first, I want you to know that I found our meetings of great value. We had agreed to speak fromkly, and we did. as a rosult, I came away from the meeting with a better understanding of your attitudes. I hope you also understand mine a little better. Obviously there are many things on which we disagree, and disagree very fundamentally. But if I understand you correctly, you too are determined to take steps to see that our nations manage their relations in a peaceful Joshim. If this is the case, then this is one perint on which we are in total agreement - and it is after all the most fundamental one of all.

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Regarding strategic defense and it's

relation to the reduction of offensive muclear relation to the reduction of offensive muclear surespond, I was struck by your connection that the american program is somehow designed to recure a strategic advantage -- even to permit a first strike capability. I also noted your concern that resouch of testing in this area could be a curen for developing of placing affensive meapons in space.

As I told you, neither of these concerns is worranted. But I can understand, as you explained sor eloquently, that there are matters which cannot be taken on faith. One of the most significant steps in in mount to - bloom in the would - of tension in U. S.-Soviet relations - would be a decision on your front to withdraw your forces from afghanistan. I gave careful attention to your comments on their same at beneva, and am encouraged by your statement that you feel political reconciliation is possible. I want you to levour that I am prepared to cooperate in only reasonable way to facilitate such a withdrawal, of that I understand that it must be done in a manner which does not damage Societ security interests. During I desire seeings of mentioned one isse which I thought might be helpful & I will welcome any further suggestions you may have.

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These are only two of the bey issues on our current agenda. I will soon send home Thought on others. I believe that we should act promptly to brief the momentum our meetings

initiated.
