

On November 7, we authorized the State Department to begin consultations with the Congress in support of a PD authorizing IMET for Yugoslavia. The Department has completed these consultations and has encountered no objections.

JUSTIFICATION FOR PRESIDENTIAL DETERMINATION TO PERMIT PROVISION OF INTERNATIONAL MILITARY EDUCATION AND TRAINING FOR YUGOSLAVIA

I. PROBLEM

Section 620(f) of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961, as amended (the Act), prohibits assistance under the Act to any Communist country, including Yugoslavia. In accordance with Sections 614(a) and 620(f) of the Act the President is authorized to waive this prohibition if he (1) determines that to do so is important to the security interests of the United States and (2) finds that such assistance is vital to the security of the United States; that Yugoslavia is not controlled by the international Communist conspiracy; and that such assistance would further promote the independence of Yugoslavia from international Communism.

The exercise of the President's authority in this case will permit continuation of training of Yugoslav officers at United States military institutions under the International Military Education and Training (IMET) program. An IMET program for Yugoslavia has been included in the Congressional Presentation Document in support of the FY 1984 security assistance budget and legislative proposals. The forthcoming determination relates to a program of \$130,000 in FY 1984.

II. JUSTIFICATION

Nonaligned Yugoslavia is strategically important because of its position between the Warsaw Pact and NATO and its long Adriatic Coast, access to which has been denied the Soviet Union since the Yugoslav-Soviet break in 1948. Every American President since that time has supported Yugoslavia's independence, unity, territorial integrity, and economic growth as vital to peace and stability in Europe, and therefore to the security interests of the United States.

UKCLASSIFIED

Yugoslav resistance to Soviet control, as well as its independent foreign and domestic policies, are well documented. Since Tito's defiance of Stalin and the Cominform and Yugoslavia's expulsion from the world Communist movement, Yugoslavia has been an outspoken advocate of the right of each country to follow its own course and has served as an example to other communist countries of an alternative "model" to Soviet-style communism. As a founding member of the nonaligned movement, Yugoslavia has frequently been highly critical of Soviet policies, condemning the invasion of Czechoslovakia in 1968 and Afghanistan in 1980 and calling for non-intervention in Polish domestic affairs. Additional evidence of Yugoslav independence from the Soviet Union was the visit of Chinese Communist Party General Secretary Hu Yaobang to Belgrade in May of 1983.

Although Yugoslavia imposes restrictions on many aspects of individual political behavior and holds several hundred political prisoners, its internal political system is notably more liberal than those of other communist states and has become steadily more so relative to them. Its decentralized system of self-management and workers' councils is markedly different from the centrally planned and controlled systems of the Soviet bloc. Finally, Yugoslavia allows its citizens a significantly greater degree of freedom, including the right to emigrate.

In the 1950s and early 1960s, U.S. support for Yugoslavia took the form of both military and economic assistance; during this period, the U.S. was Yugoslavia's largest military supplier. The resumption in 1980 of a training program for Yugoslav officers at U.S. higher military schools signals U.S. interest in establishing a linkage with future Yugoslav military leaders and supporting Yugoslavia's independent foreign and domestic policies. With respect to economic assistance, the United States has played an active role this year in putting together a multilateral financial assistance package designed to help Yuqoslavia through a short-term liquidity crisis.

For the foregoing reasons, a Presidential determination under Section 614(a) (1) and 620(f) of the Act in order to furnish IMET to Yugoslavia in the fiscal year 1984 is justified under the deridands provided for in law. Drafted:PM/SAS:RArtim:eot

In order to permit assistance to Yugoslavia under the International Military Education and Training (IMET) program provided in the fiscal year 1984 security assistance proposals, the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961, as amended (the Act), requires that you make certain determinations under Section 620(f) and 614(a) (1) of the Act. The determinations waive the prohibition of Section 620(f) of assistance to Communist countries. You made such a determination in October of last year (P.D. No. 83-1 of October 1, 1982; 47 F.R. 45859). Before you can make such a determination, however, Section 614(a) (3) of the Act requires consultations with, and the provision of a written policy justification to, the Congress.

I am here recommending your approval to proceed with such consultations and to provide the attached written justification to the Congress. We will then inform you of the results of these contacts and provide the determination for your signature.
