Subject: Naming William Wilson as Presidential Representative to Greet the Pope in

Guam and Anchorage

The Department recommended on February 6 (Memo at Tab 1) that the President consider designating a Personal Representative to welcome Pope John Paul II on his arrival in Guam (February 22) and Anchorage (February 26). We proposed that if possible the President choose for this mission the person he intended to name as his Personal Envoy to the Holy See.

Now that the President has proposed, and the Vatican has accepted, Mr. William A. Wilson as Personal Envoy, we suggest that the President ask Mr. Wilson to go to Guam and Anchorage. Our Vatican Office has discussed the matter informally with Vatican officials who say the Pope would be pleased to meet Mr. Wilson at one or both of his U.S. stops.

Mr. Wilson might further be asked to carry with him a short message of welcome from the President to the Pope. A proposed draft is attached at Tab 2.

We request an early decision to allow time for the necessary arrangements to be made.

Subject: The Pope's Visit to Guam and Anchorage

Pope John Paul II will travel to the Far East in February to visit the Philippines and Japan. He will stop briefly on U.S. soil: in Guam (February 22-23) and in Anchorage, Alaska (February 26). The Department recommends that the President consider designating a Personal Representative to represent him at the welcoming ceremonies in Guam, in Anchorage, or possibly both.

Vatican officials have told us that the Pope does not expect any U.S. Government officials to be on hand in Guam. Nevertheless we believe it would be a fitting gesture of hospitality and respect if the President did in fact name someone. The Department of Interior, which has primary responsibility for Guamanian affairs, may wish of course to make its own recommendation. The Republican Governor of Guam, Paul M. Calvo, would be on hand in any case.

The papal stop in Alaska--primarily for refueling--will last only about three hours. Even so, public interest in the visit is running very high among Alaskans. We believe that the absence of some sign of the President's personal interest would surely draw public notice in Alaska.

Either papal stop provides an excellent opportunity for the Administration to establish an early, personal relationship with the Pope. Participation by the Vice President would lend a touch of drama and would greatly please both the Pope and his hosts. But a lower level of representation would be entirely adequate.



We believe the best choice would be the person the President intends to name as his Personal Envoy to the Vatican, if this person has been designated by that time. (Personal Envoys have not been subject to confirmation in the past.) A senior Administration official or a close associate of the President from private life would be other possibilities.

State's memo at Tab B, in conjunction with an earlier recommendation from our Deputy Personal Envoy in the Vatican, summarizes the Pope's projected Far East visit, notes his intention to spend time in Guam (24 hours) and Anchorage, Alaska (3 hours), and favors appropriate Presidential involvement for the reasons essentially spelled out in my recommended phone call at Tab I-A.

I see no need for any White House activity during the Guam portion of his itinerary (though as State notes, the Secretary of the Interior may want to make a separate recommendation; I am trying to get a firmer fix on this) but I do strongly favor the interjection of a personal Presidential note via a

Pope John Paul II's Presence in Anchorage

The Pontiff's return home from his Far East pilgrimage later this month will include a three-hour refueling stop in Anchorage, Alaska (February 26). Both our Deputy Vatican Envoy and the State Department believe some Presidential acknowledgement/participation would be very appropriate while the Pope is on North American soil.

I concur with that view and favor a phone call to His Holiness (recommended talking points are at Tab A.) In addition, I believe it would be a gracious gesture on your part to have a White House-connected personality on hand to welcome the Pope and to transmit a personal letter from you. This will help establish a cordial and productive relationship between you and the Pontiff early in your Administration and appeal to the many millions of Americans who avidly followed his triumphal tour of the U.S. in October, 1979. Should you favor a personal representative greeting the Pope during his brief Anchorage layover, you might want to consider your choice of the Personal Envoy job in the Vatican for that purpose (State could ensure that he is accompanied by appropriate protocol people).

PURPOSE:

To establish an early, personal relationship with the Pope while welcoming him back to North American soil.

BACKGROUND:

The Pope will be en route home following a major pastoral trip to the Philippines and Japan, punctuated by a 24-hour stop in Guam. American, and especially Alaskan, interest in the Pope's return to the North American continent (a little over a year following his first triumphal visit to the U.S.) is likely to be high. A call from you, in conjunction with other courtesies (subject of separate memo), would be especially gracious in these circumstances.

TOPICS OF DISCUSSION:

- 1. Cordial welcome to U.S. soil.
- 2. U.S. appreciation for the Vatican's help to us during the hostage crisis.
 - 3. His impressions of the Far East in general and of Guam in particular.
- 4. Your satisfaction that Archbishop Pio Laghi has newly arrived from Buenos Aires as Apostolic Delegate to the U.S.
- 5. Your full confidence in your Personal Envoy to the Holy See and your hope that the Vatican, and the Pope himself, will not hesitate to use him as the channel for any sensitive matters the Pope may wish to communicate to us.
- 6. Invite him to revisit the U.S. (the Pope has expressed great interest in covering the Western part of the U.S., which he did not have time to do during his October, 1979 travels here).

I have asked my friend Peter Rodino to convey these words directly to you, written at a time when the whole Christian community and people of all faiths everywhere have reason to rejoice. I join them in expressing my relief and my delight in the encouraging news of your recovery. I join them, too, in wishing you a happy 61st birthday — with your safe passage you have given all of us the best birthday present imaginable!

Happily, few leaders in the world today have the dubious distinction of knowing with some precision the kind of event you have just experienced. Fewer still can appreciate, as can I, the depth of courage and commitment on which you must have called, not only to survive that horrible event but to do so with such grace, nobility, and forgiveness.

Your heroism, and the universal outpouring of love and concern which it evoked, is proof that a single irrational act cannot prevail against the basic human decency which continues to inspire most people in most places. The qualities you exemplify remain a precious asset as we confront the growing dangers of the moment -- confront them with confidence and faith.

May I also take the opportunity of this letter to thank you for the silver plaque which you sent to me through Secretary Haig. The inscription is particularly appropriate to these troubled times. My prayers, and those of all Americans, are with you as your recovery progresses and as you resume the passionate leadership which has given so many parts of the world a spirit of optimistic renewal.

BEGIN TEXT:

YOUR HOLINESS:

FOR THE PAST SEVERAL WEEKS WE HAVE CONSULTED CLOSELY ON THE EVENTS IN POLAND BY MESSAGE, TELEPHONE AND THROUGH OUR DIPLOMATIC REPRESENTATIVES. I WOULD LIKE TO RESPOND IN THIS LETTER TO ANOTHER JOINT CONCERN, THE PREVENTION OF NUCLEAR WAR. YOUR LETTER OF NOVEMBER 25 AND A DELE-GATION FROM THE PONTIFICAL ACADEMY OF SCIENCES DESCRIBED ELOQUENTLY YOUR CONVICTIONS ABOUT THE NATURE OF NUCLEAR WAR AND THE NECESSITY OF PREVENTING ITS OUTBREAK. ON DECEMBER 15, CARDINAL CASAROLI AND I HAD AN EXCELLENT AND THOROUGH DISCUSSION OF THE SUBJECT WHICH I AM SURE HE HAS REPORTED TO YOU IN DETAIL.

I FULLY SHARE YOUR HORROR AT THE DISASTROUS CONSEQUENCES OF NUCLEAR CONFLICT, THE "LAST EPIDEMIC OF MANKIND." I AM DETERMINED TO PREVENT SUCH A CATASTROPHE. YOUR WORDS OF ENCOURAGEMENT WERE WELCOME AS WE BEGIN OUR NEGOTIATIONS WITH THE SOVIET UNION IN GENEVA. WE HOPE THAT OUR PROPOSAL FOR THE ELIMINATION OF ALL INTER-MEDIATE-RANGE NUCLEAR MISSILES WILL BE THE FIRST STEP IN A DISARMAMENT PROCESS WHICH WILL GO FAR TOWARD REMOVING THE SPECTRE OF FEAR WHICH HAUNTS MANKIND.

Your Holiness:

For the past several weeks we have consulted closely on the events in Poland by message, telephone and through our diplomatic representatives. I would like to respond in this letter to another joint concern, the prevention of nuclear war. Your letter of November 25 and a Delegation from the Pontifical Academy of Sciences described eloquently your convictions about the nature of nuclear war and the necessity of preventing its outbreak. On December 15, Cardinal Casaroli and I had an excellent and thorough discussion of the subject which I am sure he has reported to you in detail.

I fully share your horror at the disastrous consequences of nuclear conflict, the "last epidemic of mankind." I am determined to prevent such a catastrophe. Your words of encouragement were welcome as we begin our negotiations with the Soviet Union in Geneva. We hope that our proposal for the elimination of all intermediate-range nuclear missiles will be the first step in a disarmament process which will go far toward removing the spectre of fear which haunts mankind.

Finally, I would like to send you best wishes for the coming year. May we both successfully carry out our responsibilities to mankind.

Draft Reply to the Pope's Letter of November 25

Your Holiness:

I have received your letter of November 25 and read it with great care. I wholeheartedly share your hopes for peace and believe with you that the prevention of war -- whether nuclear or conventional -- must remain our most urgent task.

I am most grateful for your warm words of encouragement and good wishes as we begin our negotiations with the Soviet Union on intermediate nuclear weapons. The Geneva talks have great potential for reducing the danger of war, and for that reason have attracted widespread interest. The US approaches them seriously and in good faith. Our objective is an equitable agreement which will not only achieve significant reductions, but give neither side cause to feel its security is threatened, for only such an equitable outcome can lay the basis for lasting stability and peace, and thus reduce the likelihood that nuclear weapons will be used. To this end, as I stated in my speech of November 18, the US is prepared to agree to the elimination of all intermediate-range nuclear missiles. This would be a far-reaching step that would respond to mankind's hopes for these talks.

I reject, as you also do, Your Holiness, the doctrine that sees us as helpless creatures of inexorable fate. I am utterly convinced that we have it in our power to spare ourselves and our posterity the terrible catastrophe that war would bring. I accept your injunction -- heavy burden though it is -- that

those of us who lead the world's great nations have a special moral duty to remove for all time the danger of war of any kind.

I look forward to reviewing the study that your representatives will bring. I look forward as well to Cardinal Casaroli's visit as an opportunity to pursue our dialogue. Most of all, I am grateful for your prayers and your counsel.

Pope's Letter on Geneva and Nuclear War (U)

The letter from Pope John Paul II (Tab A), the text of which Bill Wilson earlier cabled, provides a kind of Papal keynoter for the INF negotiations which have just opened in Geneva. As foreseen, he has sent essentially the same text to Brezhnev. (U)

While alluding to the horrors which nuclear warfare would impose on humanity and expressing the hope that the Geneva talks will eventually lead to complete elimination of nuclear weaponry, His Holiness makes a specific request: that you meet with a delegation from the Pontifical Academy of Sciences later this month for the purpose of receiving a study which the Academy has completed on the dangers of, and catastrophic consequences likely to flow from, the resort to nuclear weapons. (C)

In this connection - though not specifically mentioned in the Pope's message - Vatican Secretary of State Cardinal Casaroli is planning to visit Washington December 15 and may well refer to the Academy's study (Casaroli will also have a number of other prominent issues on his mind, notably East-West relations, human rights, and Central America which he discussed with General Walters earlier this week). I understand that Bill Wilson has communicated directly with Mike Deaver on this subject and that Casaroli's visit is already under study in the schedulers' office. In the meantime, we feel that any decision to meet with the Academy delegation should depend on the actual contents of the study in question, particularly since a similar delegation will be planning to call on Brezhnev. We obviously want to avoid any suggestion that the Soviet Union and the U.S. are to be equated in the Vatican's anti-nuclear campaign. (C)

The State Department will shortly provide a suggested draft response to the attached letter, as well as specific recommendations concerning both the Casaroli visit and the Pontifical Academy initiative. (U)

Subject: Request for Appointment with the President: Vatican Secretary of State Casaroli

Agostino Cardinal Casaroli, the Vatican Secretary of State, will be in Washington on Tuesday, December 15 on a private visit. The Department recommends that the President agree to meet with Casaroli on that date. If the President's schedule permits, it would also be appropriate for him to host a small luncheon in Casaroli's honor.

Casaroli was scheduled to meet with the President on May 15 during an earlier private visit. He was en route to the United States when news was received of the attempt on the Pope's life, and he returned immediately to Rome.

Casaroli is John Paul II's principal advisor, with the functions and rank of a Prime Minister. During the Pope's recuperation he has emerged as a very powerful, influential, and trusted number two. He is responsible inter alia for the conduct of Vatican foreign policy, which often bears directly on our interests in Poland, Lebanon, Central America, and elsewhere. It is important that he receive attention at the highest level while he is in Washington.

We understand that Envoy to the Vatican William Wilson has also discussed this request with Presidential Assistant Michael Deaver.
