SUBJECT: Fourth Draft National Plan of Action on Emergency Mobilization Preparedness

The fourth draft of the Plan of Action, which incorporates the changes suggested at the January 12 Board meeting is forwarded.

- The Plan of Action has been divided into two sections: a promulgation section for the President's signature, and the actual implementation measures for the Chairman's signature. The language in the promulgation section makes it clear that the implementation measures are a part of the National Plan of Action.
- The language in the promulgation statement concerning the responsibility of non-lead Agencies for milestones has been modified to include a safety valve which will ensure that any dispute between Agencies may be raised to the Board for resolution.
- The language in the RESPONSIBILITIES section concerning reporting has been modified so that Working Group Chairmen, in their role as monitor, will advise Agency members and the Executive Secretary of potential shortfalls; and to provide that the delinquent Agency report an actual exception to the Chairman after it occurs.
- OMB has been added as a party to the Industrial Mobilization Conferences for measure B-4 on page 10.
- The measures and milestones that required additional funding in FY83 and FY84 have been reordered so that the measures can be completed within current and projected budgets. The chart at Attachment 1 displays the revised cost data reflecting the reordering.

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- The revised implementation measure J-4 has been included; however, it has not yet been approved by all the members of the Working Group. (The ECWG is requested to complete this approval step prior to January 29, 1983, and notify the Secretariat).
- So that all Agencies will be aware of their involvement, a matrix is at Attachment 2 showing the lead agency and participating agencies. If the matrix requires change it should be marked and returned to the Secretariat when responding to this memorandum.

Please review this fourth draft and provide comments prior to close of business January 28. If you provide no comments by January 28, you will be indicating concurrence with the Plan of Action as written. If possible, I plan to forward the final Plan to the Chairman on Monday, January 31, 1983, for submission to the President.

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PROMULGATION OF THE
NATIONAL PLAN OF ACTION ON
EMERGENCY MOBILIZATION PREPAREDNESS

DRAFT

The National Policy Statement on Emergency Mobilization Preparedness (NSDD-47 dated July 22, 1982) recognizes the obligation of government to provide for the security of the Nation and to protect its people, values, and its social, economic, and political structures.

It states:

"It is the Policy of the United States to have an emergency mobilization preparedness capability that will ensure that government at all levels, in partnership with the private sector and the American people, can respond decisively and effectively to any major national emergency with defense of the United States as the first priority."

The National Plan of Action on Emergency Mobilization Preparedness is promulgated to assure improvement in our preparedness capability in accordance with the National Policy Statement.

The Plan of Action consolidates the emergency mobilization preparedness programs and functions which will be carried out by the Federal Government in partnership with other levels of government and the private sector. Each Department and Agency will discharge its responsibilities under the National Plan of Action. Departments and Agencies are directed to cooperate in meeting the requirements of those Agencies which are designated responsible for the milestones. Unresolved issues between Departments and Agencies will be referred to the Emergency Mobilization Preparedness Board for resolution. Each Department and Agency will program and budget the funds and personnel necessary to accomplish the measures described in the National Plan of Action. The resources to fund the emergency mobilization preparedness measures in the National Plan of Action are to be accorded priority status by each Department and Agency during the budget process.

I direct the Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs to issue Plan of Action implementation measures and to advise and assist me in their accomplishment. He will report to me periodically on the performance of Departments and Agencies which have primary and support responsibility for the measures in this Plan of Action.

The implementation measures are the essential first steps in achieving an effective emergency mobilization preparedness capability. The implementation measures are dynamic and will be updated by the addition of new or revised measures as necessary.

RESPONSIBILITIES

The President also has directed me to advise and assist him in the implementation of the Plan of Action. To aid me in that task, the Emergency Mobilization Preparedness Board will monitor implementation of the Plan. It will resolve issues within the framework of current Administration policy. Any issue which cannot be resolved by the Board will be referred to the National Security Council for resolution and Presidential decision.

The Board will be assisted by the Working Groups which will monitor the progress of the Departments and Agencies as they accomplish the milestones. When it appears that a milestone will not be accomplished on time; the Working Group Chairman concerned will advise the responsible Agency members on the Working Group and the Executive Secretary of the potential shortfall and its implications. Departments and Agencies which cause a shortfall of a milestone will report the exception to the Chairman of the Board. The reports will be prepared by the appropriate Department or Agency and submitted within three weeks following the end of a fiscal quarter, and will specify the missed milestone and provide an explanation for the exception.

The Secretariat will continue to assist the Board and the Working Groups in carrying out their assigned functions. For example, the Secretariat will review any exception reports and work with the concerned Agencies and Working Group Chairmen to arrive at corrective recommendations to be presented to the Chairman of the Board.
