I'm planning to be at the July 28th Opening Ceremonies, so I'll see you there along with many of your friends from around the world. It is unfortunate that not all nations will be represented at the Games. I hope you realize, however, that the success of the Olympics, and your personal success in the Games, in no way depend on political machinations of powerbrokers in less-than-free countries. The Games are moving forward and they will be successful.

Closer to home, the Olympic movement is alive and well in the United States. Part of the reason is because of the excellent leadership given to the U.S.O.C. by your President Bill Simon, and by your Executive Director of nearly 15 years, Colonel Don Miller.

Members of the "Spirit Team" have been relating their Olympic experiences to get others involved. Proposed Presidential Remarks: Olympic Training Center Visit

We have reviewed the above-referenced draft Presidential remarks and recommend deletion of the last two sentences in paragraph 2 of page 2. Those two sentences single out Miller Brewing Company for praise for its contributions to the Colorado Springs Olympic Training Center. Although we have occasionally allowed Presidential praise of specific corporations for their "private sector initiatives," we have been advised by Olympic Committee officials that they would prefer that no specific corporations be singled out for praise for their support of the Olympics. Accordingly, we recommend deletion of the sentences specifically praising Miller Brewing Company.

Additionally, we recommend that the statement about the inclusion of seven new women's "sports" in this year's Olympics be verified — it may be seven new "events." Finally, we note that there is some controversy over certain women's events that have not been included in the Games and that the President's statements on the women's events could embroil him in that controversy.

Olympic Training Center Visit in Colorado Springs

Richard Darman's office asked that we provide any comments or edits on the above-referenced draft Presidential remarks directly to Ben Elliott by noon today.

Rather than focusing on the Soviet boycott of the Olympics, these proposed remarks stress the tremendous private sector support for the Los Angeles Olympics. I have no objections to these remarks as written; however, I believe they miss a valuable opportunity for the President to make more thoughtful remarks -- on the sacrifices and commitment of the American Olympic athlete -- at an obviously newsworthy event.

I recommend advising Elliot that the last two sentences in the second paragraph of page two of these proposed remarks must be deleted. Those sentences single out Miller Brewing Company for praise for its support of the Colorado Springs Olympic Training Facility. Although we have occasionally allowed Presidential praise of specific corporations for their "private sector initiatives," I have discussed this particular statement with Jay Moorhead who recommended against its inclusion on the grounds that Miller is not the only American corporation that has made significant contributions to support our Olympic athletes. Jay was particularly concerned that this comment would not sit well with Anheuser Busch which has made similar financial contributions to the Los Angeles Olympic facilities.

An additional matter of note in these proposed remarks is the discussion of the newly added Olympic events for women. The remarks state that this year's Olympics will include seven new "sports" for women; however, I believe it is seven new "events" that have been added for women. Also there is some controversey about the omission of other women's events proposed for these Olympic Games, and a discussion of the women's events could embroil the President in that debate. Although I am not prepared to recommend deletion of those proposed statements, I do believe this potential for controversey should be mentioned to Ben.

Olympic Training Center Visit

We have reviewed the above-referenced draft Presidential remarks and recommend deletion of the last two sentences in paragraph 2 of page 2. Those two sentences single out Miller Brewing Company for praise for its contributions to the Colorado Springs Olympic Training Center. Although we have occasionally allowed Presidential praise of specific corporations for their "private sector initiatives," we have been advised by Olympic Committee officials that they would prefer that no specific corporations be singled out for praise for their support of the Olympics. Accordingly, we recommend deletion of the sentences specifically praising Miller Brewing Company.

Additionally, we recommend that the statement about the inclusion of seven new women's "sports" in this year's Olympics be verified -- it may be seven new "events." Finally, we note that there is some controversy over certain women's events that have not been included in the Games and that the President's statements on the women's events could embroil him in that controversy.
