I. PURPOSE

To indicate strong Presidential interest in the House/Senate tax bill conference and to ask for these Members to help support passage of the conference report.

II. BACKGROUND

House Republicans are very reluctant to support a tax bill. Only 44 Republicans voted to send the Senate-passed bill to conference and that unexpected procedure aggravated the House Republican Members at large because they had been generally excluded from any substantive legislative input.

In addition to special interest opposition, certain conservative Republicans have mobilized opposition to any tax hike. Other Republicans have indicated that they will not support any tax increase until the House enacts the spending reductions called for in the budget reconciliation instructions.

80 percent of the reconciliation spending reductions are also in the conference with the tax bill. If the conferees meet the reconciliation targets, passage of the conference report could reduce the deficit approximately \$115 billion over the next three years. However, Republican Members are very nervous about the political consequences of raising taxes, and need to be reassured that the Administration has no intention of raising taxes to pay for more spending programs.

We will need to gain substantial support from this group for the revenue bill. This meeting will give them an opportunity to air their views and to get a better understanding of the need for passage of the conference report.

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING WITH  
SELECTED REPUBLICAN MEMBERS OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

- I wanted to make sure there was no misunderstanding about my support for the Senate-passed tax bill and spending reductions. We can improve this bill in conference and I believe that it is imperative that we then pass it.
  
- Raising taxes is a very unpleasant task, one which none of us likes doing. Reducing spending is not an easy chore - but we have to do it. We need to comply with the First Budget Resolution.
  
- It is important to distinguish between imposing new taxes and collecting taxes owed. More than three-fourths of the revenue raised comes from increased taxpayer compliance and the closing of tax loopholes.
  
- Rather than imposing new taxes on working people, this bill tries to insure that everyone pays a fair share of the tax burden.
  
- It is easy to duck the tough spending and revenue issues - but the country can't afford that. We can't back away from our responsibilities at this time.

-- I know that it is an election year - and I intend to do all I can to help you this fall - but lower interest rates and an improving economy will be the best political tonic possible. For that reason, we need to pass the conference report.

I. PURPOSE

To provide photo with President to accompany written question/answer interview for Le Figaro and other European papers. Interview focuses on U.S./European relations and to facilitate it at this time, Lambroschini agreed to accept written answers from the President.

II. BACKGROUND

Charles Lambroschini is one of Washington's top foreign correspondents. He has been here on several assignments for a total of 10 years and, in reporting for Le Figaro, he represents one of the major French and European papers. He accompanied us on the European tour. He conducted a similar written Q/A interview with you during the campaign and has had similar interviews with other major American leaders, all of which he syndicates in prominent publications throughout Europe. The wide coverage at his disposal and the usefulness of written responses in presenting complete policy positions made this a very valuable and timely opportunity for you to address the various U.S./Allied issues which are receiving such wide attention among the Europeans.

Your answers -- he'll have them before the drop-by -- to his questions are based on your last news conference and other public statements. The themes:

- 1) The alliance is basically very healthy; some differences are only natural in a family, but we share very strong values, interests and goals which hold us together and dependent on each other. Forty years of peace and economic growth reflect the success of our relationship. Versailles and Bonn demonstrated the consensus that exists on both economic and security issues.
- 2) The pipeline sanctions were an essential, if measured, response to the repression in Poland and in no way reflect a desire for "trade war" with the allies or "economic warfare" with the Soviets. The differences between grain and oil/gas equipment are several.
- 3) Allies strongly support U.S. position for significant arms reductions to equal, verifiable levels. NATO policy based on deterrence of all conflict.

-- Express view that if ceasefire continues to hold and if Arab countries help on PLO relocation as they've indicated they would, we can achieve a resolution of the Beirut crisis and get on with longer-term issue of Lebanon's sovereignty and the all-important peace process that can resolve the Palestinian problem.

-- Thank him for opportunity to address his questions which are particularly timely at this point.

PRESIDENTIAL TAPING: UNISPACE '82 CONVENTION

Thirteen years ago, two American astronauts -- Neil Armstrong and Edwin Aldrin -- became the first human beings to set foot on the moon. There they planted a plaque inscribed with these words: "We came in peace for all mankind."

That plaque stands today on the lunar surface to symbolize the spirit of the United States' space program, now and in the future.

We are proud of our achievements in exploring the reaches of space. In only a quarter of a century, we have amassed new knowledge of our solar system, of the stars, of the universe, and of our own fragile world. We are learning how we came to be and what the future may hold for our planet and all who dwell here. The countless benefits of our space program have flowed to all the peoples of the world. Communication satellites link distant parts of the globe. Remote sensing from space of the Earth's atmosphere and surface is helping people harness global resources for the benefit of all. And weather satellites are providing us worldwide with important information enabling us to better predict and adapt to the environmental forces which shape our lives.

From the very beginning of the United States' space program, we have emphasized international cooperation. I am extremely proud that most of our major space projects have been carried out with the participation of other nations. Indeed, international

cooperation is woven into the basic fabric and structure of our civil space program.

This second United Nations Conference on the Peaceful Uses of Outer Space provides leaders from around the globe with an unprecedented opportunity to chart a course for greater cooperation among nations in exploring mankind's last and endless frontier.

All of us, as the poet Archibald MacLeish so eloquently described us, are "riders on the Earth together, brothers on that bright loveliness in the eternal cold."

Let us resolve to work together to ensure that the benefits of space continue to contribute to a bright and peaceful future on Earth. And let us also chart new pathways to the stars to serve as avenues of peaceful exploration and adventure for our generation and for generations to come.

PRESIDENTIAL TAPING: MESSAGE TO BRAZILIAN LEADERS

Forty years ago, Brazil joined with free nations everywhere to fight the tyranny which then threatened to engulf the world. Brazilians and Americans stood side by side, fighting and dying to defend an ideal cherished by both our peoples: the belief that freedom must prevail over totalitarianism.

Brazil was the only South American nation to send a division into combat during World War II. The record of bravery shown by the Brazilian Expeditionary Force in the Italian Campaign has left its imprint not just in the history books but in the memories of all who saw it in action. As part of the Fourth U.S. Army Corps fighting in the Apennines, the Brazilian Expeditionary Force distinguished itself in combat. Montese, Monte Castello, Castelnuovo, and the Reno Valley -- all have become synonymous with gallantry in battle.

The soldiers of all nations who fought in the Second World War against fascist tyranny hoped it would be the last great war, one that would insure peace and freedom for all in the years to come. Today, however, those who share these ideals face new and graver threats to our beliefs from other quarters. Our responsibility for insuring a peaceful, stable world continues. In the years ahead we will face new challenges to our freedom, but with the same spirit of brotherhood which united Brazilians and Americans 40 years ago we will be able to surmount these challenges as well.

Tonight, as you gather at Ambassador Motley's residence to commemorate this proud moment in Brazil's history, I salute the valor of the Brazilian Expeditionary Force and the example it set for free people throughout the world.
