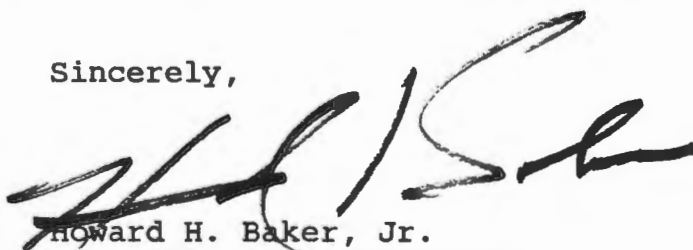

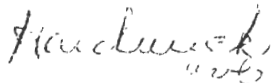

I would hope that many of you in this audience will study the past more carefully so as to serve the future more usefully. I hope you will understand it is not necessary to think of yourself as "marked for greatness" in order to do great things.

I hope you will remember that there is much in history to inspire you, and much to appall you, but all of history has something to teach you. It even teaches ancients like me something every day.

9. So you do me more honor than you may have intended by endowing this chair in my name. I am deeply grateful for this, and for everything The McCallie School has done for me from the days of my youth.

I look forward to seeing the history that each of you will make. I am indebted to those who were generous enough to endow this chair. And I leave you with the good counsel which adorns the entrance to the National Archives in Washington: "What is past is prologue. Study the past."

HB TALKING POINTS FOR THE McCALLIE SCHOOL, SEPTEMBER 24, 1987.

1. In my line of work, it is customary to begin remarks to public gatherings with the words "I am honored to be here." As you might expect, the honor is a bit greater on some occasions than on others.

2. But I can honestly say no honor has been more special to me than the creation of the Howard Baker Chair in American History at The McCallie School.

3. When I first came here as a student in the early 1940's, I never dreamed this day would come -- and neither did anybody else.

4. But that is what makes history itself so fascinating: the surprising nature of it, the things that happen that no one can foresee, the transformation of the incredible into the commonplace.

Too many people in this world have too little faith in the enduring ability of mankind to do more than is expected of us. One of my favorite quotations from history is that of the former head of the U. S. Patent Office, who in 1897 proposed that his office be closed because "whatever can be invented, has been invented."

I came along about thirty years later, and in the space of my own generation, the world has gone from the buckboard to the Concorde.

5. But the proliferation of technological progress does not tell the whole story of history. Thomas Carlyle wrote that "history is the biography of great men," and there is much to what he says.

6. Without wishing to inject any partisan notes in this non-partisan gathering, I would nevertheless state my belief that I am working for such a man now. I believe that Ronald Reagan is already being viewed -- and will continue to be viewed -- as a truly historic President.

He has already made a great deal of history over the last seven years, and he is prepared to make a great deal more in the final sixteen months of his presidency. And, true to the wholly unpredictable course of history, he is doing it in surprising ways.

This staunchly anti-communist man is very close to reaching an agreement with the Soviet Union to eliminate a whole class of nuclear weapons in Europe.

From time to time we have considered the idea of asking important people to speak to our assembled buyers. About things like the economy, what will happen as a result of recent government actions, etc. Or whatever they think is important to the U.S. public.

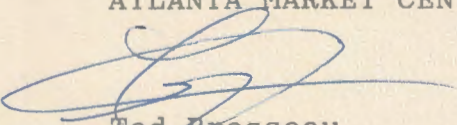
On the premise that we might as well start with the best, we'd like you to be our first major speaker.

It has been several years since Mr. Jim MacArthur introduced us, and we had dinner together.

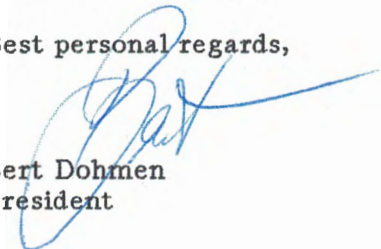

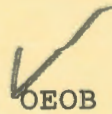

Dear Senator Baker:

In 1958 President Dwight D. Eisenhower issued a Presidential Proclamation designating the first Law Day. In his Proclamation President Eisenhower stated that it was fitting that the "people of this Nation should remember with pride and vigilantly guard the great heritage of liberty, justice and equality under the law which our forefathers bequeathed to us". For over thirty years the United States has observed Law Day in an effort to honor and remember our dedication to this heritage. Since 1976, New England School of Law has been the only law school in Boston that has continuously observed Law Day.

On Friday, March 25, 1988, New England School of Law will hold its annual observance of Law Day. During the afternoon portion of the day-long observance, we will sponsor a number of panel discussions and presentations on current legal and political issues. During the evening portion of the observance, we will serve a semi-formal dinner to more than 800 guests.

The Law Day dinner program will include an awards ceremony and a keynote address. Dinner guests will include students and alumni of the law school, its faculty, administration and trustees, and numerous judges and elected and appointed public officials. We write to you today to determine whether you would be available on March 25th to deliver the Law Day dinner's keynote address.

We seek a keynote speaker for our Law Day dinner who will speak to the theme of the observance. The theme adopted by the American Bar Association for the 1988 Law Day programs nationwide is "Legal Literacy". If we are to "vigilantly guard" our legal heritage, as President Eisenhower encouraged us to do, we must understand it. This year's theme seeks to encourage the study and understanding of our legal heritage

The educational activities of our Law Day program will focus on enhancing our understanding of complex and changing legal issues which affect our lives. For example, one panel discussion will deal with the emerging area of ground water systems pollution. Another panel will deal with the current debate concerning the benefits and liabilities of the prisoner release system.

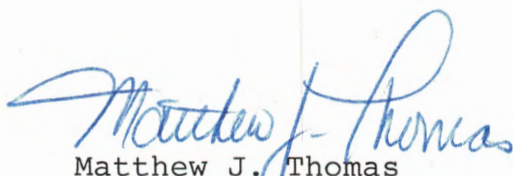

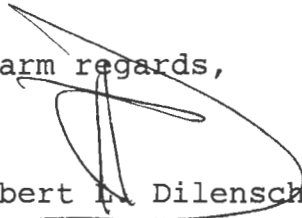
Bob Gray told me to be ready to meet one of the most adroit public speakers of my life. You certainly lived up to that billing at the New York Economic Club.
