I. PURPOSE

To ask for support of the Broomfield-Carney-Stratton bipartisan nuclear arms control resolution.

II. BACKGROUND

The House is scheduled to consider Wednesday or Thursday of this week nuclear arms control resolutions. Two basic resolutions will be debated.

One resolution, which was reported by the House Foreign Affairs Committee and is cosponsored by Committee Chairman Clement J. Zablocki (D-Wisconsin), Congressman Jonathan B. Bingham (D-New York), and 176 others, provides for an immediate "mutual and verifiable freeze on the testing, production, and further deployment of nuclear warheads, missiles and other delivery systems . . . proceeding to pursue substantial, equitable, and verifiable reductions" and prompt approval of the SALT II agreement. The Administration strongly opposes this resolution.

The Administration-backed resolution cosponsored by Congressmen William S. Broomfield (R-Michigan), William Carney (R-New York) and Samuel S. Stratton (D-New York), and 171 others, which will be offered as an amendment in the nature of a substitute to the Zablocki resolution, endorses an equitable and verifiable START agreement that freezes strategic nuclear forces at "equal and substantially reduced levels."

In a Presidential letter of July 23, all Members of the House were urged individually to support the Broomfield-

Carney-Stratton resolution as an indication of American unity in seeking a reduction to equal levels of nuclear weapons, thereby enhancing the negotiating position of Ambassador Rowny and the START team.

The resolutions are open to amendment at any point. At least one amendment is expected to be offered to Zablocki; none to Broomfield. The legislative procedural strategy has been to push Members to support Broomfield notwithstanding the adoption of amendments as the only way to support the Administration and defeat Zablocki.

Social, professional, and religious groups have been active in contacting Members to urge support for the immediate freeze proposal.

TALKING POINTS

NUCLEAR ARMS CONTROL

- Since taking office, my foremost national security objective has been to reduce the risk of nuclear war.
- To help achieve this goal, we have embarked on START talks with the Soviet Union designed to negotiate reductions in the strategic arsenals of both sides.
- As we engage in these sensitive negotiations, we need to demonstrate clearly that the American people and Congress support the proposals carried by Ambassador Rowny to Geneva.
- The bipartisan resolution introduced by Bill Broomfield, Bill Carney, and Sam Stratton will do just that, and I strongly support their resolution.
- At the same time, I strongly oppose the House Foreign Affairs Committee freeze resolution. A freeze would lock the United States into a dangerous position of disadvantage and would remove the incentive for serious negotiation by the Soviets.
- In short, if your goal like mine is to reduce the risk of nuclear war, I urge you and your colleagues to vote for the Broomfield-Carney-Stratton resolution.
- I would like now to ask Secretaries Shultz and Weinberger to make additional comments.

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING WITH
CONGRESSMAN JACK KEMP

- Raising taxes is a very unpleasant task, and one which I do not like doing. Reducing spending is also not an easy chore for you or me.

- But we have to do it -- we need to comply with the First Budget Resolution -- the bill produced by the Senate is a good bill. It preserves nearly all of the business tax incentives enacted last year.

- I know you believe we are taking back much of last year's tax cut.

- But, I think you have to distinguish between imposing new taxes and collecting taxes owed. More than three-fourths of the revenue raised comes from increased taxpayer compliance and the closing of tax loopholes.

- Rather than imposing new taxes on working people, this bill tries to insure that everyone pays a fair share of the tax burden.

TALKING POINTS

- o The Senate has passed a bill which improves the fairness of the tax system and preserves the incentives necessary for economic recovery. The bill also includes the spending reductions mandated by the Budget Resolution. It is a measure which I support, and one which I hope you will support.

- o The bill will reduce projected budget deficits while maintaining the integrity of my economic recovery program. It preserves the individual tax rate reduction and indexing provisions enacted last year.

- o Rather than raising taxes on working people, the bill focuses on the elimination of unintended abuses, the removal of obsolete incentives, and improvements in taxpayer compliance.

- o More than three-fourths of the increased tax revenues come from increased taxpayer compliance and the closing of tax loopholes.

- o When combined with the tax reductions enacted last year, the taxpayers of this country will still receive substantial net tax reductions.

- o The bill preserves all of the individual marginal rate reductions and most of the basic ACRS changes enacted last year. In the aggregate, the Senate bill merely offsets the lost revenue due to the add-ons included in last year's bill.

- o Nobody likes to raise taxes, but failure to adopt a conference report similar to the Senate passed bill will result in an additional \$100 billion in deficits over the next three years. This could jeopardize the success we are now having with interest rates, and weaken the anticipated economic recovery.

- o We worked together to pass the First Budget Resolution which included spending cuts and revenue increases. We need to work together to pass a conference report which implements those cuts. At a time when the economy is starting to move---when interest rates are starting to decline---the worst possible signal would be for us to walk away from passage of a conference report.
