

Dear Sen. Baker:

I want to add my voice to the immense sigh of relief we are hearing all over the National Capital Region and throughout much of the U.S. over your assuming the helm of chief executive of the President's White House staff.

You do not know me personally--although I have met you several times, briefly-but you were responsible for my being here in Washington,D.C. In 1972, I was senior editor of JET magazine and a contributing editor of Ebony, living in Hyde Park, Chicago, when I resigned to come here to work for Benjamin L. Hooks, the first Black in history to be appointed to the Federal Communications Commission. You appointed that man and I became his special assistant. We were the first Blacks of policymaking rank on that rulemaking, independent commission of congress.

Our trials, travails and triumphs during the more than five yearson that commission would be grist for a rather lengthy book or novel.

For the present, let me say I have always found you to be a compassionate man, sensitive, understanding, intelligent-- never heard a mean word or witnessed nasty act emanating from your office. Strange, too, for a white man, a Repbulican and a Southerner. You kinda restored -- no, that's not the right word; rather, you forced me to accept the possiblity that there might be another white , Southern Republican with honesty and some probitive value at his core.

Ben Hooks has gone on, as you know, to greater glory-- heading the NAACP and becoming the Number One Black civil rights leader in the U.S. I have traveled hither and yon. Presently I am director of Public Information Services for the National Cacucus and Center On Black Aged, Inc., a small underfunded charitable organization that devotes almost its entire energies to addressing the horrendous problems of the nationa's Black aged, one of the fastest growing groups in the U.S.

Whatever road I take, I shall always be grateful to you for providing me the opportunity to come to the nation's capital (which my wife and I dearly love) and become part, if only a small part, of the many great historic events that have transpired here in the past 15 years.

I will not offer you congratulations. That more appropriately should be directed to the President of the U.S. My deepest sympathy and commiseration should be extended to you as you undertake your awesome task. Nevertheless, it is my firm belief that if any one man cambring back a semblance of trust and credibility to the center of our government, that man is you.

You should know that I stand ready to assist you in anyway I can, should you find the need of my support.



Real politik suddenly surfaced in 1948 when Tito broke with the Cominform and the hard realities of fallen American fliers were absorbed by somber new realities. Later over one hundred and seventy American mariners were killed by heavy Israeli air attacks on the U.S.N. communications ship "Liberty", when the very existence of that nation hung on a genuine threat of a preemptive Arab invasion and occupation. Surely we all remember the Eisenhower preparations for a redemptive strike in Cuba only to be followed by the fateful Bay of Pigs.

We have a National Security, Boland and other Acts but an open society must have access to the means for survival or it may indeed be lost. Elliot Ness probably never sent Al Capone advance copies of his daily schedule. We struggle heroically to sustain the rule of law and the freedom of information.
