

"RESOLUTION

To express the solidarity and support of the Senate of Puerto Rico to the President of the United States, The Honorable Ronald Reagan, for his policy of patient, but decided firmness to fight international terrorism.

STATEMENT OF MOTIVES

For the past two decades a network of professional terrorists has clearly demonstrated an intent of weakening and demoralizing the democratic nations of the western world.

These terrorists have perpetrated criminal acts against the citizens, leaders and institutions of the democratic nations, trying to alter their way of life and destroy their systems of government, to achieve this purpose.

The victims of terrorism throughout the world, including women and children, are increasing from day to day, as a result of their policy of attacking weak and defenseless civilians.

Puerto Rico is one of the places that has had direct experience with the results of terrorism. We all indignantly remember the attack and the deliberate and systematic massacre of a group of Puerto Rican pilgrims at the Lod Airport in Israel. After these crimes were committed, we have seen the shocking spectacle of the kidnapping of planes and ships and their occupants, and the heartless murder of human beings.

It is obvious that international terrorism is not a sporadic phenomenon. It is a movement that has become rooted in the political ambitions and expansionist designs of certain nations, and the terrorist groups that serve as instruments of these countries. The countries that back terrorism as a means to achieve political goals resort to these barbaric acts since they are unable to engage in conventional warfare, and they underhandedly commit aggressive acts while they pretend to evade all responsibility for them and any subsequent retaliatory acts of self-defense on the part of any nation thus affected.

The western countries particularly the United States, in their concern about terrorism, have identified the countries that provide training, resources, sanctuary, safe-conduct and even shelter in their embassies to these terrorists. It has been substantiated that countries such as Libya support terrorism,

recognize it, and establish barriers to protect the terrorists. The Western powers are convinced that international terrorism would not be possible without the aid and support of governments such as Lybia, which use terrorism as a way of waging secret warfare against the western nations.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF PUERTO RICO:

Section 1.- All terrorist acts that take innocent lives and keep the world in a state of civil insecurity and anguish are hereby most vehemently condemned. We also condemn those governments and rulers that promote and support them, and express this Senate's solidarity with President Ronald Reagan and the American people's action in exercise of their legitimate right to self-defense."

STATEMENT OF MOTIVES

On February 5, 1986, President Ronald Reagan sent the budget for the 1987
fiscal year to the Congress. In said budget, the appropriations for government
programs of various agencies were cut. The Agricultural Programs Budget of the
Land Grant Colleges in Teaching, Investigation and Extension Services was

cut 59%. In Puerto Rico, this cut has a devastating effect on the funds and programs of the Agricultural Experiment Station and the Agricultural Extension Service. The local experiment station will lose 3.7 million dollars, which is equal to 49% of its federal budget.

The Agricultural Extension Service of Puerto Rico is an agency where some 700 professional and clerical staff workers are employed. In addition, it has an unpaid volunteer corps of around 7,507 persons who serve actively.

The proposed budget cuts would have a devastating effect on the nutrition, economy and education of the Puerto Rican people.

The Agricultural Extension Service states four basic principles:

1. the individual is supreme in a democracy
2. the home is the fundamental unit in civilization
3. the family is the prime educational group of the human race
4. the base of any permanent civilization must rest on man's relationship with the land


These principles or objectives can be attained by implementing and developing a diverse educational programs of great impact on Puerto Rican Society.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF PUERTO RICO:





HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE CONTINUATION OF THE SMALL BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION AND ITS PROGRAMS TO ASSIST SMALL BUSINESSES.

WHEREAS, small businesses are the backbone of our economy, both on a national and a statewide level, creating jobs and other economic opportunities, pioneering technological innovations, supplying new products and needed services, improving our standard of living, and providing overall economic vitality; and

WHEREAS, in recognition of the vital role of our small businesses in our community, the Small Business Administration (SBA) was created specifically to "encourage the spirit of entrepreneurship and the expansion of our economy"; and

WHEREAS, through its four major program areas of finance, procurement assistance, business development, and advocacy, the SBA has been a tremendous source of governmental assistance to meet the immediate and long-term needs of our small businesses; and

WHEREAS, these programs have provided the necessary capital, advice, counsel, and other support to help many small businesses throughout the Nation, including Hawaii; and

WHEREAS, the SBA, since it first began operations in Hawaii in 1958, has provided over \$305 million to assist many small businesses in Hawaii, helping to expand Hawaii's economic base and to promote economic well-being and stability; and

WHEREAS, President Ronald Reagan has proposed the abolishment of the SBA in both the fiscal 1986 and 1987 federal budgets; and

WHEREAS, Congress has resoundingly rejected the President's attempts to eliminate the SBA; and

WHEREAS, the President has recently appointed Mr. Charles L. Heatherly as the acting administrator of the SBA; and

WHEREAS, since his appointment on April 1, 1986, Mr. Heatherly, to date, has fired eight of the ten regional administrators of SBA, including the regional administrator of

district nine which includes Hawaii, reportedly because of their opposition to the President's plans to abolish SBA; and

WHEREAS, these administrative changes have adverse and detrimental consequences for the SBA, in effect fostering the President's plans to abolish SBA and defeating Congressional approval of the SBA; and

WHEREAS, this attempt to administratively nullify the SBA impacts adversely on small businesses, especially at a time when we, as a Nation and a State, need to foster small and new enterprises as our economy undergoes profound changes, as technology, resources, and global events transform the United States from a producer of goods and materials into a provider of services and information; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Thirteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1986, that this body requests the continuation of the Small Business Administration and its programs to assist small businesses; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this body strongly objects to the recent firings of the eight regional administrators of SBA; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this body expresses its strong support for the SBA and its programs to assist small businesses; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to President Reagan, members of Hawaii's congressional delegation, and Mr. Charles L. Heatherly, the acting administrator of the SBA.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

COMMENDING THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE AND ITS SUBSIDIARY, THE AGRICULTURAL RESEARCH SERVICE, ON THEIR CONTINUED SUPPORT OF AQUACULTURE DEVELOPMENT IN THE UNITED STATES.

WHEREAS, Congress has designated the United States Department of Agriculture as the lead federal agency for aquaculture development in the United States; and

WHEREAS, the United States Department of Agriculture funds and conducts most of its aquacultural research through its subsidiary agency, the Agricultural Research Service; and

WHEREAS, the mission of the Agricultural Research Service is to plan, develop, and implement research that is designed to produce the new knowledge and the technology required to assure the continuing vitality of the nation's food and agricultural enterprise; and

WHEREAS, through fundamental and applied research, the Agricultural Research Service provides the means to solve the technical food and agricultural problems of broad scope and high national priority as required to ensure perpetually an adequate supply of high-quality food and fiber for the American people and for export; and

WHEREAS, during the course of its on-going research, the Agricultural Research Service has recognized the key role that the State of Hawaii is playing in its efforts to develop commercially viable aquaculture ventures in the United States; and

WHEREAS, to support Hawaii's efforts in aquaculture development, the Agricultural Research Service has assigned one of its aquaculture scientists to this State and is considering assigning additional scientists in the near future; and

WHEREAS, in further recognition of Hawaii's role in this regard, the Agricultural Research Service is also considering the

establishment of a permanent ARS Station in Hawaii which would focus exclusively on aquaculture; and

WHEREAS, through these and other efforts, the United States Department of Agriculture and the Agricultural Research Service have unquestionably demonstrated their commitment to the development of aquaculture in Hawaii as well as on the mainland; now, therefore,







Whereas, the members of this body were shocked and horrified to learn of the explosion of the Challenger shuttle immediately after take-off at Cape Canaveral, Florida on Tuesday, January 28, 1986; and

Whereas, the Representatives have learned that the shuttle blew up within a scant minute of its blast-off; and

Whereas, it is with great sadness that the members learned of the death of the crew members of the Challenger;

A. Francis R. Scobee, age 46 commander of the flight, who was born and raised in Washington State, became an air force jet pilot and made his first space flight in 1984. He is survived by his wife, June, and 2 children;

B. Michael J. Smith, age 40, was the pilot of the Challenger and a commander in the United States Navy. He was born and raised in Beaufort, North Carolina and graduated from the United States Naval Academy, and he was selected as an astronaut in 1980, and the Challenger flight space mission. He is survived by his wife, Jane, and 3 children;

C. Ronald E. McNair, age 36, was born and raised in Lake City, South Carolina, received a Doctorate in Science from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and had made his first space flight in 1984. He is survived by his wife, Cheryl, and 2 children;

D. Air Force Lieutenant Colonel Ellison S. Onizuka, age 39, was a former aerospace engineer who was born in Kealakekua, Hawaii and was selected as an astronaut in 1978. The Challenger mission was his second space flight. He is survived by his wife, Lorna, and 2 children;

E. Astronaut Judy Resnick, age 36, was born and raised in Akron, Ohio and was selected as an astronaut in 1978 and took her first flight in 1984. She was a classical pianist and had earned a doctorate in engineering. Ms. Resnik was single;

F. Gregory Jarvis, age 41, was born in Detroit, Michigan and attended school and universities in New York and Massachusetts. He was flying on the Challenger as a Hughes aircraft company engineer, conducting tests on weightlessness. He is survived by his wife, Marcia; and

G. Sharon Christa McAuliffe, age 37, a Concord, New Hampshire high school social studies teacher who was the first private citizen selected in National competition to fly on the space shuttle. She was born in Framingham, Massachusetts and earned Bachelor's and Master's degrees. She is survived by her husband, Steven J. McAuliffe, and 2 children; and

Whereas, this terrible tragedy has cast a blight across our beloved nation, and we join our fellow Americans in prayer for these noble men and women;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved By The House Of Representatives of The State of New Mexico that it hereby extends its deepest sympathy and heartfelt condolences to the families of the crew of the space shuttle Challenger; and

SENATE RESOLUTION

URGING THE UNITED STATES AND THE SOVIET UNION TO SUPPORT PEACEFUL USES OF SPACE AND TO AVOID THE USE OF SPACE FOR WARFARE.

WHEREAS, the United States Congress, in spring 1984, adopted joint resolutions to support cooperative East-West ventures in space; and

WHEREAS, there are many current and potential uses of space, including planetary exploration, earth resources surveys, search and rescue surveillance, weather surveillance, military surveillance, communications, energy production for use on earth, and other types of systems that would be endangered by the development and operation of systems for space warfare; and

WHEREAS, space defense systems that would use laser beams, nuclear explosions, or other means, could also be used for offensive warfare purposes that might also endanger the civilian population on earth, and would violate the 1972 Antiballistic Missile (ABM) Treaty; and

WHEREAS, many military experts are of the opinion that complex space defense systems, designed to be used against enemy ballistic missile attacks, would be extremely costly, could never be tested under realistic conditions, and would be unlikely to ever lead to reductions in offensive nuclear weapon arsenals; and

WHEREAS, in addition, space defense systems would not be effective against cruise missiles and other low-trajectory missiles, nor against piloted bombers or most tactical nuclear weapons that might be used in conventional warfare; and

WHEREAS, in 1981 and 1983, the Soviet Union submitted to the United Nations a draft treaty that would "prohibit the stationing of weapons of any kind in outer space"; however, the Reagan Administration has not responded to this initiative but, instead, has proceeded with research and development on space defense systems, as well as the development and testing of a U.S. anti-satellite weapon system which is clearly a first step in the development of a space-based, ballistic-missile, boost-phase defense system; and

WHEREAS, in July 1983, the U.S. Senate Foreign Relations Committee approved a bipartisan resolution calling for negotiations on a mutual and verifiable ban on weapons in space and on weapons designed to attack weapons in space; now, therefore,


BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1986, that the United States and the Soviet Union are urged to reaffirm their commitments to the 1972 ABM Treaty and to undertake serious negotiations to immediately ban the further development of anti-satellite weapon systems, restrict research and development on space defense and space offense systems and, instead, promote cooperative ventures in the peaceful uses of space; and



WHEREAS, deplorable human rights abuses in South Africa occur daily, and in the past year have increased markedly; and

WHEREAS, thousands have been detained without trial for peaceful opposition to the government; hundreds have been tortured or ill-treated; anti-apartheid campaigners have been attacked in their homes or have disappeared; hundreds of people, including children, have been shot dead by police or military personnel; and

WHEREAS, pass books are issued to all Blacks over 16 years of age; and

WHEREAS, pass books are a means to control movement and employment, and bar the Black majority population of South Africa from choosing where to reside or work, from living with their families, and from exercising common political rights; and

WHEREAS, in 1984, over 235,000 Blacks were arrested under the pass laws, and then savagely treated; and

WHEREAS, detainees were held incommunicado by security police, and tortured, to force them to "confess" and implicate others; and

WHEREAS, they were reportedly beaten, given electric shock, threatened with execution, battered with sticks, and subjected to the worst types of humiliation, degradation, and inhumanity; and



(By Senators Kaufman, Holliday and Ash)

Supporting the National Childhood Vaccine Injury Compensation Act.

WHEREAS, The safety of the pertussis vaccine against whooping cough is the topic of current national debate and, while reasonable minds differ on more effective treatment, opponents and proponents both agree that a safer and more effective vaccine is needed; and

WHEREAS, The pertussis vaccine is known to have caused seizures, brain damage, mental retardation, deafness, blindness, muscle paralysis, and even death in young children; and

WHEREAS, It is important that parents be informed about diseases and vaccines against these diseases, it is equally important that parents be informed about adverse reactions to vaccines so that "high risk children" can be identified and screened out of the vaccination process; and, be it

Resolved by the Senate:

That the passage of the National Childhood Vaccine Injury Compensation Act, US Senate Bill No. 827, which would require the United States Department of Health and Human Services to promote the development of safer vaccines, and impose stronger standards of care and mandates for vaccine testing, warning, labeling, quality control, field surveillance, etc.; provide both doctors and parents with the information necessary to elicit and give genuine informed consent; require reporting, recording, and long-term follow up of major vaccine reactions to aid in screening out children at risk; preserve parents' unfettered access to the tort system (both to permit parents to choose the legal care most appropriate for their injured child and to retain the tort system's deterrent incentives against negligence in the manufacture and administration of mandated vaccines); offer an expeditious, non-adversarial, unbiased and adequate compensation alternative to the tort system for those parents who elect it; and provide emergency stand-by authority for Health and Human Services to assure adequate supplies of childhood vaccines if private insurance genuinely becomes unavailable to vaccine makers; is hereby supported as introduced, without amendments to weaken the bill; and, be it

Legislation which would call for the construction of a Korean War Memorial in the nation's capital (HR 2205 and S 1225), would appropriately address the issue of commemorating the valor of the more than 54,000 who were killed and the 8,000 who were unaccounted for, in addition to the more than 100,000 who were wounded; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, That we hereby memorialize the Congress of the United States to enact legislation, such as HR 2205 or S 1225, to provide for the construction of a Korean War Memorial in our nation's capital; and be it further

RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to the President of the United States Senate, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, and to the members of the Michigan congressional delegation.

Memorializing the Congress of the United States to revise the federal tax laws to provide a tax credit or a shorter depreciation period for the installation of fire suppression systems in commercial and residential properties.

Agreed to by the House of Delegates, January 30, 1986
Agreed to by the Senate, March 6, 1986

WHEREAS, each year fires are responsible for the loss of thousands of lives and millions of dollars in damage to valuable property; and

WHEREAS, a large portion of these deaths will be caused by uncontrolled fires in commercial and residential properties; and

WHEREAS, a majority of these deaths and most of the property damage might be prevented by technology which is now on the market; and

WHEREAS, many property owners would utilize this technology if tax incentives existed for the installation of fire suppression systems; and

WHEREAS, currently the Congress of the United States is revising the federal tax laws; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED by the House of Delegates, the Senate concurring, That the General Assembly of Virginia does hereby memorialize the Congress of the United States to provide in the revised federal tax laws an incentive to property owners who install fire suppression systems in accordance with Standards 13 and 13D of the National Fire Protection Association in their commercial and residential properties by allowing a ten percent tax credit on the cost of these systems or by designating these systems as short-life depreciable items; and, be it

Senate Resolution No. 27

Introduced by Senators Marks, Alquist, Ayala, Keene, Roberti, and Vuich

Relative to the federal Tax Reform Act of 1985

WHEREAS, The California State Senate is on record in support of a federal tax reform plan which promotes "fairness, simplicity, and growth," but many of the revisions in the federal "Tax Reform Act of 1985" do not promote these objectives; and

WHEREAS, California's cities, counties, special districts, and redevelopment agencies issued \$18 billion in long-term, tax-exempt debt in 1985 to promote such valuable public purposes as affordable housing, schools, hospitals, sewers, water lines, and public power facilities; and

WHEREAS, The United States House of Representatives has passed the "Tax Reform Act of 1985" to reduce the volume of tax-exempt debt issued by state and local governments and the United States Senate Finance Committee has begun hearings on these federal tax code revisions; and

WHEREAS, The California Senate Committee on Local Government held a special hearing on how the Tax Reform Act of 1985 would affect California's local governments; and

WHEREAS, The loss of tax-exempt financing will increase California's borrowing costs by an estimated \$4 billion while federal revenues will increase by just \$3 billion over the next five years; and

WHEREAS, The uniform volume limit in the proposed act will force local governments to compete to finance worthwhile public projects with fewer dollars, pitting hospitals against housing for senior citizens; and

WHEREAS, The uniform volume limit will specifically reduce multifamily mortgage revenue bonds by more than 90% and single-family mortgage revenue bonds by nearly 70%, thus seriously undercutting California's efforts to produce more affordable housing; and

WHEREAS, Because the proposed requirement in the act that bond proceeds be spent within 30 days is unrealistic and proposed new definitions in the act for qualified bonds are unclear, many bonds for needed public works will become taxable, thereby boosting local borrowing costs; and

WHEREAS, The January 1, 1986, effective date of the "Tax Reform Act" places an unfair and unreasonable burden on California's local governments and taxpayers of complying with the fundamental changes in the proposed act even before it is enacted; and

WHEREAS, The January 1, 1986, effective date has brought the

California tax-exempt bond market nearly to a halt, with only two local tax-exempt financings worth \$60 million having been completed in California and filed with the California Debt Advisory Commission since January 1, 1986, as compared with 35 financings worth \$300 million in January 1985; and

WHEREAS, Tax-exempt bonds issued in 1986 could become retroactively taxable to January 1, 1986, if the proposed act becomes law; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Senate of the State of California, That the Members of the Senate of the State of California respectfully memorialize the President and the Congress of the United States to carefully consider how the loss of tax-exempt financing for California outweighs the expected increase in federal revenues, particularly at a time when California's local governments will lose substantial revenues from the end of federal General Revenue Sharing and from the federal Gramm-Rudman-Hollings Law; and be it further

Resolved, That the Members of the Senate respectfully request the California congressional delegation to pursue postponement of the effective date in revisions to the tax exempt bond provisions of the tax code to either the date of its enactment or a date certain in 1987; and be it further

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Senate transmit copies of this resolution to the President and Vice President of the United States, to the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and to each Senator and Representative from California in the Congress of the United States.

Relative to the dairy herd buy-out program

WHEREAS, California agriculture is deeply buried in its worst financial crisis since the Great Depression; and

WHEREAS, The beef cattle industry in this state is one of the segments of California agriculture that can least afford price instability at this time; and

WHEREAS, The California beef cattle industry represents a \$2 billion industry, consisting of approximately 3,500,000 head of beef cattle; and

WHEREAS, The beef cattle market is governed by the supply and demand concept based on an orderly marketing process and has never received any governmental subsidies or price supports; and

WHEREAS, It is the intent of a portion of the Food Security Act of 1985's Milk Price Support and Producer-Supported Dairy Program, commonly referred to as the dairy herd buy-out program, to avoid the creation of burdensome excess supplies of milk or milk products; and

WHEREAS, It is difficult to adjust the number of dairy cows without impacting the red meat market; and

WHEREAS, The dairy herd buy-out program, which has critically impaired this orderly process, will place an estimated 115,000 dairy cows in California on the market, resulting in a severely depressed market price to all beef cattle producers; and

WHEREAS, Preliminary estimates indicate that the California beef cattle industry alone can anticipate to lose over the next six months approximately \$250,000,000 in reduced beef price sales; and

WHEREAS, The Food Security Act of 1985 gave the United States Secretary of Agriculture broad powers to carry out the dairy herd buy-out program over an 18-month period, beginning April 1, 1986; and

WHEREAS, Sixty-five percent of the dairy herd buy-out program is scheduled to occur within the next five months; and

WHEREAS, The Food Security Act of 1985 furthermore requires that the United States Secretary of Agriculture, in determining the conditions of this program, minimize the adverse effect of the dairy

herd buy-out program on beef, pork, lamb, and poultry producers; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Senate of the State of California, That the Members memorialize the United States Secretary of Agriculture to exercise the secretary's authority under the Food Security Act of 1985 to restore price stability for the beef cattle producers, in particular; and be it further

Resolved, That the secretary is requested to reallocate the dairy herd purchases as evenly as possible over the three six-month periods of the Milk Price Support and Producer-Supported Dairy Program; and be it further

Resolved, That the secretary is requested to allocate as evenly as possible its purchases of dairy cows on an equal daily basis within each six-month period; and be it further

Resolved, That the secretary is requested to immediately commence purchasing red meat on a daily basis in direct proportion to the amount of dairy cows slaughtered each day; and be it further

Resolved, That the secretary is requested to distribute the red meat purchases into new market channels that will not compete with previously existing markets; and be it further

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Senate transmit copies of this resolution to the United States Secretary of Agriculture and to each Senator and Representative from California in the Congress of the United States.




