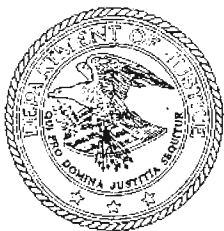

Paul H. Robinson, a Member of the United States Sentencing Commission, submitted his letter of resignation to the President on February 1, 1988.

I am recommending that ~~John R. Simpson~~ be Presidentially appointed to serve out the remainder of Mr. Robinson's term which will expire October 31, 1989. Under the statute which created the United States Sentencing Commission, no more than four members can be from the same political party. Mr. Simpson is an Independent.

Mr. Simpson is currently the Director of the United States Secret Service. He has served with distinction with the Secret Service since 1962, progressing through the career special agent ranks up to the position of Director in 1981. He has received a number of awards and is recognized as an able and effective administrator. His law enforcement background will be of great benefit to the Sentencing Commission. A copy of Mr. Simpson's resume is attached.

I strongly recommend approval of this appointment.

Dear Mr. President:

In view of the attention being given by the press and certain members of Congress to the recent resignations by several officials at the Department of Justice, I thought you would like to know that for the past several years, attorneys in our office have worked on cases before the Supreme Court in which the Government has had an interest and has been represented by the Solicitor General. We have also consulted on numerous occasions with other department attorneys about federal cases pending throughout the country challenging the constitutionality of an act of Congress.

In my opinion, the Department of Justice under Mr. Meese's leadership has been and now is sensitive to the issues of religious liberty. The press and members of Congress concerned about the override of your veto of the Civil Rights Restoration Act have not cited the valid concern of lawyers in Congress, in the Department of Justice and in the private sector that the language of the bill may invite frivolous litigation against religious institutions. The Attorney General was, in my opinion, wholly correct to advise you of this problem and recommend a veto, in view of alternative legislation that could have been adopted by the Congress.

I respect the professionalism of the attorneys with whom I have had contact at the Department of Justice. The selection of these attorneys, committed and loyal to the best interest of the United States, reflects well on Mr. Meese. He has shown commendable courage in seeking new and innovative approaches to solve the major issues confronting the entire judicial system, state and federal, in crimes against children and in the training of prosecutors to effectively prosecute violators of federal narcotics laws. As an American, I am proud of the work that has been done through the Department of Justice and I thank you for it.

When Attorney General Edwin Meese appeared before the Senate for confirmation of his appointment as Attorney General, I was not particularly impressed with him. I was never more surprised.


