- I. PURPOSE: Signing ceremony of the Executive Order creating the the Task Force on Legal Equity for Women.
- II. BACKGROUND: During your campaign, you pledged to pursue the goal of equal rights for women by seeking to reform federal and state laws and regulations which discriminate unfairly on the basis of sex.

Soon after your election, you appointed a Special Assistant to the President to work with the 50 state governors to review discriminatory laws at the state level. The "50 States Project" is now well underway. You met with the governors' representatives in October to review their progress and reaffirm your commitment to their project.

The Justice Department, through its Civil Rights Division, will ferret out examples of discrimination in federal regulations and forward these through your Cabinet Council to you. After determining those areas where you wish to take action, the Task Force will implement the desired changes.

The Task Force on Legal Equity for Women consists of men and women from 21 major departments and agencies who are appointed by you after being recommended by their respective cabinet secretary or agency administrator. Members, in conjunction with their respective department or agency head, will have the responsibility for implementing changes in regulations. Task Force members have accepted this added responsibility to regular duties. Fourteen of the 21 members are women.

The Task Force Chairman is Carol E. Dinkins, Assistant Attorney General for Land Use and Natural Resources at the Department of Justice. She is your highest ranking woman appointment at Justice.

This new Executive Order supersedes various Carter Administration orders which served as his instruments to advance the ERA. In signing this Executive Order, you are eliminating the President's Advisory Committee for Women, originally chaired by Bella Abzug

and finally by Linda Johnson Robb. You are also eliminating an Interdepartmental Task Force which provided overall coordination of women's activities. (This should not be mentioned unless in reply to a specific question.)

- 11:32 a.m. Press pool enters.
- 11:34 a.m. You will read your statement and sign the Executive Order, after which you hand the pen to Carol Dinkins.
- 11:38 a.m. Press pool departs.
- 11:40 a.m. Elizabeth concludes meeting by announcing your introduction to each Task Force member, for a photo as they depart the room.
- 11:50 a.m. You return to the Oval Office.

BILL SIGNING: EXECUTIVE ORDER TASK FORCE ON LEGAL EQUITY
FOR WOMEN

Hello. Welcome to the White House. Decisions made in this room mold and shape the Federal policy. Today we are here to affirm again that sex discrimination, or any other discrimination for that matter, will not be tolerated in the Federal Government.

During the campaign I stated that although I was opposed to the Equal Rights Amendment, I was, nevertheless, dedicated to attacking the problem of discrimination against women. I think we've made progress in fulfilling this commitment. Judy Peachee has been appointed as my special assistant to vigorously pursue this objective. With her help in October, we launched the Fifty States Project to ferret out any remaining discriminatory laws at the State level. Judy is keeping me advised on the progress being made.

Admittedly, most of our attention in these first months of the Administration has been focused on putting America's economic house in order. I will have to say, however, I don't think anything could be more helpful to American women than reducing inflation and laying the foundation for solid economic progress. And we've accomplished more in this area than anyone would have predicted.

Of course, specific steps, other than the Fifty States Project have been taken. The Attorney General is systematically

reviewing laws and regulations with an eye to identifying gender-based discrimination. Also, I think we can take a little credit for making Sandra O'Connor the first female Supreme Court Justice.

Today we meet to move forward one more step. The Task Force on Legal Equity for Women will work to ensure that current and future regulations written by Federal departments and agencies, as well as laws passed by the Congress, do not discriminate because of sex. This is the first time there will be a working task force with a clear presidential mandate for this express purpose.

The people who will carry out this mandate were selected because of their ranking positions in the departments and agencies. Demonstrating the seriousness of our effort, members of the Task Force hold the rank of Assistant Secretary or the equivalent in the Cabinet departments, and the rank of Deputy Administrator in the independent agencies. Fourteen of the twenty-two members are women; all are in positions to effect change.

I have asked Carol Dinkins of the Justice Department to chair the task force. She has impressive legal experience in dealing with regulations and has chaired two regulatory review task forces in Texas. Furthermore, in her current position as an Assistant Attorney General, she has the responsibility for examining and analyzing laws and regulations. I believe she is ideally suited to manage the functions of

the task force and will take this responsibility with the seriousness it deserves.

And now, in pursuing our goal of equal opportunity for all Americans, it gives me sincere pleasure to sign this Executive Order, establishing the Task Force on Legal Equity for Women.

TAPING: ICA NEW YEAR'S MESSAGE
DECEMBER 21, 1981

It is indeed an honor for me to be able to extend to all of you best wishes for a happy New Year on behalf of the people of the United States. We look forward to the coming year as a time of opportunity. We hope and pray that good will and honesty will prevail and that mankind will be a little better for the things which we as individuals and as a nation will do in the year ahead.

This is, perhaps, a good time to reflect on the events of the preceding 12 months.

In the United States it was a time of rededication to fundamental American economic and political concepts, as mandated by the people in the elections of 1980. After a period of growth of government power, the people here decided that the time had come to move away from State control and regulation and toward something more consistent with America's system of freedom of enterprise and individual liberty. Reforms to this end will continue.

The United States in these last 12 months has been blessed with peace. The world should note that peace remains our goal and that all of our military might is dedicated to this noble end. Consistent with this, on November 18 and on behalf of the American people, I proposed to the Soviet Union a reduction of nuclear weapons threatening Europe. Negotiations between our two nations will continue this

effort in the months ahead. But the people of the world should recognize that the United States has already offered a plan to lower the number of land-based intermediate range missiles on the European continent to zero; any missiles remaining will not be the result of intransigence on the part of the United States.

For America's part, we take no joy in using our resources to produce weapons of war. In the last decade, in fact, the United States reduced the size of its armed forces and decreased its military spending. Sadly, this gesture was met by a massive build-up of Soviet forces. Let us hope that the current opportunity for arms reduction is not lost. Even more than the United States, the Soviet Union should realize that its resources are better spent on meeting the needs of its people rather than on producing instruments of destruction.

In 1981 senseless violence continued to plague the world. A great man in Egypt, a man of peace, was murdered. An attempt was made on the life of Pope John Paul, almost robbing the world of this sincere man of God. I, too, experienced a brush with mortality, and it helped me realize that we must use what time we have to further those values which will last after we as individuals are gone.

One of my predecessors observed "The chief ideal of the American people is idealism. . . America is a nation of

idealists." That is as true today as when President Calvin Coolidge spoke those words back in 1925.

Americans remain dedicated to those concepts of liberty that have provided our people with freedom and abundance. Furthermore, we are a nation composed of people who have come here from every corner of the world, people of many races and creeds who have learned to live together in peace and prosperity. Perhaps you know someone or have a relative who now lives here and is every bit as American as those who came here two centuries ago seeking freedom. In a very real sense all people who long for freedom are our fellow countrymen.

Because of this special American character, our hearts go out to those who suffer oppression. Last year we saw the workers of Poland struggle to edge their country closer to freedom. We saw the courageous people of Afghanistan battle against tremendous odds trying to cast off foreign domination. And while we cannot alter these and other heartrending dramas, we can and will make our moral commitment clear.

During my lifetime, I have seen the rise of fascism and communism, philosophies that glorify the arbitrary power of the State. These ideologies held, at first, a certain fascination for some intellectuals. But both theories fail to recognize God and deny those God-given liberties that are the inalienable right of each person on this planet. Because of this fundamental flaw, fascism has already been destroyed

and the bankruptcy of communism has been laid bare for all to see -- a system that cannot feed its people and is efficient only in producing machines of war.

Americans begin this new year with a renewed commitment to our ideals and with confidence that the peace will be maintained and that freedom will ultimately prevail. As a nation, we have faith in mankind -- our democratic system is based upon this faith.

So wherever you are, America sends to you a New Years wish of goodwill. To all who yearn to breathe free, who long for a better life, remember: We think of you; we are with you always.
