our vision of a better life for farmers, merchants, and working people, from the Americas to Asia, begins with a simple premise: The future is best decided by ballots, not bullets.

Governments which rest upon the consent of the governed do not wage war on their neighbors. Only when people are given a personal stake in deciding their own destiny and benefitting from their own risks -- do they create societies that are prosperous, progressive, and free. Tonight, it is democracies that offer hope by feeding the hungry, prolonging life, and eliminating drudgery.

When it comes to keeping America strong, free, and at peace, there should be no Republicans or Democrats, just patriotic Americans. We can decide the tough issues not by

who is right, but by what is right.

Together, we can continue to advance our agenda for peace. We can:

-- Establish a more stable basis for peaceful relations with the Soviet Union;

-- Strengthen allied relationships across the board;

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-- Achieve real and equitable reductions in the levels of nuclear arms;

-- Reinforce our peacemaking efforts in the Middle East, Central America, and Southern Africa;

-- Assist developing countries, particularly our neighbors in the Western Hemisphere; and

-- Assist in the development of democratic institutions throughout the world.

The wisdom of our bipartisan cooperation was seen in the work of the Scowcroft Commission, which strengthened our ability to deter war and protect peace. In that same spirit, I urge you to move forward with the Jackson Plan to implement the recommendations of the Bipartisan Commission on Central America.

Your joint resolution on the Multinational Peacekeeping Force in Lebanon is also serving the cause of peace. We are making progress in Lebanon. For nearly 10 years, the Lebanese have lived from tragedy to tragedy, with no hope for their future. Now, the Multinational Peacekeeping Force and our Marines are helping them break their cycle of despair. There is hope for a free, independent, and sovereign Lebanon. We must have courage to give peace a chance. And we must not be driven from our objectives for peace in Lebanon by state-sponsored terrorism. We have seen this ugly spectre in Beirut, Kuwait, and Rangoon. It demands international attention. I will forward shortly a legislative proposal to help combat terrorism, and I will be seeking support from our allies for concerted action.

Our NATO Alliance is strong. 1983 was a banner year for political courage. And we have strengthened our partnerships and

friendships in the Far East. We are committed to dialogue,

Page 14 deterrence, and promoting prosperity through more free and open trade.

A rebirth of bipartisan cooperation, restoration of economic growth and military deterrence, and a growing spirit of unity among our people at home and our allies abroad underline a fundamental and far-reaching change: The United States is safer, stronger, and more secure in 1984 than before. We can now move with confidence to seize the opportunities for peace -- and we will.

Some days when life seems hard, and we reach for values to sustain us, or a friend to help us, we find a person who

reminds us what it means to be Americans.

Sergeant Stephen Trujillo, a medic in the 2nd Ranger Battalion, 75th infantry, was in the first helicopter to land at the compound held by Cuban forces on Grenada. He saw three other helicopters crash. Despite the imminent explosion of the burning aircraft, he never hesitated. He ran across 25 yards of open terrain through enemy fire to rescue wounded soldiers. He directed two other medics, administered first aid, and returned again and again to the crash site to carry his wounded friends to safety.

And then there are unsung heroes: single parents, couples, church and civic volunteers, their hearts carry

without complaint the

pains of family and community problems. They soothe our sorrow, heal our wounds, calm our fears, and share our joy.

A person like Father Ritter is always there. His Covenant House programs in New York and Houston provide shelter and help to thousands of abused children each year. The same is true of Dr. Charles Carson. Paralyzed in a plane crash, he still believed nothing is impossible. Today, in Minnesota, he works 80 hours a week without pay, helping pioneer the field of computer controlled

Page 15 walking. He has given hope to 500,000 paralyzed Americans that someday they may walk again.

Carl Sandburg wrote, "I see America, not in the setting sun of a black night of despair. I see America in the crimson light of a rising sun fresh from the burning, creative hand of God. I see great days ahead for men and women of vision."

I've never felt more strongly that America's best days, and democracy's best days, lie ahead. We're just beginning, and we are a powerful force for good. We have it within us to perform great deeds, to take freedom's next step -- and we will. We will carry on the traditions of a proud and worthy people who have brought light where there was darkness, heat where there was only cold, medicines where there was sickness, food where there was hunger, wealth where humanity was living in squalor, and peace where there was only death and bloodshed.

Let us be sure that those who come after will say of us that, in our time, we did everything that could be done: We kept them free, we fought the good fight, we kept the faith.

Therefore, it is of great concern to our office that we have the fact sheet and text of the speech early so that we can provide for timely delivery to the Hill.

We would like to recommend the following:

- 1. During the afternoon of January 25, as <u>early</u> as possible, copies of the press fact sheet and a copy of the full text be made available for review (but not for copying) in the House and Senate Republican leaders' offices. A copy will also need to be made available to the Senate Republican Conference to help all Republican members prepare for video actualities that will be taped one hour prior to the President's speech. They have been reliable in the past, making sure that only Members see the copy of the speech. All offices will have specific instructions regarding no distribution of the speech.
- 2. Subsequent copies of the final text will be provided to the Doorkeepers' Offices for distribution to Members as they exit the House Floor after the speech.

Again, it is important that we arrange for these timely deliveries to the Hill in light of our limited ability to move freely in the Capitol this year.

On page 9, first paragraph, line 5: Instead of "SAT scores" substitute "college entrance examination scores".

On page 9, second paragraph, third sentence, starting with "already": Insert "Already governors, state legislatures, local school districts and their neighborhood communities are

implementing the Commission's recommendations. We have underway a massive, far-reaching movement to reform and renew the nation's schools. Schools are reporting progress in math and reading skills but we must seize this opportunity to restore our schools by encouraging the teaching of the new basics, reward our teachers of merit, enforce tougher standards and put parents back in charge.

TALKING POINTS

7 9

SPACE PORTION OF THE STATE OF THE UNION ADDRESS

- In his State of the Union remarks, the President announced that the development of America's next frontier space is one of his four goals for our Nation in the 1980s.
- The President also articulated the three elements of his broad strategy for space:
 - -- Establish a permanent manned presence in space with a Space Station program.
 - -- Increase international cooperation in space.
 - -- Stimulate private sector investment in space.

Permanent Manned Presence In Space

- -- The idea of a permanent manned presence in space has captivated our imaginations since the beginning of the space age.
- -- The Space Shuttle program was, in fact, conceived in the late 1960s in the context of a Space Station program.
- -- With the growing operational maturity of the Shuttle, the President has decided that it is time for us to take the next bold step into the future of space.
- -- The U.S. Space Station will be a permanently manned, multi-purpose, modular facility which will orbit the earth. It will be launched and tended by the Shuttle.
- -- The Space Station will provide living quarters and working facilities for a crew of 6-8 which will rotate every 3-6 months.
- -- The Space Station will contribute to the developing of the peaceful, commercial use of space. It will permit:
 - --- Scientific research and technology development by both government and industry.
 - --- The commercial use of space in such areas as the manufacture of critical materials and pharmaceuticals not available on earth.
 - --- The assembly, servicing and repair of satellites and other large structures in space.
 - --- Research focused on extending man's stay-time in space as a first step towards even more ambitious manned space programs.

- -- The cost of the Space Station will be approximately \$8 billion through the early 1990s.
- In short, the President's approval of a manned Space Station program:
 - -- Reinforces his commitment to the peaceful uses of outer space,
 - -- Recognizes that this major program can return tangible benefits to the American people, and
 - -- Acknowledges his faith in the American people, American industry and a progressive future for our great nation

International Cooperation in Space

- -- For 25 years, this country's civil space program has benefitted from the active cooperation of other nations.
- The President has invited our <u>friends</u> and <u>allies</u> to participate in the U.S. Space Station program. They will help us meet our ambitious goals and will share the benefits of this program. (DOES NOT INCLUSE SOVIETS)
- -- Foreign participation could range from use of the completed Space Station facility all the way to cooperation in its development.
- -- Already Europe, Canada and Japan have been studying the Space Station concept and have indicated strong interest.
- -- The President has asked Jim Beggs, NASA's Administrator, to visit major capitals around the world in order to explain his Space Station initiative and to assess the extent of potential foreign participation.
- -- The U.S. Space Program can be an important instrument of foreign policy in other areas as well.
 - --- The recent success of the Shuttle/Spacelab mission is eloquent testimony to the effective cooperation between the U.S. and the European Space Agency.
 - --- We have extended invitations to the Europeans, Japan, Canada and Brazil to provide experiments and astronauts for flights on the Shuttle.
 - --- There are numerous smaller projects in which our nation and others cooperate extensively.

Stimulate the Private Sector Investment in Space

- -- The President has directed a significant expansion of the commercial uses of space by inviting industries and other private entities to finance and conduct business in orbit.
- -- Commercial uses of space take advantage of low gravity and other unique attributes of space for the manufacture of products.
- -- We expect industrial firms and other entrepreneurs to invest in space research which would lead to the development of goods and services for use on Earth in other space activities.
- -- Commercial uses of space can be expected to lead to:
 - --- New industries and jobs on Earth and in orbit.
 - --- Advances in science and technology.
 - --- Continued U.S. leadership in space.
 - --- An enhanced U.S. competitive position in international trade and an improved balance of payments.
 - --- Increased tax revenues.
- -- Products and services with characteristics which lend themselves better to production in space than on Earth include:
 - --- Electronic components with valuable properties unobtainable in processing on the Earth's surface.
 - --- Medical and biological preparations for fighting disease.
 - --- Alloys stronger and lighter than any now available.
 - --- Advanced communications systems for improved global dissemination of knowledge.
- -- In addition, the commercial development of space is expected to open new outlets for innovation, imagination and American ingenuity in the application of information and processes obtained there to Earth-bound businesses.

This is to suggest some unifying themes for the speech along with a possible construct that would at once recap the President's feats to date and project his leadership forward to the unfinished agenda and items of new business before him -- and the Congress. This construct would also repeatedly drive home the oft-overlooked notion that Congress shares responsibility for what happens -- or fails to happen -- in Washington.

A CENTRAL THEME I.

FROM:

SUBJECT:

The message could be built around a new, media-attractive variation on the underlying theme of what his Presidency has done and hopes to do.

I suggest "BALANCED GCVERNMENT" for what it says per se, for its evocative twist on the old "BALANCED BUDGET" war cry, and for its flexibility and adaptability in virtually any occasion or context. Note how it works in various segments of the following suggested outline. Consider how it might play along the campaign trail and in the ongoing brouhahas on the Hill over the balance of legislative-executive powers in such arenas as the budget, the War Powers Act, Congressional vetoes, et al.

II. SPIN-OFF THEMES

Wherever appropriate, the speech and subsequent communiques should evince the "Yeah, right on ... " or "That makes sense ... " reaction in the middle class core of the President's constituency, the folks most used to balancing family checkbooks and seeing the logic of balancing government's overweening interests with their own.

Several obvious candidates:

"COMMON SENSE" "UNFINISHED AGENDA" "NEW BUSINESS BEFORE US" "HARD NEW LOOK AT OLD PROBLEMS"

III. A SUGGESTED CONSTRUCT FOR THE SOTUS

A. REBUILDING THE FOUNDATION FOR BALANCED GOVERNMENT

The State of our Union in this new year -- and in this momentous decade -- may well depend on what we make of it, you and I, over the course of this last session of the 98th Congress ...

Most of you have served with me over the past three years ...a time when we had no more urgent business before us than to repair the damages of excesses and oversights of the past ...

We have hit snags. We have hit roadblocks. But we have made great progress toward rebuilding the strong base for the balanced government that the people of this great Nation demand of their elected leaders ...

We share that record ... my Administration and Members of this Congress and we have earned the right to point with pride to what we have done ...

We have made history over the past three years on:

- ... taxes
- ... spending
- ... inflation and interest
- ... climate for economic growth and jobs
- ... common sense government (Cost Control)
- ... safety net reaching more than ever
- ... defense and foreign policy
- ... Etc. with details on each litany of accomplishments

Our accomplishments of the past three years have done much to strengthen our Nation's hand at home and abroad for coping with the challenges of events and the needs of our people that lie ahead ...

We are today on the threshold of a new, troubling time of uncertainty ... a time when the smallest misstep could trip up our economic recovery ... a time when the slightest misad-venture could upset the fragile peace that is so seriously threatened in so many areas of our world ...

It is a time to take stock ... to test the winds ... to challenge ourselves. To look back at where we've been, so that we can learn from our mistakes. To look forward to where we want to go, so that we will make no mistake in the road we choose ...

I urge today that the road we choose ... you and I ... lead us into this new time of our Nation's life in a renewed spirit of balanced government ...

The people want nothing more from their elected leaders than balanced government ... government in balance with reality ... government in balance with their pocketbooks ... and, most importantly, government in balance with their expectations ...

People want a government that knows its place ... and stays in it. A government that does its job ... and no more. A government that delivers basic services well ... and doesn't go charging off down the road in bold new directions in search of bold new things to do at a time when there are no bold new dollars to pay for them ... and no bold new mandate from the people to do them ...

That's the kind of balance I believe we must strike in this year ... and in the years to come ...

To the extent that we succeed, we will be responding to the realities of our times and the priorities of the people we serve ...

To the extent that we fail, we will be turning our backs on both ...

B. BALANCED GOVERNMENT MEANS CONTROLS ON TAXES AND SPENDING

(Repeat litany on tax/spending growth cuts)

The people we serve demand that our laws and Constitution reflect their commitment to the ideal of balanced, controlled government ...

I call on you once again to act -- soon -- on a Constitutional mandate that the business of the American people be carried out under a balanced budget except in times of dire emergency when any President and any Congress would have no other choice ...

There isn't a State in the Union which does not have a mandate written into its Constitution or laws. In forty-three states, the Chief Executive has a line-item veto power to help make the balanced budget ideal work in reality when the legislative branch is unable or unwilling to live up to it ...

Should federal taxpayers be content to have any less protection? The people we serve demand more shelter from government spending run amok than the good intentions of the men and women in their Congress and the thin black line drawn by their President's veto pen ...

The budget I will submit to you a month from now will reflect their demands. It will propose no new programs or spending plans unless they meet new needs we cannot ignore, or will help create more private sector jobs, or will carry out the letter of existing law ...

That will be the bottom line of every page of my budget proposal. And those will be the standards by which I will sign or veto any bill that emerges from the legislative process ...

And let's not play games with the budget issue ... even if it is an election year ...

Let's not pretend that government can be the be-all, end-all, catch-all that too many politicians keep promising it can be ...

It cannot be. We cannot pretend that it can be ... for the price of too much government trying to be too many things to too many people is a price in taxpayer dollars and a failure of common sense that we simply cannot afford to pay ...

C. BALANCED GOVERNMENT MEANS COMPLETING THE UNFINISHED BUSINESS OF THE PAST THREE YEARS

- -- Jobs for American workers
- -- Family initiatives
- --Women
- --Medicare (cite Social Security, decry politicization in 82 elections; pledge bi-partisan approach to Medicare; express belief "we can and we will achieve a rescue plan Claude Pepper can vote for and I can sign ...")
- -- Federalism initiatives
- --Education
- --Energy
- --Crime and drug abuse
- --Social issues (abortion, prayer)

- --Defense and foreign policy
- --Peace
- --Catch-all thought: Let us keep in mind ... anything and everything we do in any domestic area must never, in any way, threaten to undermine the course of the economic recovery, etc.

D. BALANCED GOVERNMENT MEANS RECOGNIZING REALITY

(Good juncture for discourse on intractable problems like education, drug abuse, budget deficits, acid rain in terms middle class couple can relate to tough problems in their own lives. An example:)

The message from the people we serve is loud and clear. We need to do more with less ... we need to make more sense out of the dollars we spend ...

But government at all levels ... starting right here ... has not responded to that message as quickly and effectively as it should. Blame politics. Blame tradition. Blame bureaucracy. Blame special interests. There is enough blame to go around. And, the sad fact is, there is much to be blamed for

Take education ...

For years we have provided exponential growth in funding for our schools from an increasingly finite resource system ... the taxpayer's pocket. There is no area of government where we have lavished more money and more attention over the years ...

Yet today, in the eyes of the taxpayers and from the evidence in hand, there is something wrong. The numbers of students are going down ... and yet costs keep zooming up, faster than ever before. Our society grows more technologically complex by the day ... but pupil achievement scores are falling -- and record numbers are simply dropping out ...

We are in a time when education is more important to the quality of life of today's children and tomorrow's adults than ever before. We are also in a time when people's faith in all institutions ... including education ... is fading fast ...

Simply throwing more money at our schools is not the answer. We can't keep moving dollars onward and upward without doing more to move the system onward and upward towards better quality in the classrooms ...

If government at any level is going to demand more support for our schools from the taxpayers ... they have got to be convinced that all of those dollars -- and the dollars being spent right now -- are getting through to the kids sitting in those classrooms ...

(Cite Commission findings ...)

(List education initiatives ...)

E. WE HAVE A FULL AGENDA OF NEW BUSINESS __

(Good juncture for laundry list of forward-looking projects, all based, of course, on success of economic recovery that gave us the strength and vision to look ahead, e.g.:)

- --Traditional Values -- Re-enforcing the unique character of our civilization.
- --Taxes -- Bipartisan commission to take hard, common sense look at fundamental tax reform.
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- -- Private Sector Initiatives -- Bigger and better plans.
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F. BALANCED GOVERNMENT MEANS ENHANCING THE QUALITY OF OUR LIFE

(Ending theme -- Chance to wrap up on lofty note; perhaps co-opt the "Are you better off today than four years ago ..." issue by making strong conceptual and down-to-earth case that the Nation as a whole is indeed better off ... and getting better by the day.)



Dear Mr. President:

Several months ago I had the privilege to be at the White House to present you with a wooden sculpture depicting Poland's indomitable spirit under foreign domination.

I am again in the United States at the invitation of the Director of the Fr. Justin Rosary Hour radio network program which is presently in its 53rd year of broadcasting religious programs in the Polish language over a network of nearly 50 stations in the United States and Canada. I am writing a book about this broadcasting institution. It will be my third major work on American matters.

I write to express my appreciation for your remarkable State of the Union talk before the American Congress.

I address you first as a human being who feels that his life is safer because the life of the unborn is respected and protected here. Whose who share your convictions will now have greater courage to speak out in defense of life and to appreciate a more peaceful atmosphere where human rights are respected.

I also write as a Catholic priest who regards prayer in the classroom as a moral foundation in the education of our youth. From my own experience I know the traumatic effect that resulted when government authorities eliminated traditional prayers from our classrooms in Częstochowa.

May letter is also an expression of a Polish heart. I come from a country which a 1000 year history. If we exist somhow as a nation today, it is thanks to the christian values which influenced our literature and arts. Although there was a time when we did not have our capitol city, we did have our Jasna Góra; we had our lituratur, our christian values which we passon on and continue to pass on to each succeeding generation despite great difficulties.

I am very grateful to you, Mr. President, that in your State of the Union speech which you addressed to the American Congress and the entire world, you spoke about America's traditional values which are based on the law of God.

I realize I do not have the right to interfere in American affairs, but I can at least pray for you, your Family, and wish you and the American people all the best in this election year. I am sure that you have the overshelming support of all the people of good will, among them Catholics and Polish Americans.

I am especially pleased to see the traditional values -- so precious to the people of Poland and which were so fruitful in the beginnings of the American nation -- flourishing in the world today, thanks to the efforts of such champions as Pope John Paul II and the present President of the United States.

God bless you, Mr. President! God bless America!
