SUBJECT: Follow-on Talks with the British, June 27, 1985

On Thursday, June 27, 1985 you are scheduled to chair a meeting with our British counterparts for follow-on talks on combatting/ countering terrorism. As before, you will chair the U.S. side, which shall include Amb Oakley, Charlie Allen, and North. Attending from the British side will be:

- Mr. David Goodall, Deputy Chairman, Joint Intelligence Committee
- Mr. Robin O'Neill, Assistant Under Secretary,
Foreign and Commonwealth Office
- Mr. Martin Morland, Chief of the Assessments Staff,
Cabinet Office
- Mr. David Hannay, Minister, British Embassy
- Mr. Roger Bone, Joint Intelligence Committee Representative
in Washington (replacement for Andrew Green)

The meeting is scheduled to run as follows:

- 11:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m. Working Luncheon in WHSR
- 12:30 noon- 2:00 p.m. Follow-on Discussions in WHSR

An agenda for the meeting is attached at Tab I. Talking points for your use are attached at Tab II.

There are no major bilateral differences with the UK on the subject of international terrorism. Senior British officials agree that state-sponsored terrorism, especially that centered in the Middle East, poses a serious threat to Western security interests and to international order. Nevertheless, British officials, focused on the threat posed by Irish terrorists, show little willingness to take punitive sanctions against Libya, Syria, or Iran--the principal states promoting international terrorism.

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The British have been concentrating more on preventing Middle Eastern terrorism from spilling over into Western Europe and the UK, rather than developing any strategy to combat Middle Eastern terrorism at its roots. The UK appears willing to work bilaterally with the U.S. on specific counterterrorist measures including civil aviation security, abuses of diplomatic privileges by states promoting terrorism, and the sharing of intelligence and other information on terrorists and terrorist groups. Both Sir Percy Cradock, Chairman, Joint Intelligence Committee and Foreign Affairs Advisor to PM Thatcher, and Robin O'Neill support bilateral discussions on specific measures in the wake of the TWA hijacking. We should use this opportunity to press the British hard on a broad range of terrorist issues and move them toward a position where they are willing to take political and economic sanctions against states sponsoring terrorism and, specifically, to support the steps we may have to take regarding Beirut.

That you approve the agenda at Tab I and use the points above and at Tab II during our meeting on Thursday.

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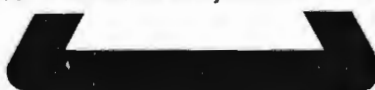

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MIPT: TERRORISM/LIBYA: FOLLOWING IS TEXT OF STATEMENT

'STATEMENT OF MINISTERS OF FOREIGN AFFAIRS OF THE TWELVE MEETING IN BRUSSELS ON JANUARY 27, 1986 ON COMBATING INTERNATIONAL TERRORISM

1. THE TWELVE REAFFIRM THEIR STRONG CONDEMNATION OF THE RECENT TERRORIST ATTACKS AT ROME AND VIENNA AIRPORTS WHICH ARE THE LATEST OUTRAGES IN THE PERSISTENT PHENOMENON OF INTERNATIONAL TERRORISM. THEY DEEPLY DEPLORE THE LOSS OF INNOCENT LIVES. THE TWELVE CONDEMN ALL FORMS OF INTERNATIONAL TERRORISM, THE PERPETRATORS, ACCOMPLICES AND INSTIGATORS AS WELL AS GOVERNMENTS THAT SUPPORT THEM. THEY CONDEMN STATEMENTS EMANATING FROM ANY QUARTER EXPRESSING SUPPORT FOR TERRORIST ATTACKS. SUCH TERRORIST ATTACKS CAN NEVER BE JUSTIFIED AND DO NOT SERVE WHATEVER POLITICAL CAUSE THE PERPETRATORS CLAIM TO BE ASSISTING.

2. THE TWELVE EXPRESS THEIR STRONG CONCERN ABOUT THE TENSION THAT HAS DEVELOPED IN THE MEDITERRANEAN. THEY REAFFIRM THEIR SUPPORT FOR URGENT PROGRESS IN THE SEARCH FOR A JUST, LASTING AND COMPREHENSIVE SOLUTION BY PEACEFUL MEANS OF THE PROBLEMS OF THE REGION AND THEIR READINESS TO PLAY A PART IN EFFORTS TOWARDS THAT END.' THE TWELVE EXPRESS THE WISH TO CO-OPERATE WITH ALL STATES INCLUDING THOSE IN THE REGION TO DENY TERRORISTS SUPPORT, COVER OR REFUGE. THEY ARE READY TO EMBARK ON A DIALOGUE IN THE MOST

/APPROPRIATE

APPROPRIATE MANNER WITH THE COUNTRIES OF THE REGION ON THE PROBLEM OF INTERNATIONAL TERRORISM AND THE NEED TO TACKLE ITS ROOTS.

STATES THAT FAVOUR OR PROTECT TERRORISTS CANNOT EXPECT INDULGENCE NOR CAN THEY EXPECT TO HAVE NORMAL RELATIONS WITH THE TWELVE.

THE TWELVE WILL STUDY IN WHAT WAY THEY CAN JOINTLY CLARIFY RESPONSIBILITIES FOR TERRORISTS ACTS. THEY CALL ON ALL COUNTRIES WHICH ARE SUPPORTING OR HAVE BEEN ACCUSED OF SUPPORTING TERRORISM TO RENOUNCE SUCH SUPPORT.

3. THE TWELVE WELCOME THE STRONG AND UNEQUIVOCAL CONDEMNATION OF ALL ACTS OF INTERNATIONAL TERRORISM RECENTLY EXPRESSED BY THE SECURITY COUNCIL AND THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE UNITED NATIONS.

4. THE TWELVE REITERATE THEIR DETERMINATION AND COMMITMENT TO COMBAT INTERNATIONAL TERRORISM IN ALL ITS FORMS. THEY HAVE REVIEWED AND INCREASED THEIR SECURITY ARRANGEMENTS AND CO-OPERATION IN AN EFFORT TO PREVENT FURTHER TERRORIST ACTS. IN THIS RESPECT THEY WELCOME AND FULLY SUPPORT THE RESOLUTION OF THE EUROPEAN PARLIAMENT OF 16 JANUARY 1986 IN WHICH THE REPRESENTATIVES OF THE EUROPEAN PEOPLES CONDEMNED IN THE STRONGEST TERMS THESE BARBARIC ACTS OF TERRORISM AND ASKED MINISTERS TO STEP UP CONSULTATIONS AND CO-OPERATION ON ANTI-TERRORIST MEASURES AND PUBLIC SECURITY.

5. THE TWELVE RECALL THEIR PREVIOUS DECISIONS AND EFFORTS TO CURB THESE OUTRAGES, IN PARTICULAR:

- THE AGREEMENT OF SEPTEMBER 1984 ON A SET OF PRINCIPLES TO INCREASE CO-OPERATION AGAINST INTERNATIONAL TERRORISM INCLUDING THE NEED FOR A JOINT RESPONSE IN THE EVENT OF A SERIOUS TERRORIST ATTACK INVOLVING THE ABUSE OF DIPLOMATIC IMMUNITY.
- THE RECOMMENDATIONS DEALING WITH THE HI-JACKING OF AIRCRAFT, ADOPTED BY THE MINISTERS OF THE INTERIOR AND JUSTICE IN JUNE 1985.
- THE DECISION OF JULY 1985 TO INCREASE CO-OPERATION ON AVIATION SECURITY.

EXPERTS OF THE TWELVE HAVE CONTINUED TO MEET ON NUMEROUS OCCASIONS DURING THE LAST MONTHS TO STRENGTHEN THEIR CO-OPERATION AND TO ELABORATE COMMON MEASURES.

6. THE TWELVE HAVE NOW DECIDED TO INTENSIFY THESE EFFORTS AND TO PROMOTE COMMON ACTION, PARTICULARLY IN THE FOLLOWING AREAS, BOTH TO IMPROVE THEIR OWN DEFENCES AGAINST TERRORISM AND TO DISCOURAGE THOSE WHO SUPPORT IT:

- SECURITY AT AIRPORTS, PORTS AND RAILWAY STATIONS,
- CONTROL BY MEMBER STATES OF PERSONS ENTERING OR LEAVING THE

/COMMUNITY

COMMUNITY AND CIRCULATING IN IT,

- VISA POLICIES WITH RESPECT TO THE PROBLEM OF TERRORISM,
- ABUSE OF DIPLOMATIC IMMUNITY,

THEY HAVE DECIDED TO ESTABLISH A PERMANENT WORKING BODY WITH A PRECISE MANDATE, WITHIN THE EUROPEAN POLITICAL COOPERATION, WHICH WILL MONITOR AND GIVE IMPETUS TO THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE ABOVE MENTIONED MEASURES.

7. FURTHERMORE, IN ADDITION TO RESTRICTIONS THEY ALREADY APPLY THE TWELVE DECIDED NOT TO EXPORT ARMS OR OTHER MILITARY EQUIPMENT TO COUNTRIES WHICH ARE CLEARLY IMPLICATED IN SUPPORTING TERRORISM.

THE TWELVE HAVE, IN ADDITION, DECIDED TO EXAMINE JOINTLY WITH SPECIAL CARE NATIONAL MEASURES DECIDED TO PREVENT THE EXPORT OF ARMS OR OTHER MILITARY EQUIPMENT FROM BEING DIVERTED FOR TERRORIST PURPOSES.

8. THE TWELVE WILL DO EVERYTHING WITHIN THEIR POWER IN ORDER TO ENSURE THAT THEIR NATIONALS AND INDUSTRY DO NOT SEEK ANY COMMERCIAL ADVANTAGE FROM MEASURES IN REACTION TO TERRORIST ATTACKS AND OTHER TERRORIST ACTIVITIES.

9. THE TWELVE WILL KEEP THE PROBLEMS OF INTERNATIONAL TERRORISM UNDER CONSTANT REVIEW AND TAKE APPROPRIATE ADDITIONAL MEASURES WHENEVER THE SITUATION REQUIRES IT.
