SUBJECT: NEW YORK — POLITICAL BRIEFING

### STATE POLITICAL BACKGROUND

- o Presidential election results: (36 electoral votes)
  - 1984 statewide: Reagan 54.0% Mondale 46.0%
  - 1980 statewide: Reagan 47.5% Carter 44.8% Anderson 7.7%
- o In 1984, President Reagan carried every county in New York State except Erie, Albany and four of the five New York City counties -- only Staten Island supported the President. Two-thirds of Mondale's margin in the city was erased by a 308,000 Reagan plurality in Nassau and Suffolk Counties.
- o Republicans have:
  - won 5 of the last 9 presidential elections since 1952;
  - won 4 of the last 8 U.S. Senate elections since 1962;
  - won 3 of the last 6 gubernatorial elections since 1962.
- o U.S. Rep. Jack Kemp (R-NY 31) has begun positioning himself to run for the Republican presidential nomination in 1988.

### STATE POLITICAL SUMMARY

- o New York's primary elections are scheduled for Sept. 2. The filing deadline is July 10.

## U.S. SENATE:

- o Freshman Republican Alfonse D'Amato (1980-44.9%; 1985 Americans for Democratic Action rating-20; American Conservative Union-70), seeking re-election in 1986, has a solid campaign war chest (over \$7 million with \$4.2 million cash-on-hand), is known for his good constituent service and has an image of taking care of the state in Congress.
- o The Democrat candidates are former State Power Authority chairman John S. Dyson, who received the state convention endorsement; and attorney and former Ralph Nader aide Mark Green, who received the necessary convention support to be placed on the September primary ballot.
- o A June Marist Institute for Public Opinion survey (n=608 voters) showed D'Amato with a 60% approval rating. The survey also showed that 49% of those likely to cast votes in the Senate election were uncommitted as compared to 40% in January. Of the rest, 37% plan to vote for D'Amato, while 14% plan to vote against him.
- o A May Gannett News survey showed D'Amato ahead of Dyson by a 64%-14% margin. D'Amato had a 70% favorable rating.

## GOVERNOR:

- o Cuomo announced on May 19, 1986 that he is running for re-election. He would not however totally discount a run for the Democrat presidential nomination in 1988. Cuomo has a \$9 million plus campaign war chest and is considered the favorite in this race.
- o Another candidate seeking the Democrat nomination is Judah Rubenstein, a member of Lyndon LaRouche's National Democratic Policy Committee.
- o The Republican candidate is Westchester County Executive Andy O'Rourke, who also received the Conservative Party nomination. O'Rourke plans to stress economic issues in his campaign as well as the municipal corruption scandal in New York City and the Governor's failure to step into the situation.
- o According to Newsday (6/8/86), the opening weeks of the Cuomo-O'Rourke campaign have looked like a race that could easily degenerate into personalities and mudslinging despite the insistence of both principals that they are running on the issues.
- o Democrats are expected to continue criticizing O'Rourke's private law practice during his tenure as a county legislator. O'Rourke says he does not recall representing clients before county agencies, but Democrats are looking for conflict-of-interest problems and examining the criminal cases that O'Rourke handled before the district attorney, over whose budget he had some control.

- o A May Gannett News survey showed Cuomo leading O'Rourke by a 65%-12% margin. Cuomo's favorability rating was 74% O'Rourke's name ID stood at 38%. A private poll taken in February for the O'Rourke campaign put his name ID at 25%.

U.S. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES: 15 Republicans 19 Democrats

- o In 1984, Republicans had a net gain of one seat.
- o On April 10, Democrat U.S. Rep. Joseph P. Addabbo (NY-6), Chairman of the Appropriations Subcommittee on Defense, died after having been in a coma since March 6. He had cancer of the bladder and had suffered a heart attack triggered by the spread of cancer to the brain. In the June 10 special election, Unity Line candidate Floyd Flake narrowly defeated the endorsed Democrat candidate, state Assem. Alton Waldon, by only 41 votes on election night. However, when absentee ballots were counted Waldon had apparently won. A court fight is expected because Flake's name was not on the absentee ballots.
- o Key 1986 races:
  - 1st C.D. (Long Island - Eastern Suffolk County): Four-term GOP Rep. William Carney (1985 ADA-10; ACU-71) has announced his retirement. He said it was due to lack of support from the local GOP because of his support of Shoreham. The GOP primary candidate is Suffolk legislator Gregory Blass. The Democrat candidates are state Assem. George Hochbrueckner, the 1984 candidate, and Suffolk County legislator Steve Englebright. Opposition to the Shoreham nuclear power plant is extremely strong in the district.
  - 20th C.D. (Central and Southern Westchester): Freshman GOP Rep. Joseph J. DioGuardi (1985 ADA-10; ACU-67) may have a rematch against Oren Teicher, a former aide to ex-Rep. Dick Ottinger. Teicher is expected to face a primary challenge from former U.S. Rep. Bella Abzug; Doris Battalia, the Mamaroneck Town Supervisor; and Richard Berman, a former New York University Medical Center executive vice president.
  - 27th C.D. (Central - Syracuse): Three-term GOP Rep. George Wortley (1985 ADA-15; ACU-76) is being challenged by Syracuse Public Service Commissioner Rosemary Pooler (D).
  - 30th C.D. (West - Part of Rochester; Batavia): Freshman Republican Fred Eckert (1985 ADA-15; ACU-95) will be challenged by Assem. Louise Slaughter (D), if she survives a primary election against Monroe County Legislator William Bastuk (D).
  - 34th C.D. (Southern Tier - Jamestown; Elmira): Five term Democrat Stan Lundine (1985 ADA-70; ACU-14) is running for lieutenant governor as Gov. Cuomo's runningmate. The GOP candidate for the seat is Amory Houghton, an owner of Corning Glass Company in Corning, New York. The Democrat candidate is Cattaraugus County District Attorney Larry Himelein. This is a targeted seat for both parties.

## STATE LEGISLATURE:

- o State Senate: 35 Republicans 26 Democrats  
State Assembly: 56 Republicans 94 Democrats
- o In 1986, all 211 seats in both chambers are up for election.

STATE AND LOCAL ISSUES

- o Gov. Cuomo's legislative office has estimated that proposed cuts from President Reagan's budget in domestic programs would mean a loss of \$2.5 billion for the state. New York City alone could lose more than \$1 billion. But while domestic programs would suffer, the state's defense industry would benefit.
- o One of the biggest issues in New York City is the investigation into municipal corruption which began with the Parking Violations Bureau scandal.
  - Donald Manes, former Queens borough president and Queens party chairman, was implicated in a bribery and kickback scheme involving collection agencies used by the PVB before he succeeded at his second suicide attempt on March 13.
  - The investigation of Manes first bungled suicide attempt (Jan. 10) exposed the city's biggest corruption scandal in 15 years and revealed several flaws in the structure of the municipal government.
  - So far there have been more than eleven people indicted including Bronx Democratic Chairman Stanley Friedman.
  - GOP gubernatorial candidate Andy O'Rourke has indicated he plans to make an issue of the scandals and the Governor's failure to step into the situation.
  - Privately, the Democrats fear that this matter may go farther than just the New York City government. Because the scandal is centered in Queens, Gov. Cuomo's home territory, some Democrats fear it may go as high as the governor's office.
  - The impact on statewide election politics is uncertain. However, in two districts with majority Democrat registration (a Senate seat and an Assembly seat), Republicans won special elections held in each district.
- o New York City's expanding corruption scandal may hurt the city in Congress. There are those in Congress who are beginning to comment that key urban aid programs such as revenue sharing (\$276 million per year to the city) and community development block grants (\$332 million last year to the state) don't deserve much protection in budget deliberations because the funds might end up with crooked politicians and developers. An additional problem for cities is that Mayor Koch is the national urban leader in the battle to save revenue sharing.

I. PURPOSE

To participate in activities celebrating the restoration of the Statue of Liberty and the relighting of her torch.

II. BACKGROUND

Liberty Weekend, July 3-6, is a national celebration honoring the restoration of the Statue of Liberty. This four-day festival will feature concerts with famous entertainers, ethnic festivals, a naval review and "Operation Sail." Although some events have high ticket prices, the majority of activities are open to the public free of charge and will be covered by live television around the world.

The Opening Ceremonies begin with your and Mrs. Reagan's arrival on Governor's Island on the evening of July 3rd. The first part of the show will consist of several production numbers, a short historical film on the Statue of Liberty, and brief remarks by President Mitterand. Following President Mitterand's remarks, television coverage will switch to Ellis Island where Chief Justice Warren Burger will swear-in 2500 new citizens. Simultaneously, by satellite, over 30,000 new citizens will be sworn-in around the country.

Television coverage will switch back to Governors Island for remarks by David Wolper, Secretary Hodel, and Lee Iacocca. Mr. Iacocca will introduce you and you will make brief remarks. Following your remarks, you will push a button that will "unveil" the restored Statue. The unveiling will be a full extravaganza with laser beams and special effects to slowly light the Statue piece by piece.

Following the unveiling of the Statue, you will present 11 medals of liberty to a group of outstanding Americans who have immigrated to our country. (The twelfth recipient, Irving Berlin, is unable to attend.) See Tab A for complete list.

At the conclusion of the medal presentation, the ship captains from "Operation Sail" and the International Naval Review will file by, each carrying a lighted torch from their country to be placed in a special cauldron. Following brief remarks, you will relight the torch by setting in motion a "travelling flame" that will move across the harbor and up the Statue of Liberty. At this point the entire harbor will be flooded with light. The evening concludes with an orchestral piece.

Friday morning, July 4th, you and Mrs. Reagan depart for the U.S.S. Iowa where you will join Secretaries Shultz, Weinberger and Lehman in reviewing naval vessels from around the world. At the conclusion of the Naval Review, you will helicopter to Governor's Island to view a portion of Operation Sail '86 before your luncheon with President Mitterand. Upon the conclusion of your luncheon, you will helicopter back to Pocantico Hills.

The evening of July 4th, you and Mrs. Reagan will join navy servicemen and their families who will have just concluded an informal Fourth of July dinner aboard the U.S. John F. Kennedy aircraft carrier. After viewing a portion of the evening's entertainment, you will be making a brief Fourth of July Address to the Nation. An International Fireworks Display including over 40,000 fireworks launched from 30 barges surrounding lower Manhattan will conclude the evening's festivities.

On July 5, after Mrs. Reagan has formally reopened the Statue of Liberty, you depart for Camp David.
